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Father Goggin Leaves, To Start New Parish

The Rev. Leo J. Goggin, an assistant pastor at St. Ignatius Loyola Parish in Hicksville since 1960, will leave this weekend to become the founding pastor of the Church of St. Matthew in Dix Hills. At the same time, Most Rev. Walter F. Kellenberg, Bishop of the Diocese, announced the transfer of another assistant to St. Ignatius.

The Church of St. Matthew, to be established on the service road of the LI Expressway, 1000 feet west of Carle's Straight Path, Dix Hills, will be among the first parishes in the Diocese since five were established in 1962. It brings to 121 the total number of Catholic parishes in Nassau and Suffolk Counties.

The Rev. William G. Gallagher, assistant, has been transferred from the Church of St. Philip Neri, Northport, to St. Ignatius.

Second Rejection: Library Bd Ponders Next Move on Budget

The Trustees of Hicksville Public Library are scheduled to hold a special meeting on June 30 to determine future action regarding the library budget which was rejected for a second time this week. Although fewer voters cast their ballots, the budget was defeated by 52 votes as compared with five votes in May.

Voting was relatively light on Wednesday of this week with a total of 2,565 votes cast with 5,182 registered. The proposition lost in every voting district except Fork Lane and Dutch Lane areas.

There were 1,308 no votes and 1,257 in favor. The vote on May 5 had been 2,499 no and 2,495 yes.

A number of voters were disappointed to discover that their registration for 1964-65 was not valid. They had apparently failed to re-register at the annual meeting on May 5 or register on June 9.

All voters who registered at the annual meeting of May 5, 1964, were given blue registration cards warning them that their qualification would expire on June 4, 1965, or 30 days after the May 5, 1965 voting. They were also advised that "if in doubt, check on registration days."

Important Election Looms As GOP Picks Fehrenbach

The battle for control over the Oyster Bay Town Board and most of its governmental structure got into high gear this week as Republican candidates were designated by a convention of committeemen in Bethpage.

The Democrats with Michael Pettito concluding his first two-year term as Supervisor want to take over control by re-electing him together with three Town Councilmen which could give them four out of seven votes. Pettito today has a single vote while the six Councilmen are Republicans.

Town Councilmen are elected at-large in the Township although candidates are usually selected to give representation to all portions of the Town.

The Democrats have named as their Councilman candidates Myron Ng Steinberg, an attorney from West Hirschwood at Jericho; Mary Motta, member of Plainedge School Board; and James A. Rasmussen of Oyster Bay.

The Republicans this week named Edwin Fehrenbach, popular State Assemblyman and a former Deputy Supervisor, as their choice for the top administrative office. The terms of Councilman Marjorie Post of Massapequa, Louis Sisto of Bethpage and Peter Allison of Mill Neck run out this year. The GOP candidates will probably be Angelo Boncallo of Massapequa, present Tax Receiver Frank Hynes of Farmingdale and Ralph Marano from East Norwich.

Democrat Joseph McPartlin of Massapequa will oppose incumbent Republican Town Clerk William B. O'Keefe. It promises to be a long, hot summer with all the numerous candidate appearances at picnics and outings followed by the fall opening of individual community campaign headquarters, candidate debates and shaking hands with commuters right up until the final decision in November.

PREMATURE MEMORIAL

To the Editor:

Is God so dead that our board of education must memorialize Him in every building with plaques alongside those of the architects whose work is finished, the trustees long forgotten, and the graduates fallen in battle? I hope not! A memorial plaque to God is premature, I think, though some of my friends may disagree. I prefer not to reduce Him to the level of a former athletic champion whose only remaining fame is the inscription of his name in the school trophy case. Furthermore, the proposed wording, "In God We Trust" - seems slightly cynical right now while we are spending most of our national income on instruments of war; an unbecomingly critic might wonder which God is meant.

Plaques and words commemorate the dead, the living are served by deeds. If we must build a monument to the "passing" of anyone, let it be for that retiring school board member who proposed the idea.



Doctrines of deceit and destruction are not new. They've existed in one form or another ever since the 12th century. At that time there was an organization called the "Confrerie de la Paix," whose principles were much the same as those which exist in the world today. Their tenets included destroying, breaking down and leveling anything not under their control. Under these concepts they began to destroy the works of art but strong government led to the destruction of these principles.

In 1776, Adam Weishaupt, a Bavarian professor, founded a secret rationalistic, anticlerical sect known as the "Society of the Illuminati," communistic in every aspect. Their basic principles were related to those of the communist line today:

- Abolition of government
- Abolition of private property
- Abolition of inheritance
- Abolition of patriotism

Abolition of family
Abolition of religion
In the 1860's Sergey Gensadovich Nechayev, a name unknown to many of us, single handed forged out a code of revolutionary conduct which has a strong effect in the world today. The most significant of all his documents was called "The Revolutionary Catechism." This sickening doctrine consisted of four groups dealing with the relations of the revolutionary towards himself, towards his comrades, towards society and the attitude of society toward the people. This document of hate depicts the revolutionary as a doomed man, despising all doctrines and public opinion, dedicated to the State and tyrannical toward himself and others.

Nechayev's doctrine was to have important consequences for the world since it was read by Lenin and influenced him. It was also restated in the arid terms of Marxist philosophy, but its essentials remain the same guiding principles of Lenin's political activity.

Compare these dogmas of deception to that of our Bill of Rights which guarantees freedom of speech, freedom of religion,
