## Budget Talk Gets Real Weird

About 300 persons showed up, Friday night, for the Hicksville Board of Education public discussion of the proposed 1964-65 school district budget which goes before the voters next Wednesday, May 6. It was by far the largest turnout for such a session in the past four or five years. It turned out to be something of a circus.

Board Member William A. Bruno Jr., who distinguished himself by failure to attend at least 50 percent of the lengthy special meetings during January and February when the Board hammered the proposed budget into form, made a ridiculous bid for headlines by offering a series of budget-slashing motions. The audience apparently failed to react.

Based on experience of recent years, the Board of Education had anticipated a small turnout of interested residents with questions on the budget and planned its

regular board meeting to follow the discussion.

The discussion got involved and near-riotous (with Bruno shouting at a resident "chicken, chicken, chicken"). When the formal meeting finally got underway, it was bogged down by a protracted yackfest regarding acceptance of some teacher resignations. After midnight it became apparent that a

deliberate effort underway to drag out the discussion until 1 A.M. when, under Board rules, a unanimous vote is required to continue.

At 1 A.M. Bruno was the lone Board member to vote "no" on continuation of the meeting, although less than half the evening's agenda had been accomplished. As a result the meeting came to an abrupt halt at 1 o'clock.

There was so much shouting and bawling at the time that many in audience failed to understand exactly what was taking place.

Howard J. Finnegan demanded that his name be withdrawn from the ballot on May 6. A petition had been filed in his behalf for the vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of D. F. Sabatella. He wrote the District Clerk that "the petition was filed in my name without my knowledge or consent."

A rump "meet your candidates' night" was staged by Bill Bruno's playmates, Monday night, at Hicksville Senior High School.

It had been traditional, going back probably more years than most of the candidates' residence in Hicksville, for the PTA Council to sponsor a forum where interested residents could get better acquainted with those seeking office. This year the PTA Council did an admirable job of (1) setting an early date, and (2) advertising the event well in advance. Everyone was put on notice, days before they filed their last-minute petitions, that a forum would be held under the impartial and non-partisan auspices of the PTA Council.

Came the night of the PTA forum (last Monday) and three candidates failed to appear. Harry Wagner said he would not be present. Mrs. Maxine Carson pleaded a previous engagement. George Martin did nothing, except failing to show up.

At the Senior High School, the Hicksville Chapter of Freedom in Education sponsored a "meet the candidates' forum."

At the Meet-the-Candidate Forum held Monday evening at the Junior High School, TEACH-supported candidates George A. Jackson and Caleb Hornbostel detailed their ideas for Hicksville's educational future.

Hornbostel's speech stressed the importance of teamwork and mutual respect for a good educational system. If elected to the School Board he promised to work for four goals: (1) An efficient school board that spends its time on its major function -- to develop educational goals which will guide the administration in

running our school system. (2) Better communication and understanding between the community, the board of education, and the professional staff. He proposes more School Board Digests for all citizens and more information about schools for the public. Most important of all, he believes in use of citizens' advisory committees. (3) Evaluation of the tract system by an outside qualified source. (4) Increased state aid. The school board together with administration should make a much more vigorous, forceful effort to get a fairer share of the tax dollar by way of state aid.

# Herald Editorial Opinion:

## Elect Jackson and McManus

Some eight or ten years ago we decided to "sit out" an annual school district election in Hicksville and take no position on the candidates. We lived to regret that decision and right or wrong, have expressed an opinion regarding candidates for the school board ever since.

Despite threats and insinuations, we firmly declare our position about the election of next Wednesday, May 6th. While we did not support him in his maiden candidacy, we feel that George A. Jackson has demonstrated his ability and sincerity and most certainly should be re-elected to succeed himself. 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# 'Most Accommodating Guest'

Within the last two years a "new" organization has been established in Hicksville called "Freedom in Education." This organization boasts Mr. Bruno as one of its ardent supporters, and on Thursday, April 23, he not only attended a meeting, he "entertained" it with a lengthy speech. This was a most interesting performance.

Although he was the guest of Freedom in Education, it was he who made the arrangements for the use of the building for this meeting — a most accommodat-

ing guest. In the course of his speech, Mr. Bruno corrected his previous claim — made in a flyer circulated in the district, and in a newspaper article — that 50% of the Senior High School English department had resigned or been fired. In his speech Mr. Bruno revised his figures; he spoke about 7 or 8 teachers who were dismissed or forced to resign. This is pure fiction. No one of the 7 or 8 teachers was forced to resign, nor were any dismissed.

Mr. Bruno then stated that for

the first time, because of his insistence, textbooks were being reviewed. Fact or Fiction? Fiction. He claimed that material pertaining to the building program was being suppressed. Fact or Fiction? Again fiction; Mr. Bruno has access to the same information as every other board member.

Mr. Bruno made the point that he has brought the Superintendent up on charges before the Commissioner of Education. Fact or Fiction? Fact. However, he forgot to tell his audience that when the Commissioner set a date in March to hear the case, Mr. Bruno requested a postponement. The Commissioner then set

a date in April, just before the hearing. Mr. Bruno requested another postponement, this time to May. It appears that Mr. Bruno would rather talk about bringing a charge than have the case heard. What could be the reason for Mr. Bruno's delays? Are his charges fact or fiction?

Mr. Bruno claims the Superintendent moved paper out of the warehouse before the Board's inspection of that building. Fact or fiction? Once again, fiction. Mr. Gorycki's letters and the Superintendent's indicate the warehouse procedure. Mr. Bruno talks about fire hazards at the Junior High School and says that he has letters to prove his allegations. Why doesn't he read his letters publicly, as well as the Fire Marshal's, and fully inform the people — or wouldn't that serve his purpose?

Mr. Bruno waved a booklet before his audience and said it was a teachers' grievance. He read aloud sections of this grievance file and told his listeners to go to the superintendent's office and demand that they be permitted to see it. Yet on Friday, April 24, when he was invited to read it to the public at a meeting in the senior high school, he fought for three-quarters of an hour to avoid the reading. Fact or Fiction? Fact. The material is available as a district record at the Administration Building. The public may read it. Why did Mr. Bruno wish to keep it secret Friday night?

Mr. Bruno claims he can prove that the Superintendent and Mr. Jackson went to TEACH and begged TEACH to support Mr. Jackson. Fact or Fiction? Fiction! It would be comforting here to use a stronger word than fiction. Mrs. Bruno says he can prove his statement. If he thinks he can, why keep this proof secret? Let's hear it!

Mr. Bruno then talked about getting rid of the cancerous problem of Jackson, Abi and Rouse. The Superintendent understands why Mr. Bruno wishes to liquidate him. The fact is that when Mr. Bruno first came on the Board he asked the Superintendent if he wanted to work with him, Mr. Bruno, the hard way or the easy way. Fact or Fiction? Fact. Evidently the Superintendent chose the "hard way" in Mr. Bruno's opinion. The Superintendent has refused to turn over this school district to indoctrination and has insisted on maintaining an educational program. Fact or Fiction? Fact.

1963 and you will note their position on the Board's ruling on psychological tests and testing. T.E.A.C.H. says quote, "Decisions about tests to be used should be left to certified school psychologists" and they go on . . . "The newly adopted Board policy should be changed to allow this freedom for the trained person." As a mother, this tells me that if the T.E.A.C.H. group doesn't approve of the Board seeing psychological tests before they are given my children, they certainly wouldn't approve of my knowing or consenting to such tests. After all, I'm not a trained and qualified psychologist, am I? No, but I am an experienced and qualified parent. This is why I say T.E.A.C.H. supports the unwarranted invasion of the privacy of the home. Therefore, since a member of their organization was elected to the School Board last May, I do not want any more people sponsored by or belonging to the T.E.A.C.H. organization, on MY Board and YOURS. I want everyone to know how I feel and what I see happening so that others will stop and think before they vote on May 6th. I have no intention of giving any T.E.A.C.H. sponsored or T.E.A.C.H. supported candidates my vote. If I did, I would violate my conscience and I will tell you why. The principles of T.E.A.C.H. contradict and put in jeopardy the authority I have been given by God over my children. Some people don't often think about this God-given authority, but everyone knows it is true.

Some of you might not be familiar with T.E.A.C.H. or do not read their newsletter. T.E.A.C.H. isn't the whole population of Hicksville, but only a very small group of individuals. They happen to have at their disposal, the monetary means to put out a newsletter which many people do read. Word gets around then, and those not in accord with their principles, are otherwise confused. T.E.A.C.H. is not new. About 6 or 7 years ago they went under another title. By our laws, the minority is protected and their rights as well. But in the case of this group, the minority is ruling the majority and there's nothing in our Constitution which states that the minority shall rule.

It is my opinion that we must consider seriously . . .

1. Who (what group) fought to keep God out of our schools even when His name would have been mentioned . . . not in a prayer . . . but in a portion of the Star Spangled Banner. (1962, recall the fantastic showing at the Board meeting in favor of using the National Anthem in place of our banned Regents prayer?)

2. Who (what group) wants only psychologists to decide what psychological tests to give our children? And who has said, "The newly adopted Board policy should be changed to allow this freedom for the trained person."

As a final note I would like to quote Rep. Frank J. Becker's recent statement to the House Judiciary Committee opened hearings on the school-prayer issue; he was, "impressed by the fact" . . . that these same individuals who oppose school Prayer also . . . "manifest opposition to what we call patriotism." Now, if condemning a portion of The Star Spangled Banner as unconstitutional is not opposition to patriotism I'd like to know what is! This is a perfect example in my UN-TRAINED mind of un-patriotic Americans. Call it what you like, but I call it un-patriotic.

## ENDORSE CARIN AND JANKOWITZ

### Approve Bd Members

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** The following article is submitted by Selma Constant. Mrs. Constant is well known for her conscientious devotion to our community, both as a reporter of the events relating to the Jericho School system and for her keen appreciation for the need of providing our children with the proper education to equip them for the world today.

For over three years I have attended Jericho Board of Education meetings, first as an observer and then as a reporter for the West Birchwood News. I have witnessed the district's growth, difficulties and achievements. I have seen the strides being made to upgrade education in Jericho which recently have begun to show results. The present Board has made enormous contributions to education in Jericho. They have chosen a brilliant, far-sighted Superintendent and are working diligently with him to bring educational standards in Jericho to new heights.

Dr. Arthur Carin and Howard Jankowitz, both presently on the Board, are running for re-election. These two men have selflessly devoted time and energy to improve our school system. Dr. Carin and Mr. Jankowitz have demonstrated their leadership ability in all the areas vital to a superior school system. With the encouragement of Dr. Carin, Mr. Jankowitz and other Board members, policies have been adopted where there were none. We now have in Jericho policies relating to teacher recruitment, which are calculated to bring teachers of experience and proven ability to balance a staff previously made up largely of

inexperienced teachers. Principals now have to spend a minimum of 10 hours a week supervising teachers in the classroom - something never done before - and reports on teachers must be given to the Superintendent and Board members, particularly before tenure is given. The Board has taken steps to encourage the organization of a Jericho Teachers Association to open up lines of communication between teachers, the Superintendent and the Board so that weaknesses can be discovered and overcome.

The Board has encouraged the Superintendent to study and evaluate the curriculum. Already plans have been formulated to introduce modern math in the schools up to teach science at the Junior High School level. On May 6th, Wednesday, between the hours of 2:00 pm and 10:00 pm every Jericho citizen, having the following qualifications, is entitled to and should vote at the Jericho High School, for the proposed Budget Board of Education. Your residence in the community must be at least thirty days. (The time you signed contract may be figured in this period.) You must either be a property owner, the spouse of a property owner or have a child in the school. THERE IS NO PRIOR REGISTRATION PROBLEM, JUST COME IN AND VOTE.

When you vote in a local Board of Education election, YOUR VOTE COUNTS. When you vote you cast your ballot for the candidate you believe will guarantee a good education for your child. You are deciding your own child's future in education when you cast your ballot. We cannot tell you who to vote for. THE IMPORTANT THING IS TO VOTE. However, we feel it is our duty to tell you who is running and how your elected civic administration feels about them.

Dr. Arthur Carin and Howard Jankowitz are running for re-election. The West Birchwood Education Committee, West Birchwood Civic Association Board of Directors, Citizens for Better Education, Birchwood Park Civic Association and Ashbury Estates Committee, have UNANIMOUSLY endorsed these men as the best qualified to insure the continuity of good education in Jericho. They have expanded and increased the educational facilities of this community to the point where we can now look forward to first rate education. They have accomplished this while maintaining one of the lowest school budgets in the area. They have proven themselves and promise to continue to do so.

Dr. Arthur Carin is being opposed by Mr. Walsh. Very little is known of Mr. Walsh's background due to the fact that he was a late filer and refused to interview to the staff of this paper.

Howard Jankowitz is being opposed by Louis Kaplan and Mario Della Vecchia. Mr. Kaplan is a member of the Dad's of Jericho. This organization donated the seating stands to Jericho High. Mr. Kaplan did not make himself available to the West Birchwood Education Committee for interview. However, he was interviewed by Citizens for Better Education but not endorsed by them.

Mr. Della Vecchia had also failed to make himself available for interview by the West Birchwood Education Committee although he was specifically requested to do so. Mr. Della Vecchia ran for the school board last year and lost. In his previous campaign he stated that he would feel free to censor library and text books and ban them or permit them as he saw fit. We feel that such censorship is NOT consistent with good education and certainly, has no place in our way of life.

The choice lies with you. Make it a good one because your vote will decide what kind of education and educational facilities your children will receive from the Jericho Schools.

### Bd Recommends Budget Approval

The Education Committee of the Birchwood Civic Assoc., at Jericho recommended to the association the adoption of the Jericho school budget, submitted for the 1964 - 65 school year. However, it also has gone on record as unanimously approving the placing before the public meeting, May 5, 1964 the following referendum in addition to the budget, which the Board of Education has deleted. This referendum would include the following items:

1. Late bus service for those members of Jericho H.S. and Jr. H.S. teams that return late from games and practice.
2. Continuance of the Jr. H.S. interscholastic athletic program.
3. Continuance of the summer Driver Education program.

These 3 items would cost the school district a total of \$7,300 at an estimated 2 cents per \$100.00 assessed valuation or a total of \$2.00 per home owner.

The Education Committee feel very strongly about the inclusion of these three items and strongly urge the residents of our area and all of Jericho to attend the public meeting, May 5, to insure the inclusion of the same on the voting proposition, May 6, ATTENDANCE ON MAY 5, IS ESSENTIAL FOR OUR STUDENTS COMPLETE EDUCATION.

The Education Committee also endorse the candidacies of the present incumbent school board members who are seeking re-election, Dr. Arthur Carin and Howard Jankowitz. These men in our opinion served the community capably, diligently and with dedication. To continue them in office for another term serves the best interests of Jericho residents.

### Second Grader Wins Contest

Lynne Margot Rosenbaum, aged 8, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Steve Rosenbaum of 11 Runam Ave., Jericho is the first child in the Jericho School System to have an original poem read on "The Magic of Words" program on Educational Television.

Lynne, who attends the Cantiague school is a pupil in Miss McKenna's second grade class. Miss McKenna submitted Lynne's poem entitled Books which was read by Mr. John Robbins last week on Channel 13.

At a board of directors' meeting of the Birchwood Civic Assoc., Dr. Arthur Carin and Howard Jankowitz were unanimously endorsed for re-election to the Board of Education posts they now hold.

Dr. Carin and Jankowitz have been active, as members of the present school board, in a program to upgrade the educational standards of the community. Under their guiding hand, our schools have been experiencing a new birth of substantial growth. New math and physics programs have been instituted as well as a series of new enrichment programs and an expansion of the old. Most significant is the revision of teachers salary schedules. These new schedules enable our schools to attract better and more experienced teachers. This program is already producing results and several excellent people have been added to the staff.

Notwithstanding the increase of educational facilities, expansion of the quality of courses and services, and supplying the means to attract better teachers, Dr. Carin and Mr. Jankowitz have worked to keep the school budget within reason.

These men made significant contribution in seeing that the Jericho tax dollar stretches as far as it can possibly go. While the tax rates of surrounding communities have soared, the Jericho tax increase is small. In light of the fact that almost half of the tax increase has already been approved by the community for the new High School extension and a small sum is for the new teacher recruitment program, the actual increase is relatively insignificant.

Jankowitz is a past chairman of the West Birchwood Education Committee, past member of the Board of Directors of the West Birchwood Civic Assoc., former teacher and a successful businessman. Two of his children now attend our Jericho schools.

Dr. Carin, current President of the Board of Education, is an eminent educator and a consultant in this field. He is Director of Elementary Education at Queens College. Dr. Carin's children also attend the Jericho schools.

Both of these men have devoted a tremendous amount of time to their non-salaried positions as members of the Board of Education. Your Civic Association feels that it is necessary that they be re-elected in order to insure the continuity of their programs to expand and enrich our children's education.

### 2 Candidates Decline Invite

School Board candidates Mario Della Vecchia and Francis Walsh have refused to meet with representatives of your West Birchwood Education Committee to discuss their reasons for running for the Jericho School Board.

Mr. Della Vecchia after being invited by letter and phone to discuss his qualifications and views on school matters, responded that "I have not yet been asked to run, and therefore have no comment to make." Since filing his application for the School Board, Mr. Della Vecchia has not seen fit to act upon the Education Committee's invitation.

Mr. Walsh advised that his time was fully accounted for and would not be available for such discussions until the Joint P.T.A. "Meet Your Candidates" meeting, April 29th at the Jericho High School.

Open invitations to all potential School Board candidates to meet with your Education Committee have been published in this paper for some many weeks. Due to Mr. Della Vecchia's and Mr. Walsh's failure to accept this invitation, your Education Committee is unable to comment or evaluate their qualifications for Board positions.

## Citizens Back Two Candidates

## Approve Revised Math Program

Citizens for Better Education unanimously endorsed Dr. Arthur H. Carin and Howard Jankowitz for election to the Board of Education at its meeting on April 21. The organization also approved by acclamation the proposed budget for the 1964-65 school year, after a full discussion by Dr. Thomas F. Carey, superintendent of Jericho schools.

The selection of Dr. Carin and Jankowitz followed a very extensive report on all known candidates by C.B.E.'s candidate selection committee. The report gave detailed information as to each candidate, covering as much as possible of his education and background; his work and professional activities; his membership in clubs and organizations, particularly those which have been concerned with Jericho affairs; his past activities in the field of education, and especially education in Jericho his knowledge of the Jericho schools, and his beliefs as to the strengths and weaknesses of the school system; the things he would do and the policies he would follow if elected to the school board; and any other reasons that motivated him to become a candidate.

The candidates reported on were Dr. Carin, Jankowitz, Louis Kaplan, Mario Della Vecchia and Dr. Aaron Finerman. All of them had been interviewed except Mr. Della Vecchia, who did not accept the committee's invitations. However, sufficient information about Mr. Della Vecchia was available by reason of his candidacy last year. The committee expressed its special concern because of Mr. Della Vecchia's announced position, stated at last year's Meet Your Candidates meeting, that if elected to the Board, he would feel free to ban on political grounds, books selected by the school administration for library and textbook use. Dr. Finerman informed C.B.E. that after studying the qualifications of Dr. Carin and Mr. Jankowitz, he was withdrawing his candidacy and would support them instead. A sixth candidate, Francis Walsh, did not indicate he would run until April 22nd, the last day for filing nominating petitions. Mr. Walsh has since refused to be interviewed.

The C.B.E. committee's report recommended support of Dr. Carin, President of the Board of Education, and Mr. Jankowitz, a member of the Board, as the best qualified and most experienced candidates. It discussed in detail the work they have been doing on the Board, which has resulted in considerable improvements in Jericho education, while keeping the tax rate down. It concluded that they could be expected to continue in a good job both in terms of education and in limiting expense in the future.

On April 16, the Jericho, Board of Education approved Superintendent Dr. Thomas F. Carey's proposal to revise the math courses, and after careful consideration presented the plan to the Board.

Dr. Carey further reported on the success in obtaining experienced teachers for the 1964-1965 school year. The Board appointed 10 teachers whose applications Dr. Carey has submitted to the Board for approval. Dr. Carey stated that all 10 applicants had been seen in a classroom situation and interviewed by the staff. They are all experienced. Dr. Carey further stated that the district has been successful in obtaining experienced teachers in critical areas and the district has attracted very competent help as a result of a vigorous recruiting drive undertaken by the administration and the staff.

The Board of Education accepted the report of the "Citizens Advisory Committee on School Community Relations" and the Board expressed its thanks and appreciation for the comprehensiveness and preciseness of its findings.

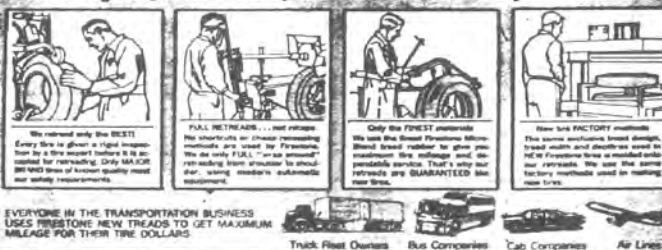

## AMENDMENTS TO THE HICKSVILLE PARKING ORDINANCE

RESOLVED, that the Ordinance regulating parking in the hamlet of Hicksville, Town of Oyster Bay, adopted October 19, 1948, be and it hereby is amended as follows:

Section 1E subdivision 2 shall be RESCINDED.

2. West Cherry Street - south side - One Hour Parking 8 AM to 6 PM Except Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays - starting at the west side of Jerusalem Avenue, west for a distance of 120 feet.

Section 2 subdivision 12 shall be RESCINDED.

12. West Cherry Street - south side - No Standing 8 AM to 4 PM School days - from the west curb line of Jerusalem Avenue, west for a distance of 75 feet.

Section 9C shall be amended by adding subdivision 46 to read as follows: NO STOPPING.

46. West Barclay Street - north side - No Stopping - starting at the west curb line of Jerusalem Avenue, west for a distance of 100 feet.

Section 11B shall be amended by adding subdivisions 59, 60 and 61 to read as follows: NO STOPPING HERE TO CORNER.

59. Flower Street - north side - No Stopping Here To Corner - starting at the east curb line of Monroe Avenue, east for a distance of 25 feet.

60. Monroe Street - east side - No Stopping Here To Corner - starting at the south curb line of Flower Street, south for a distance of 25 feet.

61. Monroe Street - east side - No Stopping Here To Corner - starting at the north curb line of Flower Street, north for a distance of 25 feet.

Section 17B subdivision 117 shall be RESCINDED.

117. Woodland Avenue - Stop-traffic approaching west-bound on Colony Street shall come to a full stop.

Section 17B shall be amended by adding subdivisions 341, 342 and 343 to read as follows: STOP.

341. Cortland Avenue - Stop-traffic approaching east and west on Genesee Street shall come to a full stop.

342. Dean Street - Stop-traffic approaching eastbound on Jay Street shall come to a full stop.

343. Colony Street - Stop-traffic approaching north and south on Ketchum Road shall come to a full stop.

Section 33 subdivision 4 shall be RESCINDED.

4. West Marie Street - north side - No Stopping 7 AM to 9 AM Except Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays - starting at the west curb line of Broadway, west to the east curb line of Jerusalem Avenue.

Section 33 shall be amended by adding subdivision 5 to read as follows: NO STOPPING 7 AM to 9 AM EXCEPT SATURDAYS, SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS.

5. West Marie Street - north side - No Stopping 7 AM to 9 AM Except Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays - starting at a point 65 feet west of the west curb line of Broadway, west to the east curb line of Jerusalem Avenue.

Section 36 subdivision 2 shall be RESCINDED.

2. West Barclay Street - north side - Two Hour Parking 8 AM to 4 PM Except Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays - starting at the west curb line of Jerusalem Avenue, west to the east curb line of Marion Place.

## Urge Yes Vote On Adjust Postal Syosset Budget Service May 4

by Ralph Diamond

The Birchwood Civic Assoc. Board of Directors after a careful review and analysis of this year's Syosset School budget voted approval of the budget despite an increase of \$1.08 per \$100 of assessment. This will be the highest single year increase in the history of the school. Nevertheless, the civic board, after a great deal of debate, voted approval because of the following reasons:

a) Actually 30% of the total increase of \$1.08 is really not an increase over last year's budget. This 30% already existed in last year's budget but we did not have to pay it last year because the proceeds of the school land sale in Birchwood were used to offset that increase.

b) The amount of State aid received last year was less than was anticipated when that year's budget was approved. By a freak situation our school district and three other districts in the entire State. This resulted in a shortage of 20% of the \$1.08 increase which monies must be made up in this year's budget.

c) 33% of the increase are mandatory increases over which the school board has no discretion. These cover such items as automatic increases to the teachers, debt service, interest on bonds, pensions, social security etc.

d) The balance of the increase namely 25% revolves mainly around additional teachers and an increase in teacher's salary. We need 13 additional teachers despite an increase of only 158 students. These additional teachers are necessary because our school district is getting older and more students are entering the secondary school level. It is basic knowledge that it is more costly to educate a student in high school than in elementary school. This is a situation which we will have to learn to live with for a great many years to come. In addition, the budget calls for an additional guidance counselor and a librarian.

The only real source of possibly cutting the increase in this year's budget was the across the board increase of \$200 to each teacher. The civic association board of directors despite its great desire to hold the line on school taxes had to concede that the school board was justified in its decision to grant

... thus enabling it to the increase. ... compete with our surrounding school districts. In many of the steps Syosset was below the salaries paid in surrounding districts. For example, the salaries paid to the teachers in Jericho are in general higher than the salaries paid to those in Syosset.

In summary, 83% of the increase is mandatory based upon the reasons stated above. The balance of 25% is discretionary, however a large portion of this increase resulted from the necessity of hiring 13 additional teachers. The only major discretionary item in the budget concerns the salary increase to the teachers. While the civic association strongly opposes the annual method of basing salary increases on a comparison of surrounding school districts it recognizes the fact that the Syosset School District acting alone cannot solve this problem. No one is happy with a budget increase, nevertheless, no valid argument can be made against it and therefore a yes vote is the only proper vote.

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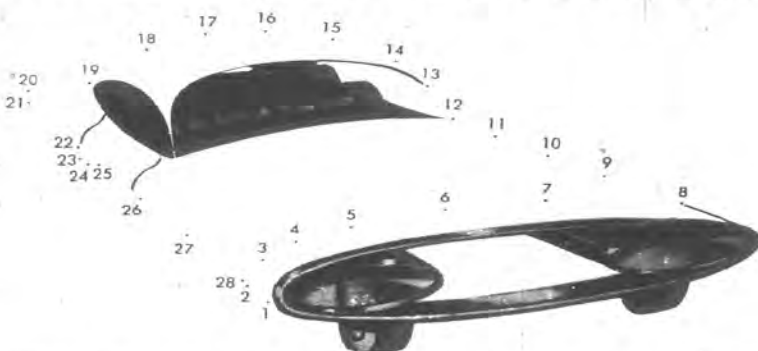

## USES Activities Draw Complaints

Mounting complaints in Congress about the expansion of U. S. Employment Service activities are reflected in a bill by Rep. Taft (R-Ohio) which would ban the agency's current placement program on college campuses.

Under the program, USES offers to help find jobs for new graduates, thereby becoming a federal middleman between prospective employers and employees.

Rep. Taft said the program (which he called an "Ivy League recruitment service") conflicts with the traditional USES function of serving the jobless worker.

"It is just one example of a bureaucracy mushrooming into an area that should be handled by the colleges themselves, by employers, and by private employment services," Mr. Taft said.

He added that any hearing on the bill should also take up the broad issue of the agency's "proper scope."

NOTICE OF ANNUAL ELECTION AND VOTE ON APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS BY THE VOTERS OF UNION FREE SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 17 (HICKSVILLE) LOCATED IN THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, NASSAU COUNTY, NEW YORK.

NOTICE is HEREBY GIVEN to the qualified voters of the Hicksville School District, officially known as Union Free School District No. 17, Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, that, pursuant to Section 2017 of the Education Law, the Annual Election of Members of the Board of Education of said Union Free School District No. 17 and of Trustees of the Hicksville Free Public Library, and the vote upon the appropriation of the necessary funds to meet the estimated expenditures, for school purposes for the school year 1964-65 and upon such other propositions and/or resolutions as may be lawfully presented, will be held on Wednesday, May 6, 1964 in the schoolhouse, hereinafter designated, located in the seven (7) election districts hereinafter respectively designated, during the hours from 12:00 Noon to 9 P.M. (prevailing time), and that on said date, in said schoolhouses and during said hours the qualified voters of said School District will vote upon:

(a) Candidates to fill two (2) vacancies on the Board of Education caused by the expiration on June 30, 1964 of the terms of office as members of said Board of Education of George A. Jackson and F. D. Sabatella (resigned Oct. 31, 1963) respectively. The successful candidates for each of the vacancies shall be elected for a full three (3) years.

(b) Candidates to fill one (1) vacancy on the Board of Trustees of the Hicksville Free Public Library, within said School District, for a full term of five (5) years caused by the expiration on June 30, 1964 of the term of office of Ruth Aaron.

(c) The appropriation of the necessary funds to meet the estimated expenditures of the School District for the 1964-65 school year for school purposes.

(d) The appropriation of the necessary funds to meet the estimated expenditures of the Hicksville Free Public Library for the period July 1, 1964 to June 30, 1965.

(e) Any and all other propositions, questions or resolutions which may be lawfully placed upon the ballot.

NOTICE IS HEREBY ALSO GIVEN that a copy of the text of each and every resolution and proposition to be voted upon and of the detailed statement in writing of the estimated expenditures which will be required for the ensuing 1964-65 school year for school purposes, specifying the several purposes and the amount for each, which said resolution and propositions and statement will be voted upon on Wednesday, May 6, 1964, may be obtained by any taxpayer in the District

at the office of the Principal in each schoolhouse in the District in which school is maintained, during the hours from 9 AM to 4 PM (prevailing time) on each day other than Saturday, Sunday or holidays during the seven (7) days preceding May 6, 1964.

**NOMINATING PETITIONS.**  
TAKE FURTHER NOTICE that all nominating petitions of candidates for the Office of Member of the Board of Education, and for the Office of Trustee of the Hicksville Free Public Library must be filed with the District Clerk whose office is at the Administration Building, Newbridge Road, Hicksville, New York, on or before Wednesday April 22, 1964. Each petition shall be directed to the Clerk of Union Free School District No. 17; shall be signed by at least twenty-five (25) qualified voters of the District; shall state the residence of each signer, the name and residence of the candidate, and shall describe the specific vacancy on the Board of Education (or in the case of the Library Trustees, on the Board of Trustees) for which the candidate is nominated, which description shall include at least the length of the term of office and the name of the last incumbent. A separate petition to nominate a candidate shall be required to nominate each candidate for each office. Petition forms may be obtained from the District Clerk.

**ELECTION DISTRICTS.**  
NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that for the purpose of voting on May 6, 1964, and at subsequent meetings or elections, the Board of Education has heretofore divided the School District into the following election districts:

Election District No. 1  
Burns Avenue School  
On the East: Broadway, from the District's North line, to the intersection Jerusalem Avenue and Broadway; continuing South along Jerusalem Avenue to the intersection of Jerusalem Avenue and the Long Island Railroad.

On the South: The Long Island Railroad, from Jerusalem Avenue to the District's West line.  
On the West: The District's West line from the Long Island Railroad to the District's North line.  
On the North: The District's North line from the District's West line to Broadway.

Election District No. 2  
East Street School  
On the East and North: Miller Road, as projected to the District's North line, South along said Miller Road to Ronald Avenue; then East along Ronald Avenue to Woodbury Road; then Northeast along Woodbury Road to Ardley Gate; then Southeast through Ardley Gate to Dartmouth Drive; then Southwest and South through Dartmouth Drive to its intersection with Haverford Road; then East to the intersection of Haverford Road and Berkshire Road; then East along Berkshire Road to its intersection with Columbia Road; then East along Columbia Road to the District's East line; then South along the District's East line to the Long Island Railroad.

On the South and Southwest: along the Long Island Railroad, from the District's East line southerly point, to the intersection of the Long Island Railroad and Jerusalem Avenue.

On the West: Broadway, from Jerusalem Avenue to the District's North line.  
On the North: The District's North line from Broadway to Miller Road, as projected to said line.

Election District No. 3  
Woodland Avenue School  
On the North: Northeast and East along the District's North line, from Miller Road, as projected to the District's North line, to the District's East line.

On the East: South along the District's East line, from the District's North line, to Columbia Road.

On the South and West: Columbia Road, from the District's East line, West to Berkshire Road; then West along Berkshire Road into Haverford Road, and continuing West on Haverford Road to Dartmouth Road; then North and Northeast along

Dartmouth Road to Ardley Gate; then Northwest through Ardley Gate to Woodbury Road; then Southwest along Woodbury Road to Ronald Avenue; then West along Ronald Avenue to Miller Road; then North along Miller Road and continuing thereon as it is projected, to the District's North line.

Election District No. 4  
Lee Avenue School  
On the East-Northeast: The Long Island Railroad, from its intersection with Old Country Road, to the Southerly point of the District's East line.

On the South: The District's South line, from the Long Island Railroad, Southwesterly into Michigan Drive, then South along said District line to the Hempstead Township line; then Northwesterly along the District's South line to Jerusalem Avenue.  
On the West and North: Along Jerusalem Avenue, from the District's South line, to Salem Gate; then West along Salem Gate, to Salem Road; then North to Harkin Lane; then Northwest along Harkin Lane to Division Avenue; then Northwesterly along Division Avenue to Glenbrook Road; then Northwest along Glenbrook Road to Newbridge Road; then Northwest along Newbridge Road to Old Country Road; then East along Old Country Road to the Long Island Railroad.

Election District No. 5  
Fork Lane School  
On the East: Jerusalem Avenue from Salem Gate, to the District's South line.

On the North: Salem Gate, West from Jerusalem Avenue to Salem Road; then North along Salem Road to Harkin Lane; then Northwest along Harkin Lane to Division Avenue; then Northwesterly along Division Avenue to Glenbrook Road; then West along Glenbrook Road to Newbridge Road.

On the West: Newbridge Road, from Glenbrook Road on the North, to the District's South line.  
On the South: The District's South line, from Newbridge Road, on the West, to Jerusalem Avenue on the East.

Election District No. 6  
Dutch Lane School  
On the East: Newbridge Road, from Elmira Street, to the District's South line.

On the South: The District's South line, from Newbridge Road, on the East, to the District's West line.

On the West: The District's West line, from the District's South line, to Arrow Lane, as said lane is projected West to the District's West line.

On the North: From Arrow Lane (as projected to the District's West line) East and along said Arrow Lane, to Levittown Parkway; then South along Levittown Parkway to Beech Lane; then East along Beech Lane to Blueberry Lane; then South along Blueberry Lane to Elmira Street; then East along Elmira Street to Newbridge Road.

Election District No. 7  
Old Country Road School

On the North and Northeast: The Long Island Railroad, from the District's West line to the intersection of the Railroad with Old Country Road.

On the South and East: Old Country Road, from its intersection with the Long Island Railroad, westerly to Newbridge Road; then Southwest along Newbridge Road to Elmira Street; then West along Elmira Street to Blueberry Lane; then North along Blueberry Lane to Beech Lane; then West along Beech Lane to Levittown Parkway, then North along Levittown Parkway to Arrow Lane; then West along Arrow Lane, and as projected to the District's West line to the District's said West line.

On the West: The District's West line from Arrow Lane as projected West to said District's West line, North to Long Island Railroad.
