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## Close JFK Memorial Donations on Apr 15

Memorial Day has been tentatively set for the formal dedication of the John F. Kennedy Memorial in Hicksville in the traffic circle area bounded by North Broadway and Jerusalem Ave. at West John St. It was learned this week. At the same time the committee in charge announced that April 15 will be the closing date for contributions

to the fund to erect a memorial honoring the late President and all Hicksville residents who have given their lives in the service of the nation.

Contributions may be made at the Long Island National Bank, Broadway and Herzog Pl., Hicksville, or by mail to PO Box 95, Hicksville. All contributions are acknowledged by a formal receipt.

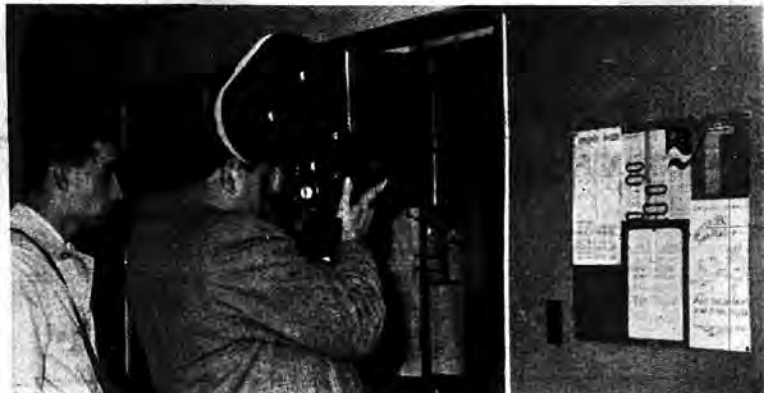
The Memorial Day dedication, as presently scheduled, will be held during the afternoon of the holiday after the traditional community ceremonies for the day.

Contributions to the fund to date by individuals, organizations and businesses have totalled approximately \$1300 which is about \$300 less than the minimum amount required to erect a flag pole, black marble stone and cast bronze plaque which will feature a base relief likeness of the late President and the names of Hicksville residents who have given their lives in World War I, World War II, the Korean conflict and at Viet Nam.

beyond my present term.

"To my fellow Board members and the Administrators with whom I have worked many long and arduous hours, I would like to express my sincere appreciation. "I will continue to maintain an interest and concern for the education of our children and hope the coming election will result in a moderation of influences that have been ridiculing Hicksville. Our community has much to be proud of and it is disheartening to see it torn asunder by special interest groups.

"In the forthcoming election I sincerely hope our candidates will, first and foremost, have pride in the community. If they do we will not have to worry about their devotion to do the best they can to enrich and enhance

the education of our children," he concluded.

The other vacancy before the voters in May is the seat currently held by William A. Bruno Jr., also finishing his first three year term. He has not publicly revealed whether or not he will seek another term.

### WHO WON WAR?

To the Editor:

It seems the Downgrade-American Cult grows in strength, while Americans display an astonishing reluctance to fight back. At the March 5th Hicksville School Board meeting Supt. Abt quoted from Funk and Wagnall's that the U.N. won World War II. I ask, is a nation's true role in history to be negated by emboldened facts? If so, why?

If I am to be adjudged guilty of keeping faith with those sleeping under white crosses in far away lands, then I plead guilty, and may I remain so until the day I die.

## Nassau Police Boys Clubs Grew From 300 Membership to 20,000

When the late Nassau County Police Commissioner Abram Skidmore organized the Nassau County Police Boys Club in 1940 with only 300 boys, he told now Assistant Chief Inspector Andrew Kirk "You watch out for these boys."

Kirk has. He is now the Police Director of PBC activities, overseeing a membership that includes 20,000 boys, over 700 adult volunteers, and more than a score of police officers assigned full time to this program. Kirk can be proud of a movement whose spirit remains youthful. "We have very little juvenile crime where there is a PBC program," he said. "Yet, we say this is not the answer. You'll always get that kid who never joins the PBC and hangs out on the corners. This is the boy we want. He needs it."

The operation of the PBC is unique. It is completely planned and administered by a volunteer staff. Supplementing the volunteers are a staff of 24 full time patrolman directors, with two officers administering the program from headquarters in Willist Park.

The PBC alumni is a distinguished list, embracing all fields of endeavor. Prominent in the athletic level were such luminaries as Jimmy Brown, John and Jim Camlen, Gene Floyd, and many others.

One of the busiest activities, this winter is basketball. There are 294 teams in this sport, and during the summer months, baseball takes precedence with some 340 teams. All PBC teams are fully uniformed.

"PBC does not attempt to lure boys from Little Leagues or High School teams," said Acting Police Commissioner Francis B. Looney. "We try to teach them to become better citizens and better boys, and it is the unaffiliated boy we are primarily interested in for our program."

One of the principal objectives of PBC is to establish a close relationship between these young men, and boys, with the local patrolmen. "We want them to know the police officer as a friend," continued Looney.

The PBC would like to own and operate gymnasiums, much as the YMCA does in New York City, but this takes money. The annual fund drive never nets more than \$70,000, so the PBC has to utilize the facilities of local school systems. However, they do own three clubhouses, located in Bathpage, Mineola, and Westbury, and plan another in Plainville.

The most difficult problem confronting the PBC annually remains this fund raising drive. The response is not what it

should be, considering the immense job to be done in supervising the activities of over 20,000 boys. Yet, there isn't a comparable recreation group in Nassau County.

"We don't look for handouts," PBC Corporation President, Jerome G. Zettler, of 70 Gardner Ave., Hicksville, emphasized. A lot of money is raised by the kids themselves, selling candy and cookies, and occasionally we also run a salvage drive.

"It's the limited amount of money that makes our program difficult," related Zettler, "despite the fact there are no salaried adult employees with the PBC."

Kirk explained, "there is always a need for men to volunteer a little of their time to these youngsters in the local community, all they would have to do is call our office at FI 8-8181 or contact their local unit."

Each PBC unit is governed by their executive board which serves much as a board of directors in private industry. They

## Civics Invite Jericho Bd To Discuss Higher Budget

Due to the fact that much concern is being shown by the Birchwood Park Civic Assoc. board about the substantial increase in the coming school year, 1965-66, school budget, a school board representative of the Jericho School District, will appear before the Civic Board to discuss the budget increase.

Leo Geyer, the civic board's representative on the school board, believes that the School budget increase has been minimized to the level of \$1.02 per thousand of assessed property valuation.

The proposed budget provides \$970.00 per pupil for instruction. "More than half of the increase in the current budget will be found in instructional service--costs which are directly related to the Instructional Program. It is caused primarily by the maintenance of a competitive

teachers' salary schedule, the addition of additional teachers, and an estimated 227 pupil increase in our anticipated average daily attendance for 1965-66. Also included in the budget increases are salary adjustments for other personnel, the costs of new instructional programs and the maintenance and operation costs of the new high school addition on a full time basis. The mandatory obligation of the Board of Education is to provide a sound and effective program for the children of Jericho." - Board of Education, Union Free School District No. 15.

The increase for 1965-66 school year proposed budget is \$465,747.00 or 11.61% over last year.

The budget will have to be accepted or rejected by a vote by Jericho residents in May.

## Better Citizens

The students at Jericho H.S. are part of a nation-wide trend toward broader educational standards. Better students are being encouraged to take special courses at Hofstra University and C. W. Post College in sociology, history and philosophy. Mr. Albaum of the English Dept. has instituted a course in the humanities. His seminars, given Tuesday at the high school from 7 - 10 P.M., are designed to give students (and their parents) some insight into the vast fields of study open to them, that can lead to better understanding of the world at large, and the people who inhabit this earth, past and present. 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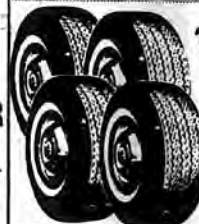

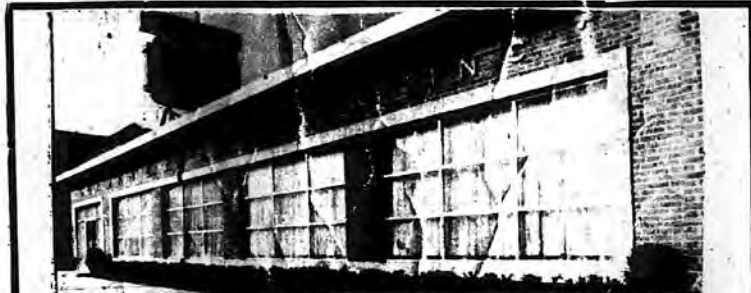

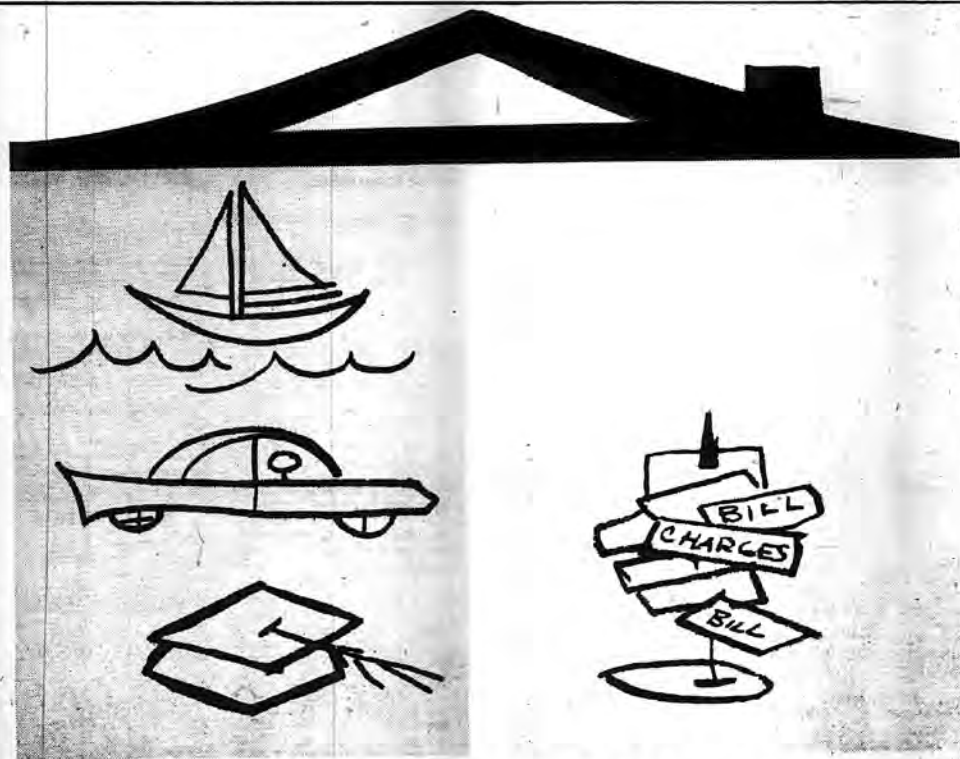

and their immediate families comprise half the population of this country and most of these people will have some dealings with the VA during a lifetime--if not death.

This tremendous organization with about 22 million customers, provides everything from living allowances for widows and orphans to graves and burial flags for caskets.

Employing about 175,000 men and women to keep up the vast scope of its activities from coast to coast, Alaska and Hawaii, it operates the largest network of hospitals serving some 600,000 patients annually, in addition, another 1.5 million veterans are treated at VA outpatient clinics. It also runs the third largest insurance company in the country.

The entire economy of this country has been greatly aided by the educational efforts and financial assistance activities to veterans of this country. It has on file some 30 million names of veterans from Revolutionary days to the present.

In charge of this government blue chip is the newly appointed William J. Driver, a veteran of World War II and Korea, and a life member in the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Mr. Driver holds the VA's two highest awards: The Exceptional Service Medal and the Meritorious Service Medal. His distinguished service also won him the VFW Medal of Merit at our 1964 annual convention.

However, the VA advises us of two exceptions: Eligibility continues until July 25, 1967 for veterans with any degree of service-connected disability, and for unmarried widows of veterans who died as a result of disabilities suffered while in service.

RESOLVED, that the Ordinance regulating parking in the hamlet of Hicksville, Town of Oyster Bay, adopted October 19, 1948, be and it hereby is amended as follows:

Section 6A shall be amended by adding subdivision 5 to read as follows: **NO PARKING LOADING ZONE**

5. Newbridge Road (new portion) west side of southbound roadway - No Parking Loading Zone - starting at the north curb line of Station Plaza South, north to the south curb line of Station Plaza North.

Section 3A shall be amended by adding subdivision 28, 29 and 30 to read as follows: **TWO HOUR PARKING 8 AM TO 6 PM EXCEPT SATURDAYS, SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS.**

28. Old Country Road - south side - Two Hour Parking 8 AM to 6 PM Except Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays - starting at a point opposite the east curb line of Charles Street, east to a point opposite the west curb line of Raymond Street.

29. Old Country Road - south side - Two Hour Parking 8 AM to 6 PM Except Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays - starting at a point opposite the east curb line of Raymond Street, east to a point opposite the west curb line of Park Avenue.

30. Old Country Road - south side - Two Hour Parking 8 AM to 6 PM Except Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays - starting at a point 80 feet east of the east curb line of Park Avenue, east for a distance of 1,152 feet.

Section 9E subdivision 1 shall be **RESCINDED.**

1. West Marie Street - south side - Reserved for cars on official school business daily 7 AM to 6 PM Except Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays - starting 59 feet from the west curb line of Broadway west for 47 feet.

Section 11 shall be amended by adding subdivisions 39 and 40 to read as follows: **NO PARKING.**

39. Newbridge Road (new portion) east and west sides of northbound roadway - No Parking - starting at the north curb line of Station Plaza South, north to the south curb line of Station Plaza North.

40. Newbridge Road (new portion) east side of southbound roadway - No Parking - starting at the north curb line of Station Plaza South, north to the south curb line of Station Plaza North.

Section 13 subdivision 29 shall be **RESCINDED.**

29. Station Plaza West - west side - No Stopping - starting at a point opposite the south curb line of Station Plaza North, south to the south curb line of Station Plaza South.

Section 13 shall be amended by adding subdivisions 32 and 33 to read as follows: **NO STOPPING.**

32. Nevada Street - north and south sides - No Stopping - from the east curb line of Broadway east to the west curb line of Bethpage Road.

33. Station Plaza West - west side - No Stopping - starting at a point 130 feet south of the south curb line of West Barclay Street, south to the south curb line of Station Plaza South.

Section 16B subdivision 25 shall be **RESCINDED.**

25. West John Street - south side - No Stopping Bus Stop - starting at a point opposite the east curb line of Kuhl Avenue, east for a distance of 60 feet.

Section 18 subdivisions 4 and

5 shall be **RESCINDED.**

4. West Marie Street - south side - No Parking Loading Zone 9 AM to 6 PM Except Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays - starting at a point 92 feet from the west curb line of Broadway, west for a distance of 36 feet.

5. West Marie Street - south side - No Parking Loading Zone - starting at a point 141 feet from the west curb line of Broadway, west for a distance of 35 feet.

Section 18 shall be amended by adding subdivision 11 to read as follows: **NO PARKING LOADING ZONE 8 AM TO 6 PM EXCEPT SATURDAYS, SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS.**

11. West Marie Street - south side - No Parking Loading Zone 8 AM to 6 PM Except Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays - starting at a point 105 feet west of the west curb line of Broadway, west for a distance of 70 feet.

Section 43 shall be amended by adding subdivisions 3 and 4 to read as follows: **NO STOPPING BUS STOP.**

3. West Marie Street - south side - No Stopping Bus Stop - starting at the west curb line of Broadway, west for a distance of 60 feet.
