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Hicksville School Election:

Coalition Bd Candidates State Their Platform

At a meeting held at the home of Leon Silver, 27 Thimble Lane, Hicksville, James E. Anderson and Marvin Goldberg, the United-TEACH Coalition candidates for the office of School Board Trustee, Hicksville School District, launched their campaign with the announcement of a platform that promises to "restore dignity and efficiency to School Board Meetings...."

In a joint statement the Coalition Candidates stated "The American public school system, its staff and students, must remain forever free from political forces which would use education as a means to self-serving political ends...."

The platform further called for:
 "Improvement of school-community relations through the development of effective and regular channels of communication among all participants: administration, faculty, parents, and school trustees."
 "Continuing and expanding use of citizens' advisory committees composed of qualified residents to assist the school trustees in the gathering and transmission of research information and community opinion."
 "Strengthening our present program in the vital area of national and technical education

by actively seeking non-district facilities and by adding to our staff guidance counselors specifically trained in this field.

"Practical solutions for easing the school tax burden on local property owners through support of such measures as the Education Conference Board Bill (Bronston-Kottler Bill)."

"A continued professional evaluation of our track curriculum by a qualified educational agency for the purpose of determining the future course of our educational program."

"Support of the school and library budgets to insure the continued progress of these inseparable partners in good education for our children."

"To promote the right of the School District professional staff to pursue their duties without fear or prejudice within the framework of the policy of the Board of Education and the laws of the State and Nation."

Both Anderson and Goldberg appealed to all citizens of Hicksville for their support in this campaign. In their joint statement, the candidates defined extremism in education as a "restriction upon our children's opportunity for freedom of thought; that extremism whether it be ultra left or ultra right leads to censorship and undue pressures

upon our entire system of education."

The two candidates, the only officially filed to date, are being supported by the United-TEACH groups, who formed a coalition in order to "afford Hicksville voters the opportunity to overwhelming defeat the forces of extremism that constitutes a clear and present danger to the freedom of the community."

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EDITORIAL OPINION

School Board Candidates

We have long held the position that people who seek election to the Board of Education (or other local governing bodies for that matter) should not wait until the very last minute to announce their intentions. It is not fair to the voters to expect them to get acquainted with the candidates and their positions within a matter of days before they are called upon to decide.

This year, in Hicksville for example, there are two vacancies on the Board of Education. The one incumbent has stated flatly that he will not seek re-election. The other incumbent is declining to answer yes or no, but probably will run anyhow.

There are two official candidates filed and their action was commendable coming a good two weeks before the Apr. 21 deadline.

Meanwhile, to protect their right to make a decision, voters should be certain that they are registered or do so on the days provided. There is no provision under the Education Law for so-called permanent registration (although many are in favor of this, including the Hicksville Board), but if voters are careful to re-register after they vote in May, their rights for the coming year are guaranteed, provided they don't move during the interval between balloting.

We note with interest that Jericho is considering, via a question on the school ballot in May, whether or not to return to registration of voters. We never could understand why it was eliminated unless it was for the convenience of a handful who neglected to take advantage of advance registration dates. In a fast growing area with many new faces, it is almost impossible for registrars to be certain that all who seek to vote are duly qualified at the very moment they step up for a ballot. - fjn.

dense or funny but I cannot honestly see such a need.

The gentlemen on the school board are dedicated men who give unsparingly of their time. Surely there must be at least one more dedicated resident who is willing to see that the results of their labors reach the press and public.

I have volunteered but perhaps they would like a selection to choose from. Please volunteer so that they will know they are not alone in their efforts to help Hicksville.

Another point I would like to make...

When I attended the PTA meeting at which Dr. Mary Anne Raywid spoke, I did not realize I was watching history being made. Since that time, I have seen so many references to the speech I feel I was there when another "Gettysburg Address" was delivered.

The theme was "extremism". It was a generalization about the upsurge of extremism in the schools in Nassau and Suffolk Counties. Intently as I listened, I did not hear one specific instance of coercion or any other extreme action.



Education Group Endorses Budget

The West Birchwood Education Committee has approved the Jericho school District budget for the coming year. The Committee met with Dr. Leon Westfall, Assistant Superintendent, and James Slattery, business manager, and after reviewing the budget, discussed various items of concern.

The decision of the Committee was that if Jericho is to go forward educationally and if programs initiated by Dr. Carey, and described by him as essential to our system, are to be supported, then the budget must be adopted by the community.

The various essential changes in the high school curriculum, that the school board has already approved for September, might be denied our students if the budget doesn't get the approval of our residents.

Extending courses and getting experienced teachers to teach them require money. The budget contains items vital to improving Jericho education and relations with the community, such as tutorial services for students needing it and Saturday seminars for advanced students, and a school-community relations program.

The Jericho school system is in the process of improvement and much is needed if standards of education are to be maintained at an adequate level. The program which Dr. Carey started last year has to be continued this year not only to insure quality education but to make certain that the money that has to be spent is spent as part of a sensible and productive program.

The Committee's conclusion was that this was not a budget of luxuries, but only encompassed what is essential in order to keep our children from being short-changed.

The Jericho Board at its March 30 meeting approved several educational improvements that Dr. Carey, Superintendent of Schools, had recommended.

As a result of these improvements the general science course will be expanded to a full year in September '65 in grades 7 and 8, instead of 1/2 year as it is now offered, and foreign languages will be given every day in grades 7 and 8.

For those high school students who can't take the individual science courses, there will be in Sept. '65 a physical science course, which is a combination of biology, chemistry and physics.

The Board also approved for seniors a formalized course in the humanities to be given by the Art and English Dept. This will be designed along the lines of the Tuesday evening lectures that proved so successful this year.

If there is a sufficient demand for elective courses in drama and journalism, the English Dept. will be prepared to offer these courses in September.

All of these improvements were authorized by the Board and initiated by Dr. Carey.

The Legislative Committee presented a thorough report to the Board which was accepted, and the Board authorized the administration to send fliers to the community to ask residents

Civic Assoc Reviews School Budget

The Birchwood Civic Assoc. Syosset Education Committee met with the Syosset School Board members this past Wednesday. A full discussion and detailed analysis of next year's proposed budget took place at the meeting. These facts and background material relative to the budget will enable the Education Committee to make a recommendation to the Civic Association Board of Directors.

The Syosset School Board in its proposed next year's budget has provided for no new salary schedule adjustments. Despite this, the proposed budget has gone up to \$9,902,534. The main reason for the rise in budget is primarily due to automatic annual increases over which the board has no control. These include such items as increments to the salaries of teachers and other employees, 15 new teachers due to additional students, social security, health insurance etc. In addition the Board has recommended expanded studies and programs.

Despite the automatic increases and other essential improvements in our school system and in maintenance of our land and buildings, no increase in our school taxes would be necessary to meet our obligations. These increases would be offset by additional State aid. (Assuming the aid is increased to \$600 per student.) Nevertheless, our taxes will rise by 30¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation due to the fact that the taxpayers for the first time, have to pay 5% of the teachers salary to the Teachers Retirement System. This 5% was formerly paid by the teacher and deducted from the teacher's take home pay. Starting in next year's budget this 5% will no longer be deducted, thereby increasing the teachers "take home" pay.

Here in Jericho, and particularly in Birchwood the air is becoming tense. This past week, I attended budget meetings with both the Syosset and Jericho School Boards. On Tuesday evening, the members of the Civic Association's Board of Directors met with the Jericho School Board and the next night Wednesday, the Education Committee of the Syosset Section of our Civic Association met with the Syosset School Board.

I will not go into the merits of either or both school budgets because at this time it would be my own personal opinion. This past Tuesday, members of the Jericho Education Committee and on Thursday evening members of Syosset Education Committee have met individually. At that time, both committees evaluated what they learned at the school board meetings and have come up with recommendations to be presented to the Board of Directors of the Civic Association at its April 21st meeting. The Board will then publish, through the Villager, its recommendations on the budget.

Giving just facts, I will say that the proposed budget for Jericho can go up \$0.94 per 100 of assessed valuation and in Syosset \$0.30. The Syosset rate is based WITHOUT any teachers salary increases. The budget, in its present form, does not call for an increase in salaries at this time, other than normal increment raises.

A full and detailed report will be forthcoming from the respective school committees in our Civic Association.

May I once again remind our members and those who have not as yet their 1965 Civic Dues. This is the work that we do for the community, we ask for no thanks just your support by being a member. Again may I remind you that on Saturday evening, May 1, we will hold our annual election night dance at the Jericho Country Club. The nominating committee is still at work and a report on their selections will also appear shortly. So, if you are a member, or are planning to pay your dues keep Saturday, May 1st open.

It is an event that all who have ever attended speak about from year to the next. It is gratifying for members only!

Last month, VFW commander in chief John A. Jenkins stated "the Veterans of Foreign Wars fully supported President Johnson's strong actions against North Vietnam." Commander Jenkins stated that the President's decision to strike at Communist aggressors from the north was in full accord with the long time views of the VFW.

Commander Jenkins stated that the VFW is aware that Pieping and Moscow are conducting a coldly calculated drive for all of southeast Asia and if we don't make a stand there we will inevitably have to make one under less favorable conditions.

About doing business and negotiating with the Communist aggressors, Commander Jenkins had this to say: "We in this country may well realize that those who want to hoist the surrender flag through negotiations speak only for themselves and a few others who share their timid attitude. Furthermore, the VFW believes U.S. fighting men, who are now in a shooting war, should have the full backing of their country and should not have to be subjected to the gunfire of the enemy and the smirking of critics in their own country."

Concluding his statement, Mr. Jenkins said we must face up to the fact that we are at war in southeast Asia. "If we were to lose South Vietnam," he concluded, "we would inevitably be facing Communist aggression off the Pacific shores of the United States."

5. The time for which the partnership is to exist is from January 1, 1965 to January 1, 1990, unless sooner terminated as hereinafter provided. The death or disability of a general partner shall not terminate the partnership and a majority in number of the limited partners shall elect a successor general partner. Any general or limited partner may notice such election by giving ten (10) days notice in writing to all general and limited partners. This partnership shall terminate upon the sale of the last of the assets of the limited partnership.

6. The contribution of each general and limited partner is the following proportion of the equity in the above-referenced 40,000 square foot parcel:

7. The contribution of each partner, together with a proportionate share of assets and profit, is to be returned upon the termination or dissolution of the partnership.

8. The share of the profits or the compensation by way of income which each partner shall

receive by reason of his contributions are: - In each year, the general partner shall receive as and for his compensation, a sum equivalent to two per cent (2%) of the gross income for the partnership for such year; the balance of the profits shall at least annually, be divided among all of the partners as follows:

A sale or transfer to a spouse or descendant of a general or limited partner shall not constitute a breach of this agreement. The death of a partner shall constitute an offer to sell to the remaining partner effective six months after death at the then book value on an all cash basis unless by such six months period the interest in the venture is transferred to the spouse or descendant of the deceased joint venture.

10. The general partners may not admit additional limited partners without the written consent of all limited partners.

11. There shall be no right of priority as to distributions among the partners, except as above provided.

12. The general partners shall have the absolute right to sell, mortgage, lease, build upon, manage, and otherwise deal with the property of the partnership, and in no event shall the consent of the limited partners be required as to any matters pertaining to the foregoing actions with respect to the property of the partnership.

13. No partner shall have any interest in the partnership property as such, but shall only be entitled to have his interest in the partnership returned to him in cash.
