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# 5,940 ON REGISTER, MAR 7 LIBRARY VOTE

There are 5,940 voters registered for the Saturday, Mar. 7, referendum on a bond issue of \$262,500 to finance an addition to the Hicksville Public Library building. Ninety four added their names on Wednesday of this week. Final registration day is Saturday, Feb. 29 from 9 A.M. to 8 P.M.

The HERALD in this issue is presenting (page four) articles both for and against the proposition which was, in slightly different form, turned down by the voters a year ago December.

According to literature prepared by the Public Library it is planned to provide a two floor extension on the north side of the present building, space for 40,000 additional volumes, a young adult area seating 82 additional readers, and a 1,000 square foot extension doubling the size of the periodical room.

Additional registration on Wednesday was light at all areas except Old Country Rd. where a PTA meeting was held the same night.

## Former Chaplain Guest Speaker

The Rev. Frederic P. Gehring, C.M. will be the guest speaker at the Rosary Altar Society of Our Lady of Mercy Church, South Oyster Bay Road, Hicksville on Monday, March 2.

Father Gehring, a Vincentian priest, is a native of Brooklyn where he attended St. John's Prep and was later enrolled in St. Joseph's College, Princeton, New Jersey. After being ordained in 1930 he spent three years traveling in the United States for the China Missions.

During the World War II, Father Gehring was a Chaplain in the United States Navy. He was sent to Guadalcanal, and after six months won the title of "Padre of Guadalcanal." While stationed on the island he met Patsy Li and from this experience Father wrote the book, "A Child of Miracles." This Vincentian priest was the first naval chaplain to receive the Legion of Merit Medal from the President of the United States.

Father Gehring until recently was a Student Counselor at St.

John's University. He is now stationed at St. Vincent de Paul Church in Germantown, Pa.

# Board Spent 29 Hours in Preparing School Budget

The budget of Hicksville School District for the fiscal year beginning July 1 has been completed by the School Board after seven special meetings devoted to the subject as well as innumerable liaison committee sessions going back to September. The gross amount of the budget is \$11,421,915, an increase of \$508,045.75 over the current year.

The completed budget is \$145,658 more than that presented by the school administration, reflecting a new 18-step teachers' salary schedule hammered into shape during a two-hour executive session last Friday night. The increase also includes possible changes in the clerical and custodial salary schedules still to be acted upon.

The audience on Friday night included a large group of teachers, supervisors and administrators. For a while there was standing room only. Treasurer William A. Brown Jr. was on vacation and did not attend.

The new teachers salary schedule reduces the number of steps or increments from 20 to 18, it provides a starting salary on the bachelor level of \$5700. The new schedule will

go into effect on Jan. 1, 1965. There was a report this week that an effort may be made to have the School Board include on the annual meeting election

in May a separate question to make the effective date next September.

A total of \$34,200 was added to the budget to provide funds

for increases for about 170 employees in non-instructional areas (custodians, groundsmen, clerical) if the Board decides to make changes in salary sched-

ules covering those categories.

Also left open was the unresolved decision regarding establishment of an index covering principals, assistant principals and supervisors, although additional funds were added to the budget to cover such future action as the Board might take in this area. Another \$6000 had to be added to Code 6, fixed charges, due to an anticipated change in the liability insurance rate and the District's experience rating.

Not all decisions on changes in the proposed budget were unanimous. By the clock, the Board devoted almost 29 hours in seven special sessions to preparation of the budget. There were a total of 227 motions offered.

For the first time in the history of the District, a tax rate of 5% plus is anticipated under the proposed budget. The current tax rate is \$5.72 per \$100 of assessed valuation for the schools to which is added 23.8 cents per \$100 for the public library for a total of \$8.958. Of the gross budget of \$11,421,915, roughly 50 percent will be covered by state aid and roughly 50 percent will be raised by tax upon local real estate.

# Goebel Reviews Certain Aspects Of Library Expansion Proposals

Next Saturday, March 7th, the voting residents of our Hicksville School District are to vote on the matter of a bond issue to expand the present library facilities.

In determining whether a "no" vote or a "yes" vote is to be cast, our fellow residents are asked to remember (1) the circumstances under which the property involved was acquired; and (2) the manner in which the voting is called.

The property known as the "Christ property" was purchased by the Library Trustees by deed dated February 28, 1962, under an arrangement which called for the payment of \$7,000.00 pledging the credit of such Public Library, and, in effect, the District.

Interest was to be paid at 6% even though the State's Local Finance Law limits interest payable by public agencies, to no more than 3 1/2 per cent. The claim was made by the Trustees that the \$7,000.00 cash came from fines and fees which could be used for the purchase, and not from public tax monies, the use of which would have required prior public approval by referendum.

During the course of certain litigation in connection with which an appeal is now pending, the Library Trustees acknowledged the following significant facts:

1. That the 1961-62 Library budget estimated the receipt of fines and fees (totaling \$10,000.00).
2. That as of the date of purchase-February 28, 1962 - the Library had collected in fines and fees a total of \$10,680.02.
3. That by paying out \$7,000.00 in cash, as of the time of purchase, the Library Trustees necessarily had to take, and use, tax monies to the extent of almost \$7,000.00 to make the purchase, without prior public referendum and approval.
4. That even though the Trustees knew, or should have known, as of May 1, 1962 that they had received in fines and fees not quite \$13,000.00, they saw fit to estimate the receipt of fines

When the Biblical Exodus from Egypt took place, it started as an escape from human bondage and from slavery.

Here, in our School District, the District taxpayers saw fit to repudiate the purchase of the "Christ property" in December, 1962, presumably because the majority of the then voters strenuously objected to the procedure hereinbefore described of acquiring property without prior public referendum.

The issue still remains. An approval of the current referendum is an attempt to secure that approval retroactively. The Fleshpots of Egypt and those of Hicksville must be repudiated. The referendum must be defeated as a matter of principle.

The District voters, in addition to the foregoing, have it in their power to put a stop to the unwarranted abuse of the use of public monies. The annual meeting of the School District will take place on May 6th.

The submission of the Library proposition could have been deferred the two short months when the annual District Meeting takes place. The expenditure of approximately \$4,000. for the Special Meeting need not have been made. This applies both to the Library Trustees who requested the Special Meeting, and the School Board which authorized it.

It is time that the authorities having the responsibility for the expenditure of District taxpayer monies should be told in no uncertain terms that the fleshpots are not wanted in our democratic society.

And fees for 1962-63, not the \$10,000, previously estimated, but a REDUCED figure of \$8,000.00.

By their acts, the Library Trustees have failed, refused, omitted and neglected to give to the taxpayers the full benefit of a fair estimate of the receipt of prospective fines and fees. The conclusion may be properly drawn that they thereby proposed to play the role of benevolent bureaucrats with these very funds which the taxpayers have a right to consider in approving or declining to approve, the whole library budget.

## Library Corner

Prepared by Hicksville Library Staff

Distinguished in the field of Young Adult Library Service, Mrs. Doris Ryder Watts, the Young Adult Consultant, Queens Borough Public Library, and former Young Adult Consultant of the Nassau County Library System, is presenting an excellent course "Literature for Young Adults" at the Freeport Memorial Library, for teachers, parents, youth counselors and librarians.

Doris Watts and Elaine Simpson discussed an interesting survey in the Nov. 11, 1962 issue of the Wilson Library Bulletin. They describe the 1800 questionnaires sent to 50 states and 8 Canadian provinces, to ascertain the problems posed by increased student use, including the crowding-out of adults, shortage of space, and shortage of books.

They found a growing number of public libraries are limiting service to students, denying young people access to certain kinds of material or even refusing them entry into the library at certain times of the day. In Chula Vista, California, 46,900 population, no textbook is permitted in the library after 6 p.m. and the use of some reference books is restricted. One library in Minnesota insists on a permit signed by the instructor for a student who wishes to remain in the library for study purposes after 7:30 p.m. Unfortunately, this is slamming the door in the face of potential readers at the most critical stage of their development.

However, some librarians say that increased student use has exposed inadequacies in book collections, but that community awareness has led to new buildings, additional staff and increased book budgets. A librarian in Oklahoma attributes a \$325,000 building to soaring student use. One Ohio librarian says "The teenage (13-19) are the heaviest users of libraries." The study shows that the greatest increase in student use has been in the use of reference materials in the library. Among the questions in the survey were:

Do you feel that service to teen-agers in connection with school work occupies a disproportionately large amount of staff time? YES - 44%.

Who uses your general reference most? Adults or Teen-agers? Teenagers - 77%.

Considering your book budget as a whole, do you feel that meeting school-inspired needs of teen-agers absorbs a disproportionately large part of your budget? Yes - 19%.

Anyone who sees the teen-agers in the Hicksville Public Library in the afternoon, or on Saturdays will agree that a great deal more room is required right now. The March 7 Referendum provisions of 40,000 additional volumes and 82 seats, as well as the additional space for periodicals are essential to provide teen-agers with the varieties of subjects necessary to take full advantage of their educational opportunities.

"The Hicksville Public Library is a valuable part of our educational system, and as such, needs additional seating space for the students who flock daily to use the reference materials needed for their studies.

"The Library cannot continue to add to the book collection without more space in which to stack the books. The present reading area has already been converted to book storage and no more room is available.

"The Library binds and keeps back issues of current magazines. They are valuable because they are often the only sources of current events information. More room is needed in which to bind and store these periodicals."

## THIRD IN COUNTY

## Topics Vary For Civic Board

Completed plans of the entrance gates were shown to the Civic Board. They were rendered by Anderson Bros. landscape architects, and one of them was there in person to answer any questions about their cost and construction. There will be two walls about 3 feet high with a post at each end of each wall. The walls will be on either side of Birchwood Park Drive at Village Drive. The plans have been approved by TOBAY and bids will be solicited from other contractors. Construction will be started in early Spring.

The Board has received a number of complaints from residents of our community that recently their water bills have been a great deal higher than the corresponding periods last year, and for no apparent reason. A committee was formed to investigate. Reliance Oil is in the process of figuring out and sending the financial rebates due all members of our Civic Assoc. Last year these rebates amounted to 12, 14, and 16 dollars, depending on how much oil was bought by the individual home owner. It was also reported that a new device, costing about \$65 and purporting to save the consumer 20% on his oil consumption, is being sold. A committee was formed to investigate the authenticity and value of this device.

The Board received two letters from Dr. Thomas Carey, Sup'l. of Jericho Schools. One letter informed the Board that legislation is now pending in the State Legislature to make parents liable for the damages done to public property, particularly schools, by their children.

The second letter took issue with our Jericho Education Committee who reported that indications were that the quality of instruction was poor. Dr. Carey stated that he would be most interested to discuss this report. A meeting will be set up.

The Civic Board took a stand on any and all commercial ventures in our Community. By a unanimous vote,

## Petito Visits Civic Board Meeting

Michael Petito, Supervisor of TOBAY, took the time to attend the regular Feb. monthly meeting of the BCA Civic Board, and after observing some of the business carried on commented that ours was a "fantastic Civic Assoc." Most of the Civic Groups, he went on, just petered out after the initial problems were solved, but here, after 7 years, this group was as strong and as active as ever in the interests of the community.

When confronted with our community's problem on the growth of commercial ventures, he was very emphatic. "Neighbors should have mutual respect for one another's rights," he stated. "Such ventures should not be permitted, they lead to a breakdown in the entire community's provisions for homes, their values and as a place to live and bring up your children."

He further commented that one of the reasons people moved to the suburbs was to live in a place free of immediate commercial enterprise. A call to his office, said Mr. Petito, would initiate personal action and investigation.

On the matter of escalators for the new station being built in Hicksville, Mr. Petito said he felt it would be ridiculous not to have them installed and action is now being taken to accomplish this.

The Supervisor was informed that in all of Jericho there was not one regulation Little League field; that there were over 300 children partaking in this community function and although land had been promised, so far, nothing had materialized. Mr. Petito requested that the Board send a letter to him, personally, and he will see to it that the matter gets prompt attention.

One last point was brought to Mr. Petito's attention. A few old, dilapidated cars had been abandoned near the water tower on Merry Lane and no one seemed to know whose responsibility it was to remove them. One of the wrecks had been set on fire. Once again the Supervisor assured the Board that a letter to his office, addressed to him personally, would receive prompt attention.

The Supervisor then told the group that he had formed seven citizens committees to work on various programs having to do with recreation, transportation, etc. The problems we were now encountering fell into some of these categories and as such as such would be investigated. Mr. Petito once again complimented the Board on its dedication to the problems of the community and reminded the group that he was always available either by phone or by a personal visit to his office.

The Supervisor then left with the Civic Board's thanks for taking time out from his busy schedule to attend our meeting.

### Guidance Counsel Major Concern

Over 100 people, representing all sections of Jericho, attended the February meeting of the Citizens for Better Education. The meeting was held Tuesday, Feb. 18th in the home-like meeting room of the Chase Manhattan Bank.

It was a tremendously exciting and successful meeting. The guest speakers were Mr. Heller, Principal and Miss M. LaVine, Chief Guidance Counselor, both of the Jericho High School.

Miss LaVine explained in great detail the functions of the guidance department. After her talk the audience was invited to ask questions.

The tenor of the questions directed at Miss LaVine and Mr. Heller indicated the serious concern so many of the parents have about the quality of Guidance Counselling at the High School. However, the direct responses of Mr. Heller and Miss LaVine alleviated some of this concern. They informed the audience that a major effort is being made to fit guidance counseling to the immediate and long range needs of each Jericho student.

The most recent record, as presented by Miss LaVine appears to be one that we hope will show improvement in the future. In the graduating class of 1963 there were 120 students. The breakdown was as follows:

67 entered regular 4 year degree granting institutions—55.8%  
15 entered 2 year community colleges, junior colleges or technical institutions —12.5%  
16 entered other post high school educational schools—13.3%

Thus, a total of 81.6% have gone on to post-high school studies.

It would be most enlightening if, at some future date, Mr. Heller and Miss LaVine could tell us how these percentages compare to those of our neighboring school districts. We would also enjoy knowing which colleges the 55.8% entered.

Mr. Heller also stated, when questioned about recent Regents results, that we had been having difficulty in our French and Math departments. He feels that this year will be much more satisfactory.

The Citizens for Better Education is filling a long felt need in our Community. It is attempting to examine and evaluate programs and conditions in the school system and to educate the community on the problems and issues concerning the school system. We also hope to formulate, propose and work for the implementation of specific programs in the schools.

At the moment, we are looking forward to the administration presenting an enrichment program on both high school and elementary levels. We also hope for consideration to be given to the opening of both the elementary and high school libraries

wood, on excessive water bills. Our pumping records show that this year 1963 past was very dry. Low water level in New York State Reservoirs verify this. As a result, the majority of consumers in the Jericho Water District used more water than in previous years.

We also noticed in checking out several complaints from residents in your section, that leaks had developed in toilet tanks. Please instruct all persons to keep a close check on all fixtures.

When consumers receive water bills that they consider excessive, we would appreciate a call immediately so that we may re-check the reading, service line, and house, for leaks. If our inspection discloses everything to be in proper order, the only alternative for the property owner is to have the meter tested. There is a service charge of \$2.00 for a meter test. Should the test be within the limits allowed by law, a \$2.00 fee is levied. If the meter is proven inaccurate, then adjustments are made on all previous bills according to the meter test.

I have enclosed several copies of leaflets which show the amount of water that can be wasted through very small leaks. All of the figures are based on 40 pounds pressure. As Birchwood has between 85 pounds and 95 pounds pressure, consumption would be considerably higher. I would appreciate it very much if you would circulate the leaflets at the next meeting of your organization.
