

Nassau Police Boys Clubs Grew From 300 Membership to 20,000

When the late Nassau County Police Commissioner Abram Skidmore organized the Nassau County Police Boys Club in 1940 with only 300 boys, he told now Assistant Chief Inspector Andrew Kirk "You watch out for these boys."

Kirk "You watch out for these boys."

Kirk has. He is now the Police Director of PBC activities, overseeing a membership that includes 20,000 boys, over 700 adult volunteers, and more than a score of police officers assigned full time to this program. Kirk can be proud of a movement whose spirit remains youthful, "We have very little juvenile crime where there is a PBC program," he said. "Yet, we say this is not the answer. You'll always get that kid who never joins the PBC and hangs out on the corners. This is the boy we want. He needs it."

The operation of the PBC is unique, It is completely planned and administered by a volunteer.

The operation of the PBC is unique, it is completely planned and administered by a volunteer staff. Supplementing the volunteers are a staff of 24 full time parrolman directors, with two officers administrating the program from headquarters in Williston Park,

The PBC alumni is a distinguished list, embracing all fields of andewore. Prominent in the

guished list, embracing all fields of endeavor. Prominent in the athletic level were such luminarys as Jimmy Brown, John and Jim Camlen, Gene Floyd, and many others.

One of the busiest activities, this winter is basketball. There are 294 teams in this sport, and during the summer months, baseball takes precedence with some 340 teams. All PBC teams are fully uniformed.

"PBC does not attempt to lure boys from Little Leagues or High School teams," said Acting Police Commissioner Francis B, Looney, "We try to teach them to become better citizens and better boys, and it is the unaffilliated boy we are primarily interested in for our program."

One of the principal objectives or PBC is to establish a close relationship between these young men, and boys, with the loss pairolman. "We want them to know the police officer as a triand," continued Looney.

The PBC would like to own and operate gymnastums, much as the YMCA does in New York City, but this takes mosey. The annual fund drive never nets more than \$70,000, so the PBC has to utilize the facilities of local school systems. The most difficult problem confronting the PBC annually remains this fund raising drive.

The response is not what it

should be, considering the immense job to be done in super-vising the activities of over 20,000 boys. Yet, there isn't a comparable recreation group in Nassau County. "We don't look for handouts," PBC Corporation President, Jerome G. Zettler, of 70 Gardner Ave., Hicksville, emphasized, A lot of money is raised by the kids themselves, selling candy and

lot of money is raised by the kids themselves, selling candy and cookies, and occasionally we also run a salvage drive."
"It's the limited amount of money that makes our program difficult," related Zettler, "de-spite the fact there are on salaried adult employees with the PBC."

Kirk archained, "there is also

Kirk explained, "there is always a need for men to volunteer a little of their time to these youngsters in the local community, all they would have to do is call our office at PIS-8181 or contact their local unit."

Each PBC unit is governed by their accounts.

their executive board which serves much as a board of di-rectors in private industry. They

meet once a month with the assigned patrolman - director, and discuss local fund raising, athletic programs and other administrative problems.

Among the boys participating in the PBC athletic programs are the sons of Whitsy Ford, Puzzy Leven, and other noted shifetes who make Long Island their home. Whenever Ford attends agame in which his sons are playing "the game just about breaks up, Kirk says, "because all the boys rush at Ford for his autograph."

There is no class distinction in PBC. All members are treated equally. "The basic premise of the PBC," Kirk says, "is to provide boys with an opportunity to develop their own resources through organized recreation, without the ovenemphasized stress of winning at any cost."

Due to the fact that much con-cern is being shown by the Birch-wood Park Civic Assoc, board About the substantial increase in the coming school year, 1965-56, school budget, a school board representative of the Jericho School District, will appear be-fore the Civic Board to discuss the budget increase.

Leo Geyer, the civic board's representative on the school representative on the school board, believes that the School budget increase has been minimized to the level of \$1.02 per thousand of assessed property valuation.

The proposed budgets

The proposed budget provides \$970,00 per pupil for instruction. "More than half of the increase in the current budget will be found in instructional service-costs which are directly related to the Instructional Program. It is caused primarily by the main-tenance of a competitive

teachers' salary schedule, the addition of additional teachers, and an estimated 227 pupil increase in our anticipated average daily attendance for 1965-66. Al




