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BS First Aid Training Pays Off

Boy Scout Troop 381 of Holy Family Parish Hicksville, went on an over night camp trip last weekend to Bash Bis Falls, 130 Miles from N.Y. in Mass. The troop camped at Scout Master Harry Wheeler's place, which he generously consented it's use by the troop.

Under supervision of assistant Scout Master Joe Trapp, accompanied by Mr. Acton and Mr. Lee. The following scouts went up: Sec. class Leon Lesniak Tenderfoot Mabry, Sahr, Stephenson, Hobar, Acton, Lee, Brophy. The weather being cool and clear gave the boys the opportunity to accomplish various requirements used toward there advancement in rank. For four of this boys this was there first over night. Pitching tents, cooking meals and a five mile hike, church on Sunday made it a full and pleasant weekend.

The troop broke camp Sunday afternoon, all packed they started for home.

About one mile from camp on the road out they saw a man limping and holding his legs as if in pain, waving for Mr. Acton to stop. Mr. Acton stopped and Joe Trapp talked to the man to find out what was the trouble.

While operating a skill saw, it kicked back and opened his leg above the knee, leaving a cut six inches long and bleeding severely.

The boys watched traffic while Joe applied his knowledge of first aid learned in Scouting. Securing clean towels from a neighbor and also call a doctor.

He had the man lie down, ripped the pants away from the wound, put the towels over it and applied direct pressure to stop the bleeding. Joe decided against using the first aid kit knowing the doctor would be there shortly. Placing a coat under his head and covered him with a blanket and kept talking to him.

The doctor arrived examined the wound, placed some gauze over it and told them to take him to Columbia Memorial Hospital.

The station wagon was made ready so the man could lie down. Joe stayed in the back with man and the ride to the hospital was on it's way. About a mile out the bleeding started again. Joe again applied direct pressure for the next 18 mi. An hour and one half, plus thirty stitches later, is what it took to close the cut. The Doctor mentioned he was very fortunate. Mr. Acton drove the man back to his house and again the trip home started.

A good example of living up to the Scout Law.

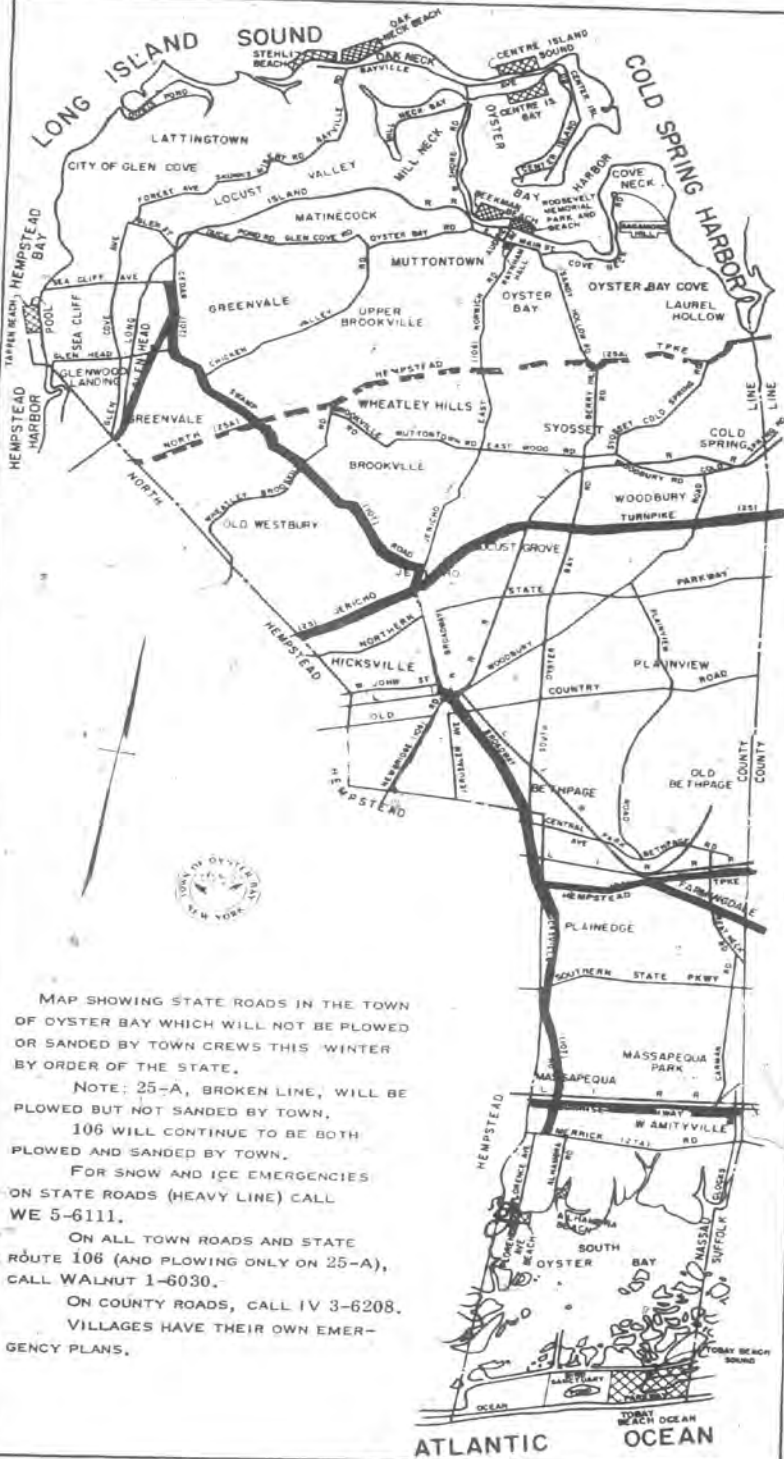

File Application For Our Library

As of December 16, the application for Charter for the Jericho Public Library has been in Albany. The Board of Regents is expected to review this application at its January meeting. By the first week of February, the Jericho Library Board expects to have its reply.

The December 14th meeting of the Board was devoted to preparing the application under the guidance of Mr. Andrew Geddes, Director of the Nassau Library System, who was the Board's guest that evening.

The Library Board also reviewed its progress in securing a site for the library. Several sites have already been explored, six of which are being evaluated at the present time. Accessibility to the largest number of resi-

dents will be the major deciding factor.

The Board has elected Ruth Lang as President, Morton Thielie as Vice President, Hy York as Treasurer, Florence Irving as Secretary, and Martin Penn as Historian. Terms of office on the Board have been determined by lot, as prescribed by law. Mrs. Lang's term of office is to be 4 1/2 years, Mrs. Irving's 3 1/2 years, Mr. Penn's 2 1/2 years, Mr. Thielie's 1 1/2 years, and Mr. York's 1 1/2 years. Meetings will continue to be held on Monday, 8:30 PM, in Room 4 of the Jackson School. Interested resident should please note, however, that the Library Board will not meet on December 28th.

School Housing Problem Concerns Education Bd

The problem of over taxed housing in the Jericho schools, primarily at the Cantigue School, both now and for the next few years was the main topic of the Board of Education's meeting on Monday evening December 21st. Dr. Roscoe Brown submitted

to the Board his preliminary report of the enrollment projections for our community for the next ten years. This report which of course is subject to review, indicated certain trends which the Board will have to give careful study and consideration in planning for the coming semesters. However, the Board and Dr. Carey have both stated that prior to taking any definite action that they will do so only with the full knowledge of the community. Several plans will be projected and the one best suited for the educational needs of the entire community will be adopted. The first open meeting is scheduled for Wednesday January 13 at the Speech and Drama Room of the High School.

The preliminary facts that Dr. Brown notified the Board of were that there are four factors affecting the growth in school population of an area: 1. New Homes being built; it is expected that there will be 175 new homes in West Birchwood, 2. Zoning regulations remaining the same.

Text of Funeral Sermon for H.G. Eisemann

The following is the text of the funeral sermon given by the Rev. Edward H. Stammel, pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church, Hicksville, for Henry G. Eisemann on Dec. 16. His text was Job 1:2: "The Lord gave, the Lord hath taken away, blessed be the name of the Lord."

"On Sunday morning, Dec. 13th, the heart of a great man stopped beating...and from the first we each received the news till this moment a deep sorrow has gripped our hearts. We are here because each in his own way loved, respected, and admired Henry. Few men ever achieve this high distinction of commanding the silent respect in which hundreds upon hundreds of men and women and children have held him for these many, many years. Our deep feelings have forced us to drop our day by day tasks and to pause in silent remembrance and tribute and gratitude for the life of this man.

"Now God has seen fit to take him from us to Himself and we are here in this place to find the comfort and the strength and the hope which only God can give for such a time as this.

"I received the news of Henry's return to God as I was about to consecrate the elements for the Holy Communion on Sunday last and we interrupted the service to pray for the blessed repose of his body in the bosom

of the earth and to commend his soul into the hands of our dear Lord. My mind and heart was heavy as I distributed the Blessed Sacrament to my people, and one passage kept ringing through my mind "The Lord gave, the Lord hath taken away, blessed be the Name of the Lord".

"Through His servant, Henry, the Lord gave something to each one of us. God gave a devoted husband to a dear wife; He gave a concerned and active citizen to a community; He gave a dedicated son to our country; He gave a friend to many who were friendless; a helper to hundreds who needed help; He gave an understanding heart to the youth of our communities; He gave a good example of moral strength, integrity, dead honesty to those who vacillate; He gave a strong arm and a stout heart to those who were weak; He gave a fair and heart-concerned employer to each of his employees; He gave a man with a heart as big as a watermelon, a mind as quick as a bear trap, a sense of humor that was contagious. God gave to all of us who know Henry a warm, live, interested, concerned friend. Each of us is richer because we knew him.

"The memory of the just is blessed and a bit of Henry will live, thank God, as long as you and I live...for part of him has been woven into the fabric

of our lives. Few men ever walk across the stage of history as did Henry, leaving the strong foot prints of a great, yet a humble human being. His contribution to our day, I hope, will be remembered.

"Truly, the Lord gave...and now the Lord has taken away. "Taken away? Yes, but for only the short time it takes for each of us to walk from this hour till the moment of the last door that leads to eternity. For the Lord of the Church, whose birth we shall commemorate in nine days, gave to us the great and glorious promise: "I am the Resurrection and the Life. He that believeth in Me, though he were dead, yet shall he live; and whosoever liveth and believeth in Me shall never die".

"In the church we dare never say "good bye". It is always expressed in the beautiful words filled with the promise of God "Auf Wiedersehen"... "till we shall see each other again". For God has assured us most definitely that there is a REUNION before His Throne. Christ said "In my Father's House are many mansions. If it were not so I would have told you." There is an ETERNAL life with Him "for God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son that who soever believeth on Him should not perish, but have everlasting life". Yes, the Lord has taken him away - but for only a short time...and then the sweet reunion.

"The Lord gave; the Lord hath taken away; blessed be the Name of the Lord.

"To God all glory. God gave Henry to you and to me. To Henry God gave his only Son in death and in resurrection. God gave to Henry, by faith, the crown of life in exchange for the cross. God will give you the same if you believe... and you shall meet again in Heaven. Blessed be the name of the Lord. Amen."

3. Patterns of resale to average 100 homes in Jericho a year.

4. The enrollment of private and parochial schools to absorb approximately six per cent of elementary school children.

Bearing the above in mind his early findings then indicate that where as the Cantigue school can properly house 580 students the following is then the current and projected figures 1964/65... 668, 1965/66...765, 1966/67...793, 1967/68...785, 1968/69...762, 1969/70...707, 1970/71...634 to 1975/76 when it will be down to 522 students.

At the same time that the Cantigue school will be reaching its peak enrollments, the Jackson, Seaman and Williams schools will have leveled off to their normal housing loads. It can be noted that one of the reasons for the greater increase in our area is based on the relative youth of our community and its residents; the present members of the Board from West Birchwood are typical examples, both having pre-school as well as school age children at home.

The Jericho School District, area wise, is one of the largest in Nassau, however, only twenty per cent of this area has been developed. If significant portion of the eighty per-cent should be rezoned for development housing we would all feel the increase both in space and in taxes.

The Board intends to give this problem careful attention and has indicated it's strong desire to work closely with the members of this community so as to insure the best possible solution and continue to provide the desired quality of educational standards which the present Board and Administration is working to achieve.

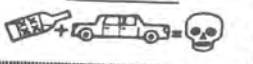

Keep Christmas A Happy Time For Small Children

Householders were urged today to be particularly watchful of small children and elderly people during the Christmas holiday season to be sure that they are kept safe from fire.

Last year 11,800 persons lost their lives in fires and the far greater percentage of these fatalities occurred among the very young and elderly groups.

Last year there were 31.6 fire deaths for each 100,000 population in the United States, and of these, 8.8 were children 14 years old or younger, 6.8 were children under 4 years of age. And, there were 13.7 fire deaths for each 100,000 persons 65 and over.

It is a good plan to impress upon children and elderly people that if fire occurs they should quickly get out of the burning house of apartment and never re-enter a burning building.

Also every home should have an escape plan with all members of the household familiar with two alternate ways to get out of the house.

In addition, all members of the family should agree to meet in some particular point outside the house, so that it can quickly be determined if all members have escaped.

Make Christmas Tree Fire Resistant This Year

To make your Christmas tree less of a fire hazard you can make it fire resistant by using a solution of ammonium sulfate. Get your tree four to six days before you wish to use it. Weigh the tree and divide by four. This gives the weight of ammonium sulfate needed. Dissolve the ammonium sulfate in water, using 1 1/2 pints of water to each pound of sulfate. Just before treating, saw off the stem of the tree at an oblique angle or a V-shape.

Set the tree in the solution in a cool place and leave it until most of the solution is absorbed. The degree of fire-resistance of the tree depends on the amount of solution absorbed, but unfortunately no living tree is absolutely fire proof.

A case in point appeared in the Civil Service Leader "School Gaze" column dated Feb. '61. We reported Robert Hock, Treasurer and spokesman for the Hicksville Non-Teaching Unit, stating "the recent membership drive was an unheralded success. '19 new members were signed bringing the total membership to 84 out of a possible 97." An N.T.U. Arnie Kligenberg, Vin & Frank Coletta, Brad Jaworski, & Norm Sanberg were cited for outstanding work on rebounds & assists. The N.T.U. Dinner was all set for the Old Country Road Inn. The J.V. Bowlers won the North Shore Championship averaging a pin fall of 155. Tom Miller, Jeff Wells, Chip Searle, Norm Golden, Bob Welck & Paul Frimmer were the head pins on the "Bocce Ball Beat." The Varsity also handled by Coach Harry

Renn finished in 4th place with a 160 team average.. They were Joe Abramowski, Ray Germaine, Bob Malezia, John Panico & Ted Reich. 150 hopefuls turned out for Warren Meyer's and Bob Berg's Jr. High Track team... The Varsity mentored by Jim Grantham & Stan Kellner had 80. And then came the Varsity baseball team coached by Army Tomcaini. During a practice game with Levittown Division Ave., an oddity occurred when the bases were loaded with Coletta's Chris held out for a walk and joined his two brothers Vin & Frank on the base-paths) Bob Cerone pitched a 4 hit 11 strikeout effort against Syosset but lost when his opponent came up with a no-hitter. Cerone came back with a 3 hit winning stint over Great Neck, South... Gary Sonosian added the Notmen to the Comet list. It was the Softball heyday of the Faculty "All Stars" & the District champs the (Custodian) "Wildcats." The Faculty won 29-7 and Wildcat mgr. John (Tiny) Olson disbanded his club, when the All-Stars repeated the next time out. The Comet 9 ended their season unblemished taking the Div. 1 title. Cerone drove the first nail in the series coffin by no-hitting Herricks in the first playoff game. It was a perfect one... no hits, no runs, no walks... 14 strikeouts facing the min. of 21 batters. Sonosian followed suit in the next play-off vs Bethpage but dropped a heartbreaking 1-0... 2 hitter to Peter Nistad. It was later returned with so questions asked. The Comet basketball team made it 3 straight wins for the issue of Dec. 23. And so it went on the Comet Sportsbeat for the year '61. Ed Petro and his squad racked up 14 straight wins before being nipped 61-59 by Plainview. They had the kind of basketball team that brought the fans out in droves and as for this reporter...We enjoyed mulling over the exploits of YESTERDAY'S HEADLINERS. Some (while still rookies on other sportsbeats) are still reaching the newsprint. AND THEN...there's the (64-65) story of young (Jr High's) Bruce Goldstein... touted by his art teacher Mr. Elsie Sayko as being an artist worth his easel. We asked Bruce for a sample of his wares and could do nothing but agree after seeing his efforts in behalf of the up-coming Mule o'RAMA scheduled for the Jr. High's Boys gym on the evening of Jan 15th/65. It's a Donkey's Delight that should tickle your funnybone. Watch for it the issue of Jan. 14th. This future Cartoonist needed nothing more than the seed of an idea to put his imagination to work.
