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## Bike, Car, Gas Station Pumps, Tree Passenger In Critical Condition

A bicycle, automobile, gas station pumps and tree were involved in a collision at the corner of Old Country Rd. and Broadway, Hicksville, about 10 o'clock Monday morning. Only the fact that Broadway traffic was being delayed by RR crossing construction probably kept down the toll of injured to three.

The driver of the auto, Sylvia Glasser, 44, of 51 Crescent Dr., Old Bethpage, left Meadowbrook Hospital, Monday evening. Her passenger, Cell Pimaller, 40, of

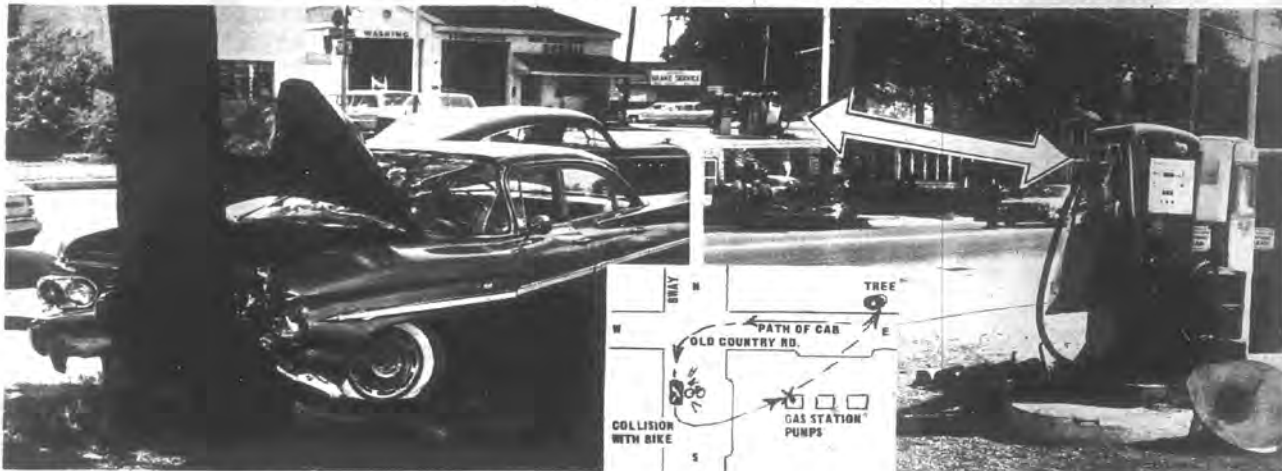
64 Crescent Dr., Old Bethpage, sustained head injuries and was on the critical list at the Hospital, Tuesday. Carl Mize, 13, of 19 Harding Ave., Hicksville, operator of the bicycle, suffered contusions of his right leg but was not hospitalized.

According to the police reports, the 1959 Chevrolet was proceeding westbound on Old Country Rd., making a left turn south on Broadway when it was in collision with the bicycle operated by Mize. The boy was

toasted off his bike.

The car raced forward on a sharp left turn across Broadway and the apron of the Gus Reidlinger Service Station, striking and demolishing a gas pump and continuing north east across Old Country Rd. to come to rest against a tree on the north side of the highway.

It was reported that Reidlinger had been checking the meters on his gas pumps just moments before the excitement.

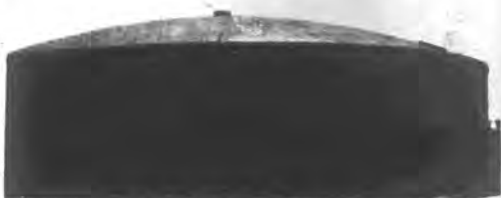

## Fire District Acquires Property on E Marie St

The Hicksville Board of Fire Commissioners have brought the former garage-service station of George Neder Jr. on E Marie St., Hicksville, adjacent to the main fire headquarters, it was learned this week and will take title shortly. The purchase was effected by the use of reserve District funds.

The garage and adjacent parking area will be used to enlarge the operating capacity of the Main fire headquarters. It will also provide off street parking for volunteer firemen answering alarms.

The completion of the LIRR grade crossings elimination program will no longer make it necessary to consider, at this time, relocation of the Main firehouse to dispatch equipment promptly, a Board spokesman indicated. There had been indications from time to time that another firehouse might some day be erected off Newbridge Rd.

STATEMENT by JOHN J. BURNS:

# \$65,000 South Shore Skeet and Trap Range Built in Path of North-South Expressway

To: MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS  
County of Nassau, New York  
Company to extend Electric

My name is John J. Burns. I reside at #166 DuBois Avenue, Sea Cliff.

I am appearing here today as a resident and taxpayer of the County of Nassau in connection with Ordinance No. 185, 1964, which today is before your Honorable body for action. I am here to alert you to certain facts which have come to my attention and which I am certain you will want to investigate before acting upon the aforesaid Ordinance, requested by the County Executive, which would authorize him to execute an agreement with the Long Island Lighting Company to extend Electric Service to the site of the Skeet and Trap Shooting Range at Wantagh. The Cost to the County of Nassau as set forth in the agreement is stated to be \$8,338. It would appear that the work has already been completed in as much as the Skeet and Trap Range opened for business in late June

1964 under terms of an Agreement with Claybirds, LTD, executed on May 19, 1964, for a three year term.

The total cost of the project to date has been conservatively estimated to have already cost the County of Nassau some \$65,000. This involved expenses incurred for road construction (requiring tons of fill); for electrical, building construction, water service, trap, skeet and combination fields, sewer and miscellaneous appurtenances. I believe this to be a conservative estimate taken from County records on file. It is my understanding, however, that all of the work was done with County Forces involving large crews on a crash program to expedite completion which conceivably thru hidden costs could have cost the County Taxpayers much more.

Now, Skeet and Trap Shooting is a fine form of recreation enjoyed by Nassau County residents; but, in spite of the substantial investment already made it appears that the program may soon have to be terminated be-

cause the RANGE must be moved. It has been constructed RIGHT IN THE MIDDLE OF THE SOUTHBOUND LANE OF THE WANTAGH-OYSTER BAY EXPRESSWAY for which bids are to be taken by the DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK this fall or early next spring.

As you well know the construction of the NORTH-SOUTH (Oyster Bay-Wantagh) EXPRESSWAY has been proceeding south from Route 25 over the past several years. The long section from Jericho Turnpike to Hempstead Turnpike is now in use. As is customary, the State is careful to keep all parties informed of its plans and programs. The Construction plans for the N/S EXPRESSWAY have been on file with the Nassau County Department of Public Works for the past several years and numerous discussions among State, County and Town officials in such connection have taken place because of the many, many municipal and private construction and facilities involved. For example, the plan for the County of Nassau to install a large sewer line in advance of the State highway construction near the Wantagh Causeway at this identical location was agreed upon so as to eliminate waste and unnecessary state and county expense.

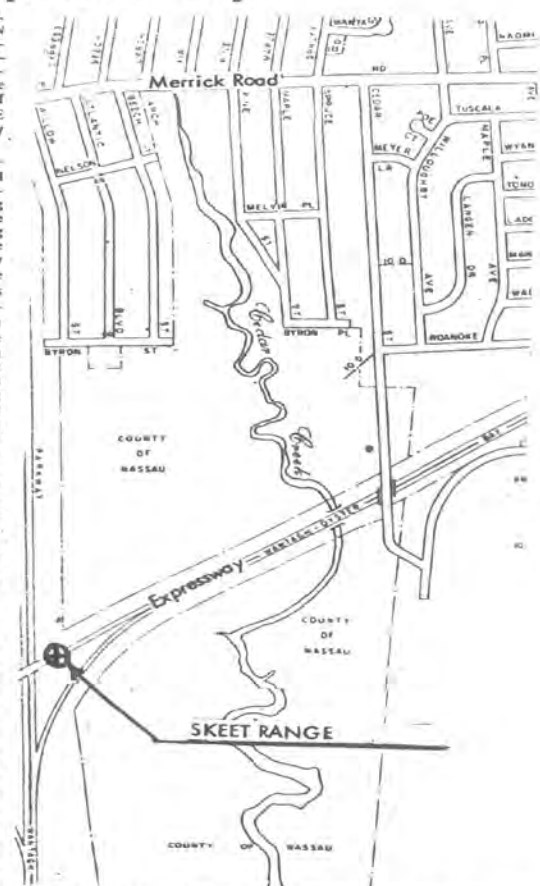
However, for some unknown reason, no inquiries were made of the N.Y. State Department of Public Works concerning the latest construction timetable but with full and complete knowledge that the road section would soon be built; with the full facts and details as to exact location, the County of Nassau, nevertheless, spent a sizeable sum for a very temporary period. It is inconceivable that this could happen! Only a telephone call, a quick visit to the Babylon office could have ascertained the exact plans of the State Department of Public Works. Had that been done, a costly error could have been avoided and thousands of taxpayers dollars wasted could have been saved.

Actually, I became interested in the project after reading about the distress caused some of the residents of the area from the powerful unshielded lights and the noise of the guns. I remembered too, the publicity given to the official opening of the Range. As usual, the County Executive was prominently identified with the project at that time.

Because I had had some conversations with Mr. Austin Saar, District Engineer, N.Y. State Department of Public Works, in the early Spring about plans for N.Y. State construction, I recalled that he informed me that one of the several projects to be undertaken this year was the southern most leg of the WANTAGH-OYSTER BAY EXPRESSWAY. I then became curious concerning the relative positions of the Expressway and the Skeet Range. I was shocked to learn that the NEW RANGE and building was in the middle of the southbound section.

Very recently, I visited with Mr. Saar in his office in Babylon and confirmed the foregoing. He indicated that at a conference held in June of this year when N.Y. State Public Works Plans were being reviewed, representatives of the Nassau County Public Works Department were specifically informed that the advertising for bids for this section of the N/S Expressway construction was imminent. Unfortunately, it seems, at this point the facility had already been nearly completed.

Quite obviously, if the RANGE is in the way it will have to be moved at additional COUNTY expense. I would strongly recommend, however, that if it is suggested that the RANGE be placed in the land further to the

south, some very careful planning be done this time to avoid later conflict with the new Sewage Disposal Plant. NOTHING must interfere with the regular and orderly construction of that plant. The necessary test borings and other engineering procedures must not be interfered with because of the presence of a Skeet and Trap Range.

Frankly, it appears to me that this project was instituted without adequate planning and programming, and actually without estimates as to the proper and worthwhile aspects of the venture from the County point of view. From early reportings of the Likens (CLAYBIRDS, LTD.) estimates of average earnings by the County of Nassau of \$100 per week (5% of Gross Receipts) would take a number of years to recoup the investment already made.

For the information and use of the members of the Board of Supervisors, I am pleased to furnish to you, herewith, a copy of a map showing the location of the Skeet Range (Exhibit A); and

several photographs showing the Range facilities presently in use. You will note on the Photo, marked Exhibit B, that a mark has been placed on the building, presumably by surveyors indicating its center road location. Interestingly enough, is a photo of a sign appearing on Merrick Road at Wantagh over the name of the County Executive which has the Wantagh-Oyster Bay Expressway proposed construction clearly indicated.

## President's Corner

During the eight years of the Villager's existence, the Birchwood Civic Association has functioned for the benefit of its residents and when requested helped their neighboring communities. We have never suggested to any other organization what to do or how to do it.

I do not intend by this article to raise a storm with West Birchwood Civic Assoc. Our relationship with them is a very fine one. I have on many occasions worked and cooperated with Arnold Winant, their president. However, on several occasions, the West Birchwood News has seen fit to criticize or advise us what to do. Their latest has been in an article by Hy Strell on the Jericho Water District.

We are not demanding a "Congressional investigation into the activities of the Board of Water Commissioners." We have discovered that each year, ours is one of the few water districts that has certain water restrictions during the summer. We have also discovered that for some reason, which has never been satisfactorily explained to us, many residents have had bills for more than double the amount for a similar period the year before.

We unlike some organizations, like to make our own investigation. We have not in the past, nor, do we ever intend to become the mouthpiece for any public group, be it the water district or the school district. I have mentioned that a committee has been formed to investigate the whys for our restricts. We will not only interview the Jericho Water District but other sources. It is easy to get facts and figures, but to get the true picture, other factors and information must be brought out. We had, at my invitation, the board of water commissioners to a board meeting. Some of the answers they gave to questions we asked as to why the water restrictions and why the large bills, were not answered to our satisfaction, as mentioned before. When we get the full picture, we will then publish, through the VILLAGER our findings.

I will appreciate other Civic groups letting us run our own organization. We have done an outstanding job for 9 years. Our membership will attest to this.

## Escalators Soon Become Fact

Jericho residents will be included in the new escalator district approved by the Board of the Town of Oyster Bay. The escalators will be installed on the Hicksville R.R. Station as soon as contracts are given out. It is estimated that based upon an average assessment of \$10,000 in Birchwood at Jericho the cost of construction will be \$1.80 per year for a total period of 5 years. It is further estimated that the cost of maintenance will be nominal.

Our Civic Association for the past three years has worked closely with Councilmen Edward J. Poulos and Carl Grunwald seeking approval of this escalator district. The escalators will be an inexpensive way of helping to make certain that Birchwood residents do not get a heart attack climbing steps to catch a train. A great deal of the credit for the creation of the escalator district goes to Lotie Stein who chaired the committee for our civic assoc.

## Drainage For Miller Road

Town Highway Superintendent Norman T. Wolf has ordered the contractor to proceed with the construction of storm water drainage on Miller Road south of Marlowe Drive, Hicksville, in the Locust Grove area. The contractor, Vinor Corp. of Huntington, was directed to start work on or about Aug. 10th and to complete the job by Nov. 6. Vinor was lowest among nine bidders for the job. Bid price was \$28,429.

In addition to draining Miller Road in this area, the system will relieve the recharge basin on the north side of Northern State Parkway at Miller Road. Storm waters will be piped under the Parkway and under the Long Island Rail Road tracks to another recharge basin at the intersection of the Parkway on the south side of the railroad. A pipe line will also be laid to take storm water from McCarty's Lane and Woodbine Lane.

## Operation VFW

Recent news that Pinelawn National Cemetery was running out of space for veterans graves and the fact that it could close within the next ten years took veterans organizations on Long Island by surprise. Delegates to the V.F.W. Nassau County Council reported to their respective Posts the grave concern the county council viewed this news.

Pinelawn National Cemetery covers 364 acres and approximately 264 of them have been filled. Averaging one funeral every ten minutes for a total of 38-a-day burial space for veterans and their families could be exhausted within a few years.

First legislative action to correct this came in the form of a bill S-3000 introduced by Senator Harrison Williams of New Jersey. The bill would provide for the administration and care and maintenance of the National Cemetery System and expansion and other purposes.

There are now in existence not one but five different cemeterial systems in this country. Senator Williams bill would consolidate two of these systems. It would merge the Veterans Administration Cemetery System and the National Cemetery System under jurisdiction of the Army. Control would be placed under the Administrator of Veterans Affairs, Veterans Administration.

Francis W. Stover, VFW Director, National Legislative Service, in a letter to Senator Williams approved of the plan and assured him his proposal would be brought to the attention of the delegates at the annual national convention held in Cleveland this month.

Beginning with 1890, eligibility for burial in national cemeteries has steadily expanded to include spouses, widows, widowers and minor children, not only of war-time veterans but also veterans of peacetime and their dependents. During this same period from 1890 until now only 17 national cemeteries have opened. The eligible veterans have increased from 1.3 million to 22.5 million and these figures do not include those on active duty.

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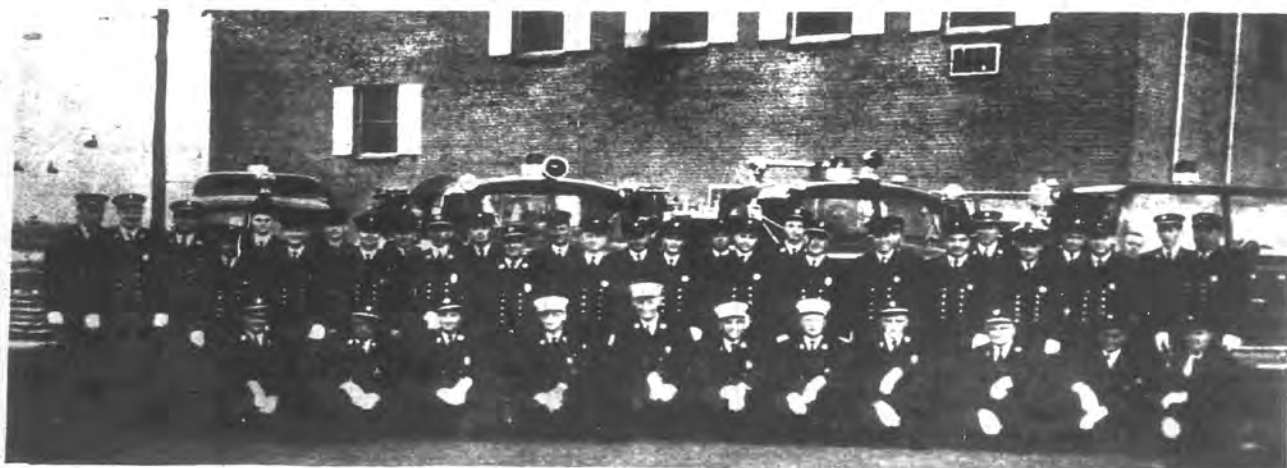
