Main Line Trains Run Overhead

The 8:15 a.m. train out of Jamaica, bound for Ronkonkoma, was due to stop at the new elevated Hicksville Rail Road Station platform at 8:40 a.m. yesterday (Wed.). It was to be the first passenger train to cross the viaduct spanning local grade crossings. A westbound train was due to stop at 4:44 p.m. to become the first Main Liner on that track.

It will not be until September or October that trains on the Port Jefferson branch will also be up on the elevated tracks and the entire crossing elimination will not be finished until sometime in November. This will include the removal of all temporary tracks, crossing gates, temporary waiting room and platforms.

The running of the Main Line trains on the three-mile elevated structure is a major step in the \$12.6 million project which was begun with contract execution in November 1961. Actually, the

community has been awaiting this day for more than 40 years. During the past decade the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with the Town of Oyster Bay and legislative representatives in Albany has actively progressed the project.

Headrickson Bros. Inc. won the general contract at \$9,136,412. In addition, new signal and high tension electric systems are being installed by the rail road at a cost of \$3,485,000.

The LIRR announced Monday that the new waiting room and ticket booth for the station would go in service this week in addition to the temporary waiting room.

Town Councilman A. Carl Grunewald told the HERALD that assessments of the new escalator taxing district are now being developed prior to the installation of moving stairs to carry passengers up to the twin platforms serving three tracks.

To Exchange Documents In Teachers' Grievances

The master of the "teacher grievances" in Hicksville Schools may never come to a full scale hearing in accordance with a revised procedure adopted by a 5 to 2 vote at the Board of Education meeting, Friday night.

All interested parties are to serve on all parties and the Board of Education affidavits and briefs by July 10 with all reply affidavits and briefs to be served and filed on or before July 17, under the terms of the resolution adopted, and the Board shall make "a determination as expeditiously as possible thereafter". All members voted in favor except William A. Bruno Jr. and Cornelius McCormack.

Bruno offered an amendment that a public hearing be held on Monday, June 29, on the "grievances" which was seconded by McCormack. George Kunz, Herbert Johnson, Irving Lawrence, Caleb Caleb Hornbostel and George A. Jackson

voted no on this proposal.

A motion by McCormack that the Board hear the formal grievances in executive session with the dept head, principal, school superintendent and Board members present, lost for lack of a second.

Public Schools Reopen Sept 10

Hicksville Public Schools will open for the fall term on Sept. 10, following orientation day for teachers on Sept. 9, under a calendar for the school year adopted by the Board of Education, Friday night. It provides for 183 days of class sessions and three conference days. The winter recess of Feb 23 to 26 is deleted in 1965; however the Easter recess is extended to include Apr 29 and 30 and May 27 and 28 are included as school holidays.

The vote on the calendar was 4 to 2.

The Catholic Diocese of Rockville Centre announces that parochial schools in the area will resume classes for the fall term on Sept. 9.

The annual reorganization meeting of the Hicksville Board of Education, when officers of the Board and district officials for the fiscal year are elected, will take place next Tuesday night, July 7, at 8:15 PM in the Teachers' Cafeteria of the Senior High School. Scheduled to be elected are the President, Vice President and Secretary of the Board; as well as the School District Clerk, Treasurer, Auditor and School Attorney.

No formal ceremonies were scheduled for Wednesday morning of this week when the first passenger train was due to arrive from Jamaica at the elevated RR station at 8:40 in the morning. There probably were no ceremonies either when the first LIRR engine puffed and wheezed into Hicksville in 1837. The big ceremonies will come the final completion of the job, about October or November. Incidentally, the state Dept of Public Works (which never before has been vocal as it has been about this event) states the New York City-bound passengers will not be able to board trains at the new station until Thursday morning (today). The color scheme of the station and platform was the choice of commuters who voted in a LIRR poll some months back. About 200 votes were cast. The temporary tracks have been carrying 92 passenger trains a day around the construction. With the main line overhead, the number of times a day that the gates are lowered will be materially reduced. The Grievances

The matter of grievances by a group of Hicksville teachers has attracted widespread interest in the community although it is generally not understood by many who are publicly wringing their hands and viewing with alarm. The entire matter is somewhat complex, has been the subject of numerous stages of review and an appeal to the Supreme Court in Nassau County (where a petition was denied).

Since at various points in the past six months or so the topic has been discussed by the Hicksville Board of Education in executive or closed committee sessions, even persons who have attended all public meetings have difficulty in unwinding the tangle. A basic question at this point appears to be the one as to whether a group grievance may properly be entertained.

School Superintendent Donald F. Aht on March 10 in a memorandum to Paul Dana and Raymond Matienzo, two of the teachers active in the grievance complaint, asserted that the Policy on Grievance Procedure adopted by the Board of Education made no provision for group grievance.

And while he found the group grievance and some individual grievances filed improper and in violation of the Board policy on procedure, he felt the complaints submitted should not be put aside for "technical reasons." Therefore, I have proceeded to hear the complaints by inviting each complainant to my office in an effort to seek objective substantiation on what I prefer to call a general complaint and individual complaints pertaining to Dr. Rouse" (Dept. Supervisor).

"In the discussions I held with each complainant it became quite obvious that although each complainant agreed with some part of the general complaint, he could not agree with the entire list of complaints. I can understand this, since the general complaint seems to be a summary of individual complaints which are not the same, except that each complains about Dr. Rouse. Also, some letters (in the complaint file) seem to have been written in sympathy for what some complainants thought was happening to a colleague."

Further on, Aht added: "I would like your group to understand that the supervisor is responsible under my direction for the development of curriculum within his discipline area. He is also responsible for helping to evaluate teachers' content mastery and their pedagogy."

"I remind the complainants that this (superintendent's) office recognizes no intrinsic organization or titles that seem to have evolved in the English Dept. with the development of teaching. The principal is recognized as the authority of the building. The supervisor is recognized as the final word in content mastery and pedagogy. The head of dept. works under the authority of the principal and supervisor. The supervisor submits his opinion to the principal of the school as does the head of dept. The principal, and only the principal, makes a final decision on the teachers."

Twenty-one days later, on Mar. 31 in a letter dated Mar. 26 Aht was advised by Richard Peilicane, Jamaica attorney, that he had been retained by a group of teachers regarding the grievance. He went on to demand that Aht hold a hearing for the entire group grievance.

On April 8th Carl Dana, one of the teachers involved, petitioned in Supreme Court declaring that on Jan. 18 of this year 18 teachers (later changed to 20) other English teachers presented a group grievance to Viola Mulligan, English Dept. head. On Feb. 7, because the decision of the immediate supervisor "was not satisfactory," the group went to Leon J. Galloway, principal of the Senior High School. Then on Feb. 26, because the decision of the principal "was not satisfactory," the group went to School Superintendent Aht.

Dana's petition asked the court to recognize the "group grievance." On April 30, Supreme Court Justice William R. Brennan Jr. ruled "the application (for group grievance) is denied and the petition is dismissed."

Justice Brennan noted: "the proceeding is brought by an individual teacher in Hicksville Senior High School for an order directing the Superintendent of Schools in the Hicksville School District to hear and determine a group grievance previously submitted by teachers of the English Dept. of the High School. There is no allegation that the petitioner is authorized to act for anyone else or that this proceeding was instituted by him in a representative capacity. He states no case for individual relief. It is unnecessary and would be improper to determine in this proceeding any rights other than his own. Moreover, the papers do not establish that the named respondent has failed to perform a duty enjoined upon him by law. The papers would indicate that up to this point there has been a compliance with Subdivisions 2 and 3 of Section 604 of the General Municipal Law with reference to the petitioner's grievance."

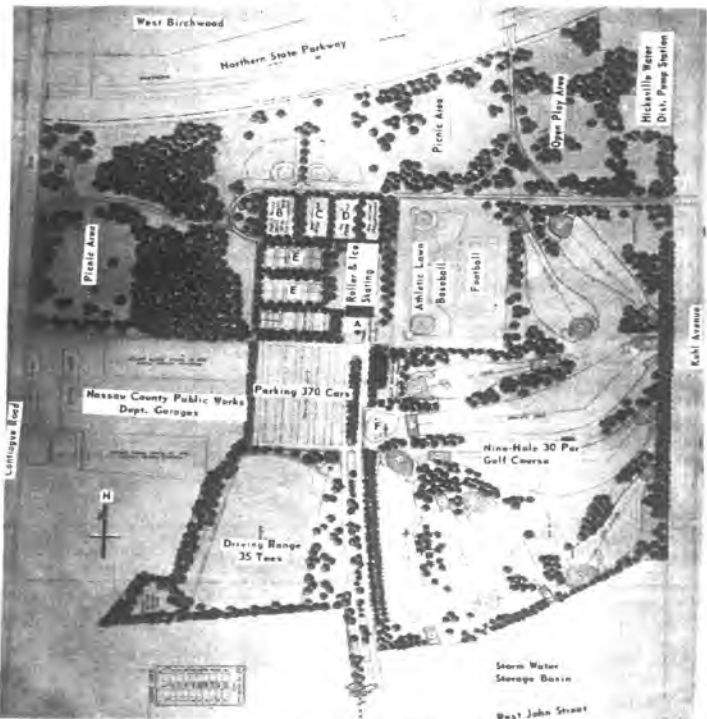
Among the individual Board members there has been some difference of opinion as to whether the Board (a) has before it a formal request for hearing or reviewing a group grievance, (b) whether such a hearing or inquiry should be conducted by the Board of Education or by a committee of the Board or by a committee of representative citizens named as a kind of appeal board, (c) whether such a hearing or inquiry should be conducted in open session or behind closed doors in executive session since the names and possibly the careers of individuals may be involved.

At the regular Board meeting on June 12, the Board voted 6 to 0, with Calch Hornbostel absent due to business, to hold a public hearing or inquiry on the grievance matter of Thursday night, June 18. Other areas with quotas larger than Hicksville were East Meadow which got \$2596, Levittown \$1095, Valley Stream \$2516.20, New Hyde Park \$3179.33. The Hicksville campaign was also the county leader in 1962.

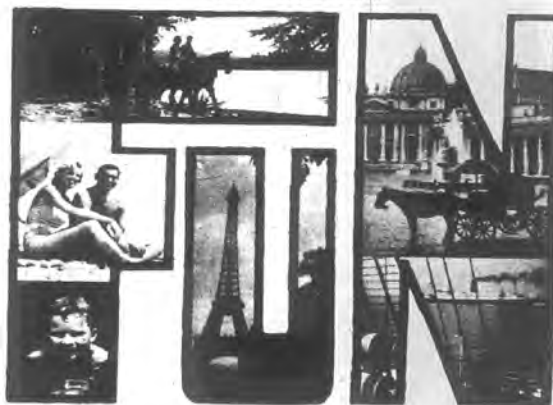

AMENDMENTS TO THE BUILDING ZONE ORDINANCE OF THE

TOWN OF OYSTER BAY

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, State of New York, that the Building Zone Ordinance of the Town of Oyster Bay, as amended and revised, be amended in the following form:

By adding thereto a section to be known as Article IV, Section B-11, Fences, to read as follows:

In Section B-11, a fence as in this ordinance defined shall not exceed two and one-half (2 1/2) feet at any point within a radius of thirty (30) feet of the corner formed by any intersecting roads or highways. The provisions hereof shall apply to hedges of other densely growing shrubbery. The permitted height thereof shall be measured from the existing elevation of the center line of such highway opposite

such fence, hedge or other densely growing shrubbery.
