

## Ten Hurt In Bus Crash

Ten persons were injured and eight of them were taken to Syosset Hospital in Police Dept. ambulances following a collision of a bus and an auto in the south parking field of the Mid Island Plaza Sunday, May 16 at 5:45 p.m. The bus driven by Louis J. Cantanzaro, 35, of East Meadow, was bound north on Kiwanis Place, entering the Plaza, when it collided with a 63 Oldsmobile traveling west in the Plaza.

The driver of the car, Van E. Livadas, 48, of 142 Birchwood Park Dr., Jericho, received a laceration of the forehead. His wife, Mary, 43, sustained a laceration of the left eye and possible internal injuries. Phyllis Palacino, 21, of 7 Roy Ave., Hicksville, also an occupant of the car sustained an abrasion of the right knee. All three went to the hospital.

Occupants of the bus injured according to police were, Mary Bourque, 54, of 100 W. They both refused

medical attention at the scene. The bus was owned by the Haaren Transportation Co. of North Merrick. The car was owned by Deutsch and Shea of 231 West 41st St., N.Y.C.

#### HOOK DISGORGER

A kitchen tablespoon with a notch cut into the end makes a good hook disgorging.

#### DULL SPOON

If your old standby bright gold or silver spoon isn't meeting with the approval of the walleyes, try this. Hold a match under the spoon far enough away so the smoke dulls it slightly. Sometimes flash is too bright and the duller action does the trick.

#### FIRE STARTER

If you use a pencil sharpener save the shavings. They'll start a fire with a strong hot flame.

#### SAFETY SHELLS

If you want to be extra careful about not getting the wrong size shell in a shotgun always buy one color for each gun. Green for 12, red for 20, blue for 16 and so forth. Paint inserting edge of shotgun's chamber the same color. Unless colors match as you load up, something is wrong.

#### BASS BAIT

If you find school bass raiding shad-type minnows try this tip: take a clincher sinker and clinch it to a long-shanked hook. Scrape it until it gleams. Tip with a sliver of porkrind and cast right in among 'em. Work the lure in short, fast jerks.

#### BEANED!

An old ice fisherman's trick is to sprinkle light-colored beans on the bottom under his spear-throwing hole. When a fish swims past he shows up against the white specks and ... gets beaned.

#### DRY MATCHES

If your matches ever get wet, there is a way to dry them. Run 'em through your hair.

#### FROG BAIT

Try this on summer hot days when the bass aren't striking. Take a small meadow frog and put a rubber band around his middle. Slip a hook under the rubber band and let the frog go for a swim over—but not in—some deep weed beds.

#### BLANKET YOUR BOAT

Sometimes aluminum boats can be noisy. Easy way to quiet them down is to throw an old blanket in the bottom. Water soon make it an effective sound deadener.

#### NO STICK SNOW

If you've got a lot of shoveling to get back to your cabin make the job easier by rubbing a candle over the shovel blade. Even damp wet snow can't stick to a waxed surface.

#### PORK RIND

For a deadly bait for big bass and pike make your own pork rind. ... Like this. Cut fresh rind one inch wide and ten inches long. Taper toward rear and split end back two inches. Insert a No. 4 hook at the front and half way back insert another. Tie the two together with 50-pound-test monofilament. Troll or cast.

#### ROD CASE

Aluminum TV aerials cut into appropriate section make good rod cases. If you use 2-inch diameter, ends can be neatly stopped with Thermos stoppers. On larger sizes, wood plugs do the job.

#### STORE LEATHER BOOTS

Your leather boots will last longer and keep their shape better if you always stuff cloth or paper inside before putting them away for any length of time. Store in a cool place, too.

## OUTDOOR TIPS

from the Ancient Age Sportsman's Idea Exchange

### STUNG!

Hornets and wasps are camp hazards, let's face it. You can reduce that hazard with a small bottle of ammonia. A quick dab on a sting neutralizes much of the acid, cuts down the pain.

### BOAT FENDERS

You can protect the sides of a boat that works hard with old auto tires. Slice off quarter sections and nail vertically to sides. Place bow, stern and middle.

### STOP SLIP

Have to run on ice? Stop slip by wrapping heavy rubber bands around your shoes.

### HARD MOUTHED DOG

If your pup is too hard mouthed with game, try this:

Take a pocket full of dry dog pellets and keep him well fed. Full stomachs sometimes seems to soften up a dog's carry.

### DRY BOOTS & WADERS

Your vacuum cleaner has a reverse on it that blows air, instead of sucking it. Blow air in wet boots or waders and see if in an hour they aren't dry.

### DOUGH BALLS

Add a very small amount of water to Wheaties breakfast cereal. Knead until the flakes turn into dough. Sprinkle with salt and sugar in small amounts. Now try the balls as carp bait.

### EMERGENCY TIP

Break a rod tip in the field

and you're through fishing. Not if you tape the eye of a big safety pin to the end of your rod. It will work until you can make permanent repairs.

### SNOW SHOOTING

Hunting rabbits in snowy weather, your score will improve if you paint the sighting bead red. Throws the eye quicker past the gun barrel and out on the game.

### PLASTIC SEAT

A square sheet of light plastic takes up no room in your hunting coat or tackle box. But it sure comes in handy when you want a dry place to rest on a rainy day. Light plastic protectors dry cleaners use is good.

### SURE FIRE SUNNY BAIT

This is sure fire we are assured. Catches sunfish, perch, bluegills and catfish. Take cooking dough and mix in it pieces of angle worms. Add mulberries. If you can't get mulberries substitute grasshoppers. Sounds awful? Ask the fish.

### WATERPROOF MATCH BOX

Maybe one of the oldest tips and probably one of the best is to use an empty 12 gauge shotgun shell over an empty 16 gauge shotgun shell as a waterproof match case. Sizes are such that the two hold tightly together.

### SPONGE BAIT

Where salmon eggs take fish, try cutting red sponges into little balls and use them when the real thing is hard to find.

### BLUE FIRE STARTER

Tubes of glue used to cement plastic usually burn with hard hot flame. Carry a tube and use as a wet weather fire starter.

### "CANNED" HEAT

Put a roll of toilet paper in a coffee can. Fill with alcohol or Kerosene. Pour off excess and light. Burns for hours with warm cheerful flame.
