LI Sound Bridge Is 'Feasible'

A Long Island Sound crossing between the north shore of Nassau County and the south shore of Westchester County is "economically feasible as a self-supporting toll project, and can be built at no direct cost to the taxpayer," according to a study undertaken for the State Department of Public Works and the Triborough Bridge and Tunnel Authority of New York City.

The conclusion, involving bond-financing and operation of the bridge by a public authority, was contained in a 72-page report by Madigan-Hyland Inc., consulting engineers, which was engaged by both public agencies for the study in August 1964.

In releasing the report, Superintendent of Public Works J. Burch McMorran said the Dept. of Public Works would analyze the findings and conclusions.

The proposed six and one-half mile bridge would extend from Oak Neck Point north of Bayville, to a point near Oakland Beach Ave., just southwest of

Cost of the four-lane bridge and its immediate approaches was estimated at \$130 million, and interest charges on debt during construction at \$10 million for an overall total of \$140 million. The amount could be amortized over a period of 35 or 40 years under a toll schedule ranging from a single trip passenger car toll of \$1 to a maximum of \$3.50 for the largest trucks. A half-rate commuter toll was anticipated for regular commuters.

Playland, on the Westchester shore. It would be linked with already-planned or existing express routes - including the Wantagh-Oyster Bay Expressway now under construction in Nassau County and the New England Thruway and Cross Westchester Expressway in Westchester County - via existing facilities and shore connections to be built or enlarged under the Federal-State highway program.

Angler of Angle Lane

Henry, a 25-year member of the New York City Police Dept. currently on vacation, went fishing aboard the Capt. Briggs party boat out of Captree, Saturday, and landed a 14 pound fluke - which is a pretty good size as any fluke fisherman will agree. Actually the fluke might have weighed in more. The fish was too big for the net and the boat captain had to use a spear to help land the fish. In the process a portion of its middle section was dropped.

The fluke won Henry the pool for the day on his boat, but he had failed to enter the dock pool (that is, fishermen on all boats each contribute to a total pool for the biggest fish of the day) and as a result an 8 lb fluke won the dock pool. Henry's 14 lb catch, which was officially weighed for the seasonal awards of the LI State Park Commission in cooperation with several commercial organizations, failed to win the dock pool which came to about \$500.

Postmaster Position Still Open As Speculation Grows

As this issue of the HERALD went to press the status of the postmaster of Hicksville, one of the largest offices on Long Island, was somewhat vague. Irene Murphy had submitted her resignation some weeks ago, effective July 16. However, informed sources state that the resignation has not as yet been officially "accepted."

Mrs. Murphy spoke to the main office staff on July 16 and thanked the supervisors and personnel for their cooperation during her approximately four years on the job. She disclosed she is planning to make a vacation trip to Europe commencing the end of this month.

Meanwhile, there has been nothing official released regarding her possible successor. Edward Glaselli, Hicksville north Democratic leader and printing plant owner, and Edward Quinn, fuel oil dealer who is active in veteran affairs, are the two most prominently mentioned names as the possible successor to Mrs. Murphy.

O'Keefe Offers Some Teaching

Expressing amazement "that a history teacher would have such an utter disregard for the accuracy of facts and sources," Oyster Bay Town Clerk William B. O'Keefe in a letter has invited his Democratic opponent "to meet with me so that I may acquaint you with the duties and operations of this office."

Said O'Keefe, "I am certain a man of your integrity would never have made the charges you did unless you were woefully misinformed."

O'Keefe referred to charges made recently by his opponent. The Town Clerk explained that as a result of implementing the proposals made in the report of McKinsey and Company Inc., management consultants, additional functions were also transferred to his jurisdiction. "Despite the added personnel and functions," O'Keefe said, "the total actual expenditures of the office for 1964 were \$185,508.36 and not \$203,000.00 as charged."

"That represents an increase of slightly more than one percent over the McKinsey estimated expenditure of

\$183,336.00," O'Keefe said. The Town Clerk said, "Rather than ignoring the McKinsey Report, we have implemented its proposals, which called for the additional personnel and additional payroll my opponent condemns."

O'Keefe said, "In short, the charges are baseless. Therefore, in the interests of avoiding further public misinformation, I'd like to cordially invite you to contact me so that you may learn the truth about this office and, in addition, so that I may answer any other questions you might have."


The first International Conference and Exhibit sponsored by the American Management Association was held from July 12 to 16 in the Americana Hotel in New York City.

Charge Petito Obstructs Master Plan

Town Board Majority Leader Edward J. Poulos has accused Town Supervisor Michael N. Petito of delaying the "implementation" of the Town's master plan by refusing to sign the contract with a professional planner.

Poulos charged Petito's "procrastination" as an "arbitrary refusal to perform his duty and as a 'dereliction of his position as Town Supervisor.'"

He explained that on June 1st the Town adopted a resolution appointing Seymour Stillman of Jericho as the professional planning consultant to the Development and Planning Action Department to assist the Town Board with technical matters pertaining to planning. The Supervisor demanded the Board "direct" him to sign the contract and the resolution was amended on June 15 to cater to his whim. Poulos explained that under Town Law the supervisor is mandated to sign any contract approved by the board and does not need specific direction to do so.

"The Town Board went along

by amending the resolution in the interest of getting the contract signed and the work started immediately," said Poulos. "However, a month has passed since our amended resolution was approved and the Supervisor insists on procrastinating to the detriment of the entire plan."

Poulos added that the Supervisor is "seriously thwarting the will of the people" of the Town of Oyster Bay.

"As a matter of fact," Poulos said, "this precise point was decided by the State's highest court (the Court of Appeals) when the last Democratic Supervisor in the Town of Oyster Bay also tried to obstruct the Town Board in a similar matter and the eminent Judge Pound said in the case of 'Oystermen's Dock Company vs. Downing (Supervisor Benjamin W. Downing) on January 5, 1932...' The Supervisor has no veto power over the resolutions of the Town Board. He should bow to the wish of the majority in all things lawful. Thus are democracies governed."

The master plan was initiated by the Town Board last August to provide for the orderly future growth of the Town.

Stillman was retained despite the Supervisor's objections because it was felt that his association with the Town of Oyster Bay since 1957 put him in the unique position of knowing the Town's problems and enabling him to act expeditiously on these problems without wasting six months' time familiarizing himself with the situation and wasting the taxpayers' monies.

The Town Board Majority Leader urged the Supervisor to sign the contract so that the master plan can immediately be put into action by having the consultant start work and explore the Town's needs.

Meanwhile Supervisor Petito has indicated that he will continue to withhold his signature from a \$78,000 contract to hire Stillman as a general contractor in drawing up a Master Plan. Petito reiterated his charge that the Town Board was "committing a monumental error in hiring Stillman without ever once considering any other offers from planning firms."

The Supervisor said the future of the Township would be vitally affected by the Master Plan and he questioned the validity of both the contract itself and the local law under which it was drawn.

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ANGRY HOMEOWNER EXPOSES GAS HEAT ESTIMATE

"Through no great desire to win a prize, but because of a desire to help anyone who attempts to correct the extravagant claims of 'Lico' I am giving my reasons for switching.

Enjoy a Pleasant Evening

They have a new show down at Jones Beach Marine Theatre this season and we would be something less than honest if we did not suggest you include it in your summertime fun.

The story line is not mind-bending but some of the numbers staged by June Taylor are exciting to say the very least. That business with the pirate polka is dazzling.

After going to a number of these Jones Beach shows we were inclined to be cynical and cold. But who could be cold to those spectacles, from a 35-foot chandler to a full grown pirate ship, complete with dancing pirates and lovely maidens. And then the Carrie Nation episode rates an extra slug.

"Mardi Gras" may never win a Pulitzer prize but some of those dance spectacles should win an immortal niche in the hall of fame for June Taylor.

Red Cross Gives Swim Warning

The danger of drowning from holding one's breath under water was stressed by Mr. Henry Hartmann, Director of Water Safety of the Nassau County Chapter, American Red Cross.

Hartmann was especially emphatic in his warning to children who compete with each other to see who can stay under water the longest.

"Youngsters who play this game are asking for trouble, and possible tragedy," he declared. "In recent months, at least three persons have died as a result."

"What happens physiologically is this," Hartmann explained. "Before going under water, an individual takes several deep breaths in order to build up as much oxygen as possible in his lungs. This deep breathing, called hyperventilation, does increase the oxygen, but at the same time it lowers the carbon dioxide in the system."

"After a period under water, because the carbon dioxide does not build up fast enough to trigger the breathing urge, the swimmer tends to stay under water too long and is in danger of blacking out. Unless help is at hand to get him up to the surface very quickly, death will result."

"Many drownings could be avoided if these facts were understood," Hartmann said. He urged that parents teach them

to their children and that swimmers of all ages be made aware of them.

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
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Swimming Assoc in Full Swing
