Budgets Passed In Light Vote:

Seeking Recount Of School Voting

A formal request for a recount in the Hicksville School District vote on the school and library budgets and election of trustees was filed, Wednesday night. The last previous request for such action took place about ten years ago. In the relatively light voting this week, the voters approved both the school and library budgets by thin margins. Only 3900 out of 6600 registered cast their ballots.

The election was seen as a sharp rebuke to School Board member William A. Bruno Jr. His three personally sponsored candidates were rejected at the polls.

Only a little more than half the registered and qualified voters cast their ballots on Wednesday in Hicksville District. George A. Jackson, incumbent member completing his first three-year term, was re-elected by 2,606 votes to 1,002 for George M. Martin making his third unsuccessful bid for election in the district.

Caleb Hornbostel, an architect strongly supported by TEACH, noosed out John J. McManus Jr. by a narrow 46-vote margin. Hornbostel was elected to fill the vacancy on the Board open since last October when D. F. Sabatella resigned. It is anticipated the Board may soon appoint Hornbostel to fill the remaining weeks of Sabatella's term before starting his elected term which normally commences on July 1. He received 1,669 votes and McManus 1623. Harry M. Wagner, in his second unsuccessful effort to get elected, received 483 ballots.

Ruth Aaron was elected for a full-five-year term to the Hicksville Board of Library Trustees. She had been appointed previously to fill a vacancy. A school teacher in Suffolk County, she received 2,233 votes. Maxine Carson collected 1,157 ballots.

It was generally known that Martin, Wagner and Mrs. Carson were personally strongly opposed by Bruno in a bid for support of his views on the school and library boards.

Voting upon the school budget was the closest in recent years. There were 1,855 votes in favor and 1,635 opposed.

The margin for approval of the public library budget was even closer. There were 1,767 votes in favor and 1,698 opposed, a margin of 69 votes.

Acting upon the request for a recount of the tallies, the School District has had all 14 voting machines retained in sealed position pending the decision of the Board of Education regarding the request from 12 residents.

It was learned that the recount is sought because of a difference between the unofficial tally collected by interested voters and the official score as announced at the public meeting in the senior high school, Wednesday night.

Plan To Recheck Voting Tally

BULLETIN - All candidates in the May 6 election will be invited to name representatives who, with district officials, will recheck the tally of the election against the voting machines at the County Board of elections, probably some day during the coming week. Candidates will be addressed of the date scheduled.

Jericho school district voters approved the annual district budget this week with 1,368 in favor and 681 opposed. The Syosset School District budget was among the few on Long Island rejected.

Dr. Arthur Carlin was re-elected to the school board with 1,462 votes. His opponent, Frank Walsh, received 847 votes.

Also elected was Howard Janowitz with 1,276 ballots. He was opposed by Louis Kaplan with 152, and Marie Della Vecchia with 94.
