
Trains should be running on the elevated structure on the main line the later part of May. The switch over for the Port Jefferson branch is due in August, Grunewald noted.



Section 15.1 Savings Clause: if any section, provisions or part thereof in this ordinance shall be adjudged invaled or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, then such adjudication shall not effect the validity of the ordinance as a whole, or any section, provision or part thereof not so adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 16.1 This ordinance shall take effect immediatorly.

FREE ADMISSION TO ALL

On two Sundays, April 19th and June 14th, oral (Sabin) polio vaccine will be available at the Jericho High School from 9:30 AM to 5:00 PM for all residents to forty years of age.

Howard Jankowitz and William Maybew, of the Jericho School Board, will chair Jericho's part of a county-wide effort to immunize almost 500,000 Nassau residents before the 1964 polio season begins.

The vaccine, Sabin Trivalent, will be given in two doses, one on each of the appointed Sundays, rain or shine. Both doses are necessary to achieve effective immunization. The cost is 50¢ per dose. Some pre-registration forms have already been given out through the schools but on-site registration is also allowed.

All five of Jericho's PTA Units have been asked to call for volunteers as typists, recorders, nurseassistants, cashiers, and registrars to staff the vaccine program on the two Sundays. Persons wishing to volunteer should contact their PTA President.

Co-sponsors of the program are the Nassau County Medical Society, the Nassau Chapter of the American Academy of General Practice, and the Nassau County Department of Health.

Board Approves School Budget

The Jericho Board of Education unanimously approved the proposed School Budget for the 1964-65 school year at a special meeting held on March 24.

The Budget, as submitted by Dr. Thomas Carey, Superimendent, is the most detailed one ever presented to the Jericho community. While keeping proposed expenditures to a minumun it still indicates the strong desire by the Administration, Board and Community to improve the educational standards of the Jericho Public Schools.

As submitted, the proposed Budget shows a net increase of 5402,660 over last year, This could result in an increased tax rate of 35 cents per \$100 or assessed valuation. was only a four cent increase.
Third, pupil enrollment went from 3,300 to 3,700, an increase well above that anticipated.
It should be noted that of the 35 cent expected increase, the sum of 15 cents is the result of the bond issues approved last

year. Since many proposed budgets in other Nassau districts indicate

in other Nassau districts indicate much greater increases, some of a \$1.00 per hundred or more, it is a tribute, to both the Board and the Administration that their painstaking work resulted in holding the expected byt nocessary increase to so small in amount. 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




