New 5 Yr Contract For School Super

The Hicksville Board of Education this week voted to give Donald F. Abt., Superintendent of Hicksville Schools, a new five-year contract ranging from \$23,000 to \$26,000 annually. His current contract had two years to go.

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Six members of the Board voted in favor of the new contract while one member abstained.

William A. Bruno Jr., who abstained in the voting, spent about 15 minutes in a monologue denouncing Abt. and what he described as a "blossoming bureaucracy".

There was relatively little public discussion on the new contract. An executive session, presumably on this subject, was held prior to the regular meeting last Friday night and the start of the regular session was delayed about a half hour.

Park at Hicksville Issue in Campaign

John J. Burns, Republican candidate for Nassau County Executive on Monday morning called on Democrat County Executive Nickerson to stop "guesstwork

planning" in the construction of Cantlague Park recreational facilities at Hicksville.

Burns asked Nickerson to disclose his plan for financing the pool complex should his proposed daily admission charges fall short of meeting the cost of amortizing the swimming facilities and operating expenses. He warned "that without a solidly based financial projection residents of the Towns and villages could be faced with the prospect of 'double taxation'".

"This would create a costly and preposterous situation," he said, "with residents being forced to pay for a swimming pool while they are already financing the operations of pools in their own Town. Certainly, this demands the sharp fiscal scrutiny of financial experts to avoid undue and unnecessary taxation."

The County Administration is paying \$418 a day interest on the Cantlague Park property for a total interest cost of almost one-half million dollars to date, it warned. The County Attorney appointed by Nickerson is contesting the Supreme Court Decision which awarded property owners \$3,828,500.00 for the 120 acre parcel.

"At these prices," Burns continued, "the only ones getting soaked are Nassau County residents who must foot the interest bill and they haven't gotten into the pool yet. I urge Mr. Nickerson to get this pool construction going and to give serious consideration to the financing of the project to make certain that a fiscally sound plan is established," Burns asserted.

President's Corner

On October 5th, at 8:00 P.M., at the Westbury High School on Jericho Tpke, the Old Westbury will hold a hearing on the application of the New York Institute of Technology, for a variance of use of premises acquired by it in Old Westbury.

We have discussed this matter more than once in this column. In the past it was pointed out very clearly how the granting of this kind of application would increase our taxes and cause other town costs to rise. Of course, all of these increased costs would have to be borne without any benefit to the community. The New York Institute has refused to tender any monies or facilities in mitigation of the additional living expenses which will be caused by its presence. Govt to Keep Brookville Land

At the Jericho Board of Education meeting Sept. 24, Dr. Thomas B. Carey, Superintendent of Schools, reported to the Board that the US government has decided to retain the 40 acre site on Brookville Road but would probably transfer a seven acre site on Cedar Swamp Road to the school district. A cost estimate will be made by the architect to determine the amount necessary to convert existing buildings into usable school structures.

The Board adopted a policy on the use of school buildings by non-school groups and established new rates as recommended by the "Citizens Advisory Committee on the Use of School Buildings". Copies of the regulations and rates will be mailed to civic associations. School buildings will have designated nights for

4-H Friends, Members Join Forces, Expand Enrollment and Training

Members, leaders, friends of 4-H and the Cooperative Extension Service are joining forces to expand 4-H Club membership in every county and state in the nation. A concerted push is being made to offer 4-H training to more boys and girls between 9 and 19 years of age.

Current enrollment is around 2,224,500 members in 94,700 clubs.

The Cooperative Extension Service heads the program, and is assisted by 362,000 men and women who serve as unpaid volunteer leaders. Added to these are more than 130,000 older 4-H youths who have been trained in junior leadership.

During the last decade 4-H Clubs have been established in urban and rural non-farm homes which today account for 52 per cent of the total membership.

Science Added

Consequently some 4-H programs have been revised to meet the needs of off-the-farm members. More scientific exploration now is carried on in nearly all projects. Training in economics including production and marketing have been introduced along with home and farm management.

Business firms which contribute financial support to the various programs have assisted greatly in bringing about this modernization, reports the National 4-H Service Committee.

New programs and sponsors have been added in an attempt to bring to 4-Hers areas of learning that will aid them in making vocational or higher educational career choices.

Expand Postal Service at Yuletide

Longer post office window hours, expanded delivery services and large-scale extension of the ZIP-coded parcel post speedup are planned for Christmas, Postmaster General John A. Gronouski has advised Hicksville Postmaster, Irene L. Murphy.

Gronouski outlined to the Hicksville postal head, three major new steps he has taken "for the best Christmas mail service the Postal Service has ever had."

1. Expanded post office window hours Dec. 5 to 26 as deemed necessary by the local postmaster.

2. A six-day week Dec. 7-31 for parcel post deliveries, instead of a five day week.

3. Completion by Nov. 1 of Phase III of ZIP Code parcel handling at about 130 more "sectional center" post offices (strategically-located mail massing points), providing faster delivery up to 24 hours or more for parcels with ZIP Code.

In Phase I and II, approximately 75 offices with receipts of \$5 million annually and above activated faster ZIP Code sorting and dispatch by Sept. 1. The 130 in Phase III includes offices with receipts of \$1 to \$5 million.

The Postmaster General told Mrs. Murphy the Christmas plans are part of a nationwide program to bring postmasters into more responsible positions in postal management as "real partners in providing better mail service at all levels."

Pending in Congress is the Foreign Assistance Act of 1964 which provides that any employee grade 12 and over (including veterans) of the Aid For International Development (AID) can be summarily removed or selected out without regard to the Civil Service and Veterans Preference Laws.

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
