Fehrenbach Win Predicts Future

State Assemblyman Edwin F. Fehrenbach of Bethpage today loomed as the brightest hope of the Republicans in the Town of Oyster Bay and he is expected to be the GOP candidate next year for Town Supervisor against incumbent Democrat Michael Petito. Fehrenbach survived the upset of Republicans, Tuesday, and won re-election to Albany handsomely by a margin of better than 11,000 votes.

Many of the contests on Tuesday were so close that an error of a few hundred could upset the final official tallies which will be known in about two weeks.

In the Township about 80 percent of the enrolled voters turned out, some 125,000 out of 150,000 qualified. By comparison, only 89,436 voted a year ago in the race for Town Supervisor which Petito won with 45,836 over Thomas R. Pynchon with 43,600.

Favorite son candidates, generally, did fairly well in the Township. County Judge Michael D'Auria of Plainview in the 180 Oyster Bay districts received 64,138 and his opponent 61,753. However, county-wide the figures were D'Auria 278,227 and Young 309,711. State Senator Henry M. Curran, popular former town clerk, collected 71,047 votes in Oyster Bay and Glen Cove against 64,380 for Edward Kimball. However, when the rest of the Senatorial District (North Hempstead) was added, the figures were Curran 122,344 and Kimball 123,317.

The same was basically true of Congressman Steven Deromian.

Deromian got 40,673 in Oyster Bay, Glen Cove and Lester Wolff 38,918. The District finals, with North Hempstead, were Deromian 93,393 and Wolff 96,615.

Popular County Clerk Francis Anderson of Hicksville carried the Township with 65,889 to 59,635 for Franklin Ornstein. But, county-wide the score was 299,334 for Ornstein and 294,001 for Anderson.

John J. Burns, State Commissioner of Local Government and

former Town Supervisor, failed to carry the Township. His vote in 180 Oyster Bay Districts was 53,622 as against 71,379 for incumbent Eugene Nickerson. County-wide the score was 354,358 for Nickerson and 263,434 for Burns. Nickerson won his first three-year term with less than a 10,000-vote margin.

Oyster Bay Town Board Councilman and Majority Leader Edward Poulos lost his bid for District Court Judge to Alexander Vitale. The vote, including Glen Cove, was 64,072 for Poulos and 74,115 for Vitale.

The race between Grover and Silberling for Congress (mostly Suffolk with a segment of Plainview and Oyster Bay Township) was finally resolved in favor of incumbent Grover. In the Oyster Bay area the score was 22,144 for Grover and 22,381 for Silberling.

US Senator Kenneth Keating carried both the Township (64,582 to 60,016) and Nassau (312,299 to 281,806) but lost state-wide.

Senator Barry Goldwater lost in Oyster Bay Township with 54,894 (actually running more than a 1000 votes ahead of Burns) to 75,699 for President Lyndon Johnson. In the County totals Goldwater received 251,086 and Johnson 380,338.

On the strength of unofficial election night returns C. Bruce Pearsall, of Massapequa Oyster Bay Town Republican chairman, was this week in a very strong position in view of the outcome in other areas of the county. He has long been a close friend of Assemblyman Fehrenbach.

AMENDMENTS TO THE SIDEWALK ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY
BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, State of New York, that the Sidewalk Ordinance of the Town of Oyster Bay, be amended in the following form:

Amend Article I, Section 1 (a) to read as follows:

Section 1 (a). It shall be the duty of the occupants of all land and buildings within the Town of Oyster Bay located in residential areas, upon whose premises waste materials accumulate, to place such waste materials upon the curb line in front of their premises for collection by the collector of garbage and refuse at such times as may be designated by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay for the collection thereof from their particular locality.

It shall be the duty of the occupants of land and buildings located in the business and commercial areas of the Town of Oyster Bay to place waste materials upon the nearest curb line of their premises for collection purposes at such time as may be designated by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay.

Collection of waste materials from shopping centers and municipal use buildings will be made from the rear of the premises when readily accessible to collection vehicles. If not readily accessible, waste materials shall be placed upon the nearest curb line of the said premises for collection purposes.

No waste materials shall be placed upon the designated areas for collection and removal unless properly contained, bundled, tied or packed in the manner hereinafter set forth.

Amend Article I, Section 1 (e), subdivision 1, to read as follows:

1. Garbage shall consist of animal or vegetable leavings or similar food or food refuse together with paper bags or paper, cardboard or wood or other containers thereof, paper refuse, except newspapers, cartons, wooden boxes or other household refuse which shall be inflammable or capable of fermentation or decay.

Garbage shall be collected from residential areas three days a week, Monday through Saturday, on regularly scheduled days during the hours of 6 A.M. to 6:30 P.M., prevailing time. There shall be no limitation as to the number of containers of garbage that may be placed for collection in residential areas.

Garbage shall be collected from business and commercial areas three days a week, Monday through Saturday, on regularly scheduled days during the hours of 6 A.M. to 6:30 P.M., prevailing time. The number of containers of garbage that shall be placed for collection in business and commercial areas shall be limited to ten (10) containers or bundles, each of which shall not exceed seventy-five (75) pounds in weight and the total maximum amount of garbage to be collected shall not exceed 200 pounds in weight.

The limitations of collections set forth herein shall not apply to all accredited private, public or parochial schools, firehouses, houses of worship, municipal use buildings, and buildings housing veteran and fraternal organizations.

Bulk items shall be collected by calling the Department of Sanitation and making arrangements for special pick-up.

Amend Article I, Section 1 (g), subdivision 2, to read as follows:

2. Rubbish shall consist of dry household junk or refuse including ashes, magazines and newspapers when tied in bundles, discarded furniture or parts thereof, lawn trimmings, tree trimmings, leaves or similar trash but shall not be deemed to include building materials resulting from the construction or alteration of buildings or structures.

Rubbish shall be collected from residential areas one day a week, Monday through Saturday, on a regularly scheduled day during the hours of 6 A.M. to 6:30 P.M., prevailing time. Each collection shall not exceed 20 containers or bundles, each of which shall not exceed seventy-five (75) pounds in weight but in no event shall the total maximum amount to be collected exceed 200 pounds in weight.

Rubbish shall be collected from business and commercial areas three days per week, Monday through Saturday, on regularly scheduled days, during the hours of 6 A.M. to 6:30 P.M., prevailing time. Each collection shall be limited to ten (10) containers or bundles each of which shall not exceed seventy-five (75) pounds in weight but in no event shall the total maximum weight exceed 200 pounds.

The limitations of collections set forth herein shall not apply to all accredited private, public or parochial schools, firehouses, houses of worship, municipal use buildings, and buildings housing veteran and fraternal organizations.

Bulk items shall be collected by calling the Department of Sanitation and making arrange-

ments for special pick-up.
Amend Article I, Section 1 (e), subdivision 3, to read as follows:

3. All waste material shall, except as hereinafter expressly provided, be placed in proper watertight containers which shall be kept covered and maintained in a sanitary condition by periodic cleaning. Each of such containers, when filled, shall weigh not more than seventy-five (75) pounds and shall have a capacity not exceeding thirty (30) gallons. Garbage and rubbish must be placed in separate containers. All waste materials which cannot readily be deposited in a container may be placed in boxes or receptacles securely enclosed or, if not placed in such boxes or receptacles must be securely bundled, tied and packed in order to prevent scattering. Each of such boxes, receptacles or bundles shall contain refuse weighing not more than seventy-five (75) pounds. All paper cartons not filled with waste materials shall be broken or folded into compact masses and securely tied.

tract. This means in laymen's language City Sewers, and not cesspools that we have at present. The proposed construction is for 1965. However, before any sewer district can be legally established, a public hearing must be held. Following the hearing, the County Board of Supervisors will vote to approve or disapprove formation of the district. In anticipation of this, I am in the process of forming a special committee that will go into this matter in detail. I have requested, through our secretary enough copies of the brochure to mail to the entire community. Meanwhile, if there are any residents in the community who would like to serve on this most important committee, I will appreciate hearing from you. All pros and cons of this must be weighed. City sewers can be very costly, but then again so can sunken cesspools. More on this at a later date.

CBE Supports Library Vote

After a full discussion with respect to a Jericho Public Library, which was held at its monthly meeting on Oct. 20, Citizens For Better Education by unanimous vote endorsed the library referendum vote that will be held on Nov. 21.

Members and friends of Citizens For Better Education were urged to participate in helping to make the library a reality.

Mrs. Ruth Lang, Chairman Jericho Public Library Committee, was the main speaker at the meeting and answered the many questions raised. It was pointed out in the discussion that a library would enhance the general cultural and educational climate of our community, one of the principal aims of Citizens For Better Education.

Nov 21 Library Day in Jericho

November is really a "voting month" for Jericho this year. Not only did we vote for national and state officers, but we shall be voting on a public library for our school district. We must not forget that it is in our hands, as residents of the school district, to create the library. No one can do it for us, either by statute or by order. If we want it, we must say so with our vote on November 21.

The Birchwood-at-Jericho Civic Association has passed a resolution through its Board of Directors to support the establishment of a Jericho Public Library.

On October 20th, the Board of Directors heard Mrs. Ruth Lang, Chairman of the Jericho Library Committee, speak about the Library Committee's findings regarding our need for a library. Her most important points were:

1. Our district has risen to a population of 14,000.
2. We now have almost 1,400 more children in our schools than we did in 1959, with almost 3,600 children now enrolled.
3. The school libraries can only provide materials to support the curriculum in the schools. This does not mean enrichment. This does not mean wide or deep choice.

4. Our district has grown by at least 500 new families that were not here when a vote on library was taken in 1961.

5. The Nassau Library System, which we are now helping to support with Jericho State Tax money, stands ready to help us. They will catalogue all our books. They will purchase our books for us at a 40% discount. They will give us consultant service in every area of library service. They will open to us the complete resources of all the 48 member libraries in Nassau.

6. A local public library plans its selections according to its own locality's needs. A local public library can become a community center for its own community. It can be controlled as to its budget and fees and selection of trustees by its own locality. BEING A NON-RESIDENT USER OF SOME OTHER LIBRARY GIVES YOU NONE OF THIS.

7. The Library Committee's Survey showed that out of 1400 replies, the results ran 6 to 1 in favor of a Jericho Library.

8. The budget for the proposed public library was prepared by experts of the Nassau Library System. It calls for an annual appropriation of \$61,280. This would mean 12¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation, (or \$12.00 per year on a house assessed at \$10,000).

It is clear to the Board of Directors that no more time should be wasted in providing our community with this very necessary resource. The school district is being given a special opportunity on November 21 to vote for a public library. Every resident's vote will count.

The Birchwood-at-Jericho Civic Assoc. Board urges all Association members, as well as all other residents, to vote "YES" for a public library for Jericho.
