

# Charge Petito Obstructs Master Plan

Town Buard Majority Leader Edward J. Poulos has accused Town Supervisor Alchael N. Pe-tito of delayingthe "implementa-tion of the Town's master plan" by refusing to sign the contract with a professional planner. Poulos charged Petito's "pro-crastination" as an arbitrary

Poulos charged Petito's "pro-crastination" as an arbitrary refusal to perform his duty and as a "dereliction of his position as Town Supervisor" Town Supervisor." He explained that on June 1st

the Town adopted a resolution ap-pointing Seymour Stillman of bie flown adopted resolution ap-pointing segmour stillman of Jericho as the professional plan-ning consultant to the Develop-ment and Planning. The Town Board with technical matters pertain-ing to planning. The Supervisor demanded the Board "direct" bin to sign the contract and the resolution was amended on June 15 to catter to his whim. Poulos explained that under Town Law the supervisor is mandated to sign any contract approved by the Board and does not need specific direction to do so. "The Town Board weat along of

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by amending the resolution in the interest of getting the con-tract signed and the work started immediately," said Poulos. tract signed and the work started immediately," asid Poulos. "However, a month has passed since our amended resolution was approved and the Supervisor insists on procrastinating to the detriment of the entire plan." Poulos added that the Super-visor is "seriously thwarting the will of the people" of the Town of Oyster Bay. "As a matter of fact," Poulos said, "this precise point was decided by the State's highest court ( the Court of Appeals) when the last Democratic Super-visor in the Town of Oyster Bay also tried to obstruct the Town Board in a similar matter and the eminent Judge Pound said in the case of 'Oystermen's Dock Company vs. Downing Caper-visor has no veto power over the resolutions of the Town Board, the should bow to the wish of the

resolutions of the Town Board. He should bow to the wish of the majority in all things lawful. Thus are democracies governed'."

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The master plan was initiated by the Town Board last August to provide for the orderly future wrowth of the Town growth of the Town. Stillman was retained despite

growth of the Town. Stillman was retained despite the Supervisor's objections be-cause it was fet that his associa-tion with the Town of Cyster Bay since 1957 put him in the unique position of knowing the Town's problems and enabling him to act expeditiously on these problems without wasting six month's time familiarizing himself with the situation and wasting the tax-payers' monies. The Town Board Majority Leader urged the Supervisor to sign the contract so that the master plan can immediately be put into action by having the con-sultant start work and explore the Town's needs.

Town's needs. Meanwhile' Supervisor Petito has indicated thathe will continue to withhold his signature from a \$78,000 contract to hire Still-man as a general contractor in drawing up a Master Plan. Petito reitereated his charge that the Town Board was "committing a monumental error in hiring Still-man without ever once consider-ing any other offers from planning firms."

The Supervisor said the future of the Township would be vitally affected by the Master Plan and he questioned the validity of both the contract itself and the local law under which it was drawn.



**Red Cross Gives** Swim Warning

The danger of drowning from holding one's breath under water

The danger of drowning from holding one's breath under water was stressed by Mr. Henry Hart-mann, Director of Water Safery of the Nassau County Chapter, American Red Cross. Hartmam was especially em-phatic in his warning to children who compete with each other to see who can stay under water the longest. "Youngsters who play this game are asking for trouble, and possible tragedy," he de-clared. "In recent months, at least three persons have died as a result." "What happens hisiologically is this ," Hartmann explained. "Before going under water, an individual takes several deep breaths in order to build up as much oxygen as possible in

Before going under water, an individual takes several deep breaths in order to build up as much oxygen as possible in his lungs. This deep breathing, called hyperventilation, does in-crease the oxygen, built at the same tide in the system. "After a period under water, because the carbon dioxide does build up fast enough to trig-ger the breathing urge, the swimmer tends to stay under of blacking out. Unless help is at hand to get him up to the surface very quickly, death will usut.
