Oral Vaccine Clinics Here

Approximately 27,000 persons under the age of 40 are expected to receive the Trivalent Sabin Vaccine at three Hicksville schools on two Sundays, April 19 and June 14, under a Polio Conversion program jointly sponsored by the Nassau County Medical Society, Nassau Academy of Medicine, Nassau Pediatric Society, Nassau Chapter, American Academy of General Practice and County Health Dept. Hours are 9:30 A.M. to 5 P.M.

Hicksville Board of Education has granted the use of Burns Ave. and Fork Lane Schools and Hicksville Senior High School for these two clinics. An average of 9,000 persons is expected to receive the vaccine feeding at each location. It is an oral vaccine which requires only two doses. The cost of providing

each individual dose is 50 cents. The low cost is made possible because of the volunteer services being provided by practicing physicians, nurses, many lay volunteers, school authorities supplemented by the County Health Dept. One million doses have been reserved for use in Nassau County, utilizing about 60 locations.

\$120,000 More for Schools ..

Extra State Aid To Cut Rate 15¢

Legislation in Albany which, late this week, appeared likely of passage regarding increased state aid for Long Island and upstate school districts could slice 15 cents per \$100 or more off the anticipated rise in the Hicksville School tax rate.

This revelation was made Tuesday night by School Superintendent Donald F. Abt at a special meeting of the Board of Education called on the matter of state aid.

Abt told the Board that under the legislation which, on Tuesday, appeared likely to win approval this session, the Hicksville District would receive approximately \$120,000 more in State Aid than was previously anticipated. Under the gross budget for the 1964-65 fiscal year, recently completed by the Board after a series of special meetings in January and February, an increase in the tax rate of 57 cents per \$100 was anticipated.

Application of the additional state aid would reduce the amount to be raised by tax on Hicksville property owners. The increase in the tax rate would, as a result, be only 42 cents per \$100, Abt explained.

The Board of Education will hold an open discussion of the proposed budget at its regular meeting in the High School Auditorium on Friday night, April 24. Voting on the Budget takes place on Wednesday, May 6.

With only four Board members present for most of the special meeting, Tuesday night (Herbert Johnson out of town and Irving Lawrance delayed by a prior engagement,) several motions failed of passage. Four votes of the seven-seat Board are required for action.

Vice President George W. Kunz, offered a series of motions to restore \$10,000 to various budgets involving equipment which had earlier been slashed. His three motions were not

seconded. A motion by Kunz, seconded by President George A. Jackson, to apply whatever increase in State Aid is received toward reduction of the tax rate was lost. Cornelius McCormack voted no and William A. Bruno Jr., abstained. The failure of the motion was academic, since all revenues are by law automatically applied to reduction of the gross amount of the budget and, eventually, the tax rate.

A motion by McCormack to utilize the increase in state aid to make all new, revised salary schedules effective in September, rather than Jan. 1, 1965, received only his vote in support.

A motion by Bruno to add to

the evening's agenda an item regarding "a possible problem of teacher morale" was lost with three votes in favor and two opposed.

The next regular meeting of the Board is scheduled for Friday night, April 10, at 8:15 P.M. in the teacher's lounge, second floor, high school.

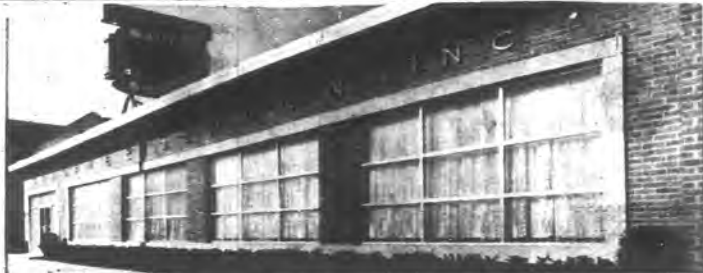

Form Corp To Aid Studies

A non-profit membership corporation, known as Study, Inc. has been formed by a group of Hicksville residents, to stimulate interest in, and promote the study of foreign languages and culture on the part of Hicksville students. Incorporation has already been approved by the State Attorney General's office, and by a Justice of the Supreme Court.

The directors and officers of the group are Blanche Tisman, 37 Poachree Lane, Hicksville, President; Abraham Fishman, 22 Balsam Drive, Vice President; Amy Sclaff, 32 Angle Lane, Treasurer; Marion Coffey, 134 Sixth St., Recording Secretary; and Doris Gottlieb, 4 Boulevard Dr., Corresponding Secretary.

Study Inc. is expected by its organizers to secure tax exemption from the Internal Revenue Service, so that contributions thereto from individuals and corporations will be tax-deductible. Funds will also be sought from educational foundations, in order to enable it to carry out its purposes.

An advisory board of prominent businessmen and education leaders is in the process of being formed locally, while on the international level, representatives of foreign countries will be invited to cooperate with Study, Inc.

This summer, the group expects to afford approximately 50 Hicksville students, the opportunity to spend one month in residence at Universities in Spain and France, studying the language and culture of those countries.

YMCA to Build Jericho Center

The Nassau - Suffolk Y.M.C.A. today revealed plans for a \$2,054,000 Central "Y", to act as the nerve center of a long range Y.M.C.A. expansion of services throughout the two counties. The 651,000 cubic ft. building will be erected in Jericho, on an 8-acre tract anonymously donated to the "Y".

The site is just north of the Long Island Expressway. "This is to be the main spring of the growth of the Y.M.C.A. on Long Island", said Frank M. Warner, General Secretary of the Long Island "Y". "It will serve the young people of the populous adjacent communities, it is convenient to several business areas - to serve the businessmen of 'downtown Long Island', and it will be headquarters for the growing "Y" program in our seven existing branches... and those to come in the future."

The Central "Y" will have an indoor swimming pool, with complete locker and shower facilities. A variety of exercise rooms will be available, along with a health club for the many businessmen expected to use the facilities during the day. The program will offer day and evening activities for youngsters, young adults, men and women, and family groups. Meeting rooms and halls will be available for community social and philanthropic functions.

Fifty residence rooms will provide for the many young men who come to Nassau and Suffolk each year, to work, study and teach in local communities. The Nassau-Suffolk "Y" has received many requests from the Long Island business community and from out-of-town "Y's", to provide a wholesome "home away from home" for young men just starting to work in a Long Island job.

The executive offices of the Nassau-Suffolk "Y", now in rented quarters in Mineola, will be relocated at the Central "Y", where it will establish central coordination and guidance for the "Y" program that is expected to serve some 80% of the three-million Long Islanders expected by 1985. It will also be used as a training center for developing program and personnel, both professional and volunteer, for the seven existing branch "Y's" located in Brookhaven, Glen Cove, Hempstead, Huntington, Lawrence, Elmont and Smithtown.

A report was given that our community was suffering from a sanitation problem. Not only were garbage cans left out for days but many of them were left uncovered. This was causing the garbage, in some cases, to be strewn all over the streets and, in other cases, the cans and their covers were spread over sidewalk and street. The community would have to be apprised of the consequences of such acts, and the Police and Sanitation Department's help was to be enlisted.

The Jericho Education Committee reported on a meeting that was held with Dr. Carey and his board of Education. The questions of Guidance, Administration and Instruction were discussed; and although Dr. Carey and his administration presented what appeared to be a glowing report on their programs, the Education Committee would wait for another meeting with them before they felt satisfied that all their doubts were cleared up.

Public Works Commissioner Eugene F. Gibbons announced that he has requested the authority to designate certain major County roads as "snow routes" on which parking would be banned during snow emergencies. The proposed ordinance, which must be approved by the Board of Supervisors, empowers the County Executive to declare a state of snow emergency and establishes fines of up to \$50 for parking or abandoning automobiles on the designated roads.

"Our experience during the heavy storm of Jan. 13 and 14 this year," Gibbons said, "con-

vinced us that parked and abandoned cars constitute the biggest obstacle in clearing roads. Our plows, for example, found South Oyster Bay Road absolutely impenetrable due to stalled cars. We must have the legal authority to prohibit parking and to haul away abandoned or stalled vehicles."

The ordinance permits the Department of Public Works or peace officer to remove vehicles and to charge the owner the cost of removal and storage. Snow route roads will be clearly marked special signs.

"Look Nans", Pug said as he glimpsed his first train... Many Wagon... No Horse! And that believe it or not was the first reactions by a pair of Hicksvillites to the L.I.R.R. There have been others more modern of course but let's not jump all place with historical bombots. Instead we'll dispense with our usual fit of redumancy and wheel back to the very beginning... which incidentally was over 200 million years ago.

Hicksville was once part of a great chain of mountains. In fact the story of how Long Island (Hicksville included) first came into being has fascinated geologists for quite some time. At first the region was mountainous... Then as the heavy glacial crush of ice, snow, frost and rivers ate away the land... a great plain of rock came into being. As soon of time passed other fantastic changes took place and finally about 40,000 years ago the last glaciers started to disappear. And left behind were rock and earth debris which now appears on our North Shore. More time and finally glacial streams fed by the warm sun of the changing climate relocated the soil; forming a slightly sloping plain... This is Long Island
