Residents Protest Rock Relocation

Area residents and historians this week added their voices in protest regarding the plan of the Nassau County Dept. of Public Works to move the Cantiague Rock from its historic location on the boundary line between the Townships of North Hempstead and Oyster Bay in the western section of Hicksville. Protests have been sent to Town, County and State authorities. The Public Works dept plans to move the glacial stone several hundred feet down Cantaigue Rock Road and set it at the entrance to the proposed Cantaigue Rock Road and set it at the entrance to the proposed Cantaigue County Park. Purest point out that the Rock has served to mark the exact point where the Township boundary line zaggs (see map) for more than 200 years.


Expressing the sentiments of many Hicksville residents, Herb Joyce wrote the HERALD con-gratulations upon its editorial





This get for the 1964-65 school year which totals \$9,453,331. This total represents an increase of 1720,878 over the current year's budgeted expenditures. This is the smallest dollar increase and the smallest percentage increases in other types of income, the smount to be raised by local property taxes will be \$1,066,437 above the current year's local tax receipts. The adopted budget will require an increase of \$1.077 in the basic tax rate for Central School District No. 2 for 1964-65. The current-basic for Central District rax raise is \$5.611 per bundred dollars of assessed valuations, in addition, an estimated debt service tax on the former districts of \$.274 for Syonset, \$.104 for Woodbury, and \$.129 for Locust Grove will be necessary.




