The people of the Town of Oyster Bay Pearsall Urges Action, Not Words

Expressing his concern over defense work layoffs in the Town of Oyster Bay, C. Bruce Pearsall, Town Republican leader, this week called on his Democratic counterpart Harold Fertig of Syosset, to "use your good offices to influence the members of your Party...to convince the national administration to channel" work into the area.

Pearsall in his letter called the move necessary "to prevent a further rise in unemployment". He suggested that the Democratic leader contact County Executive Nickerson and Oyster Bay Supervisor Perito, both Democrats. Pearsall said there was fear about the national administration's policy of cutting back on work "in this area and assigning the work to other sections of the country, such as Massachusetts and Texas."

He said the awards are being made "despite the large and experienced pool of engineers, technicians and scientists available on Long Island."

Pearsall recalled the Oyster Bay Supervisor's recent expression of concern about the problem. "However," he said in his letter to Fertig, "when the national administration emanates and initiates a policy that results in the removal of defense work from plants in Nassau and the Town of Oyster Bay, it is difficult for the average citizen to understand how members of the same party can say one thing and do another."

What Superintendent Forgot to Remember.

Is this new position being created in order that Hicksville may enjoy a more favorable press, or a better image, or is it being considered so that Mr. Abt's image may be improved upon?
