For the first time in a quarter century the Hicksville business district will not be decorated in any fashion to indicate the holiday season, the HERALD learned this week. There will be no public manifestation. Decorations will be confined to the individual stores and the imagination of store owners. The problem is simple: money.

The Chamber has no money to pay for installation of strings of lights across Broadway and Marle St. which have been traditional in the community for a generation or more.

Published appeals to prospective donors have not been too successful. The bite has increased in recent years from \$10 to \$65 per store.

However, Santa Claus will arrive in Hicksville this Saturday morning, Dec. 12 due to the cooperation of the Chamber of Commerce. See notice on page four for details.

Incumbents Win Re-election Here

Incumbent commissioners were re-elected in voting last Tuesday Dec. 1.

Charles Kiel Jr. was returned to office as a commissioner of Jericho Water District with 880 votes out of 1,370 cast. Harry Gerson earned 366 and Burton Stone, 125.

In Jericho Fire District, Harold Smith received 46 out of 47 cast. He was unopposed and one ballot was blank.

John C. Edwards received 475 votes in Plainview Water District election of a commissioner while Gerald Fields received 379.

Vincent W. Braun Sr. was re-elected a commissioner of Hicksville Fire District, unopposed, and Frank Wallach was re-elected district treasurer without opposition. There was one write-in vote for Mel Voorhies for commissioner.

Library Gets Underway Here

On Monday, Nov. 30, the newly elected Trustees of the Jericho Public Library held an informal briefing session at the home of Mrs. Ruth Lang. The Trustees plan to hold meetings every week until further notice. Regular open meetings will be scheduled for the fourth Monday of every month at the Jericho High School.

The first meeting on Dec. 7th will be devoted to organizational matters: the election of officers (President, Vice - President, Treasurer and Secretary), and the determining of the terms of office of the Trustees. Ordinarily, Library Trustees will hold office for a five year term. However, the first group of Trustees must establish, by lot, which Trustee will have the term from date of establishment (Nov. 21) to June 30, 1965, and the other four terms to be, respectively, one and one-half years, two and one-half years, three and one-half years, and four and one-half years.

In process at this time is the Application for Charter from the State Board of Regents. This must be mailed to the State Education Dept. within 30 days of the library vote.

The Trustees have also set in

Indeed, the Trustees are eager to hear from the community. Questions and suggestions will all be given careful attention. Announcements of meetings will be made sufficiently far in advance, in the future, so that residents who wish to attend meetings of the Trustees, whether to observe, to ask questions, or to offer suggestions, will be able to do so conveniently.

What Will Sewers Cost?

That is the general line of questioning that neighbors are asking one another. Based on current assessed valuation of your house, the Disposal Tax will in all probability be 3/10th of a cent per \$100, of the assessed valuation for the 1st year, 3.7¢ the 2nd year, 17.8¢ the 3rd year, 18.9¢ for the 4th year and 20¢ for the fifth year to an anticipated ultimate rate of 46¢ per year after 20 years. This means that a homeowner whose home is assessed at \$9,000 would pay taxes ranging from 27¢ the first year to \$45.00 at the anticipated ultimate rate 20 years hence.

What will be my Collection District Tax? No two Collection District tax charges will be the same due to the differences in total assessed valuations, size and facilities to be constructed, but a typical district would be as follows: 1st year - 17¢; 2nd year - 34¢; 3rd year - 51¢; 4th year 67¢; and fifth year and ultimate rate of 83¢. A house assessed at \$9,000 would have a \$15.30 tax for the 1st year and an ultimate tax of \$74.70. Some districts may run slightly higher than this and some slightly lower. These are just projected estimates!
