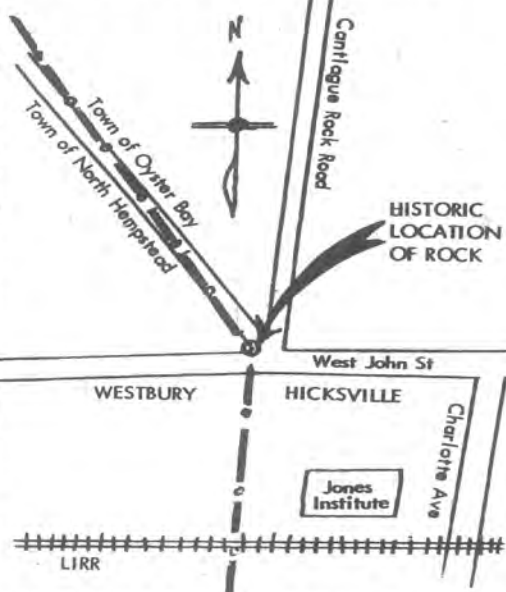

Message from Chairman

With the coming of spring, I am certain that every resident of our fine community is desirous of putting his best foot forward to enhance the general beauty and cleanliness of our community. In this connection may I take the liberty of making a few suggestions.

1. Although technically it is the job of the Town Highway Dept. to clean the street area immediately in front of your curb strip, each resident might give some thought regarding the sweeping up of the accumulated winter's debris in front of his own home without waiting until the Town will get around to doing the job.

2. Consideration might be given to pruning the lower branches of curb strip trees so that they will not inflict injury upon passers-by. I have some recollection that there is a Town ordinance requiring the pruning of trees extending over a sidewalk so that the lowest branch will be at least six feet from the ground. In any event, such a pruning at this time will not harm the trees but will lend added impetus to the growth of the upper branches.

3. You can enhance our community appearance by not putting out your garbage cans a full day in advance of garbage collection—but only the night before. Similarly, if possible, please try to take in your garbage cans

shortly after the garbage collection and do not allow them to remain in the street in front of your house for a day or two.

4. A small number of our residents have gotten into the habit of wheeling Waldbaum's and Floyd Bennett carts into our community and leaving them in front of homes or in our streets. Not only does this create an unsightly appearance to the community, but the condition also creates a traffic hazard to automobiles. Moreover, I believe that the removal of the carts from the shopping area is in violation of the permitted use of such carts by the respective stores.

Our Civic Assoc. and I believe, the vast majority of the residents of our community constantly strive to keep and maintain our community as a fine and decent place in which to live. Won't each and every resident of our community pitch into achieve this goal? It has been the experience in some other communities that a laxity on the part of residents in maintaining the appearance of the community has resulted in a gradual deterioration of the appearance of the community, which in turn resulted in a depreciation of the values of the homes therein. I am sure that every resident of our community will agree that we do not want this to happen to us.

Syosset School Budget Goes Up

The Board of Education of Central School District No. 2, Syosset, recently adopted a budget for the 1964-65 school year which totals \$9,453,331. This total represents an increase of \$720,878 over the current year's budgeted expenditures. This is the smallest dollar increase and the smallest percentage increase since 1954-55, the year of centralization. Because of decreases in other types of income, the amount to be raised by local property taxes will be \$1,066,437 above the current year's local tax receipts. The adopted budget will require an increase of \$1,077 in the basic tax rate for Central School District No. 2 for 1964-65. The current basic Central District tax rate is \$5,611 per hundred dollars of assessed valuations. In addition, an estimated debt service tax on the former districts of \$,274 for Syosset, \$,104 for Woodbury, and \$,129 for Locust Grove will be necessary.

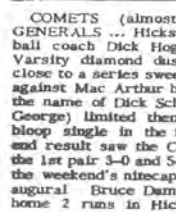

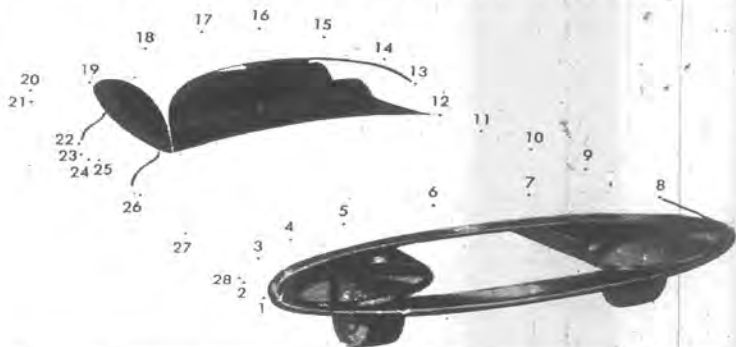
He resides at 106 Dean Street. An 11-year resident of Hicksville,

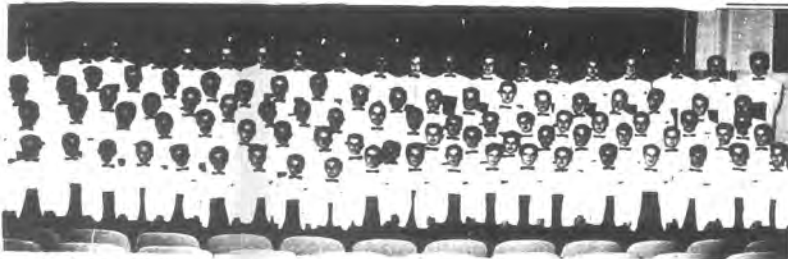
