\$120,000 More for Schools ..

Legislation in Albany which, late this week, appeared likely of passage regarding increased state aid for Long Island and upstate school districts could slice 15 cents per \$100 or more off the anticipated rise in the Hicksville School tax rate.

'This revelation was made Tuesday night by School Super-intendent Donald F. Abt at a special meeting of the Board of Education called on the mat-ter of state aid.

Abt told the Board that under the legislation which on Tuesday.

Abt told the Board that under the legislation which, on Tuesday, appeared likely to win approval this session, the Hicksville District would receive approximately \$120,000 more to State Aid than was previously acticited that was previously acticities active of the 1964-65 fiscal year, recently completed by the Board after a series of special meetings in January and February, an increase in the tax rate of 57 cents per \$100 was anticipated.

of cents per +100 was anaccipated.

Application of the additional state aid would reduce the amount to be raised by tax on Hickswille property owners. The increase in the tax rate would, as a result, be only 42 cents per \$100, Abt explained.

Plan Snow Routes in County

Public Works Commissioner Eugene F. Gibbons announcesthat he has requested the authority he has requested the authority to designate certain major County roads as "snow routes" on which parking would be banned during snow emergencies. The proposed ordinance, which must be approved by the Board of Supervisors, empowers the County Executive to declare a state of snow emergency and establishes fines of up to \$50 for parking or abandoning automobiles on the designated roads, "Our experience during the heavy storm of Jan. 13 and 14 this year," Gibbons said, "con-

vinced us that parked and abanconed cars constitute the biggest vinced us that purked and abanc oned cars constitute the biggest obstacle in clearing roads, Our plows, for example, found South Oyster Bay Road absolutely impenetrable due to stalled cars, we must have the legal authority to prohibit parking and to had away abandoned or stalled vehicles.

The ordinance permits the De-partment of Public Works or peace officer to remove vehicles and to charge the owner the cost of removal and storage. Snow route roads will be clearly mark-ed special signs.


