PTA "OPEN HOUSE"

The Lee Ave P.T.A. of Hicksville will have an "Open House" meeting on Dec 9th at 8:15 P.M. At the conclusion of a brief business meeting, the parents of Kindergarten through fourth grade students will have the opportunity to meet and confer with the teachers.

Most local people feel that the right to vote in local, state and federal elections is something to be exercised at will rather than mandated by law.

This opinion was expressed by well over the majority of respondents in the November ballot in Meadow Brook National Bank's Community Opinion Poll. The vote was 31.0% for mandatory voting; 66.2% against it and 2.8% undecided, according to Jirah D. Cole, manager of the Bank's Hicksville Office. In Jericho, according to Charles Barvels, 59.2% are against and 35.9% in favor.

Generally, there was decidedly mixed opinions as to whether or not there should be a stricter code of censorship in the licensing of motion pictures. Here in Hicksville, the vote was 49.0% in favor of stricter censoring; 49.4% opposed to it and 1.6% were undecided. The vote in Jericho was 37.1% yes and 62.7% opposed.

The 1964-65 World's Fair received a slight vote of approval throughout the area while 56.7% of the Hicksville respondents felt the fair had been a success; 39.4% felt it had not and 3.9% were undecided. Jericho residents who felt it was a success came to 52.1% with 41.4% negative and 6.5% undecided.

Summer vacations on Long Island received a moderate recommendation area-wide as 61.3% of the voters in this community indicated they would suggest Long Island to out-of-town friends; 37.1% said they would not and 1.6% were undecided. Jericho people would not recommend LI by 52.1% of their ballots.

During December questions are being asked concerning the power of public opinion on elected officials; the use of town and county parks by non-residents; the giving of sex education in our public schools; and the value of making New Year's resolutions.

Incumbents Win Jericho Library Re-Election Here Opens This Month

Incumbents were re-elected Tuesday night as fire and water commissioners in this area.

Harold Manaskie Sr. was given 167 votes and easily earned another five-year term. There was one write in for Mel Voorhies for Hicksville - Fire Commissioner and two void ballots.

In Plainview, Joseph Segall was re-elected water commissioner with 937 ballots. His opponent Bob Reynolds received 393.

Jericho Fire District voters returned William Simpson to office as commissioner with 340 votes as against 118 for Joseph Mazz. Bob Myers, unopposed for district treasurer, received 355 ballots.

Incumbent Harold Kreutzer was re-elected Jericho Water Commissioner with 597 ballots. He defeated Herbert Zayer who polled 70.

Manaskie told the HERALD yesterday he wished to express his thanks and appreciation to the voters of the Hicksville Fire District for their substantial vote of confidence on Tuesday.

FIRE THIS MORNING DAMAGES DELICATESSEN

"Considerable damage" was caused to the Delicatessen at the West Village Green on Newbridge Rd., Hicksville, this morning (Thurs) by fire of undetermined origin. Forty-five volunteers under Assistant Chief Clifford Davis with four trucks responded to the alarm at 6:36 AM. They returned to headquarters two hours later.

The Nassau County Fire Marshall's office was requested to investigate the possible cause and the Nassau Board of Health was notified.

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Derounian to Seek Congress Nomination

Former Congressman Steven B. Derounian of Roslyn Heights announced this week he is a candidate for election to the seat he previously held in the U.S. Congress. From 1953 until 1964, he represented what is now the Third Congressional District. The former congressman made his official announcement at a press conference held at his office, 600 Old Country Road, Garden City.

Derounian said he would actively campaign for the Republican nomination and will personally contact every committee man and area chairman to present his views and ask their support.

"My decision to run was made easier by the overwhelming expressions of support from many individuals and groups in all areas of the district," Derounian said.

"This enthusiastic backing covers a broad political spectrum and includes Republicans, Democrats and Independents.

"I certainly appreciate this support because it indicated the people, the voters, are interested in positive and effective representation in Congress by a

Congressman who truly represents their interests and understands the needs of the district." Pointing to his record during his 12 years in Congress, he said numerous bills he advocated and supported are now on the statute books, many passed during the present administration of President Johnson.

Some of the legislation includes: Civil Rights Act of 1964; revisor of the Immigration Laws allowing families to be reunited in this country; repeal of excise taxes on commodities used every day; higher education grants to help fast-growing colleges; granting cost-of-living increase to those on Social Security; aid to vocational education through grants to the States; banning smut and all forms of indecent literature in the U.S. mails; Housing Act helping states meet urban renewal needs; grants for mental retardation programs; land and water conservation fund to protect our national resources; mass transportation act to help commuters and industry; increased defense appropriations to keep the nation militarily strong, and to combat

the fast-rising crime rate and narcotic addiction.

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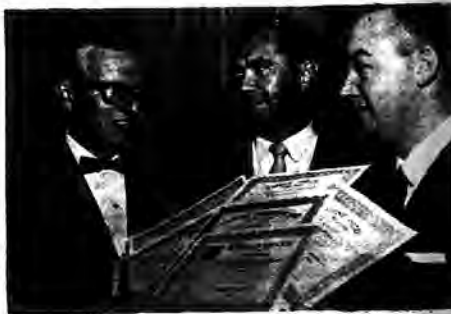
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All Around Town

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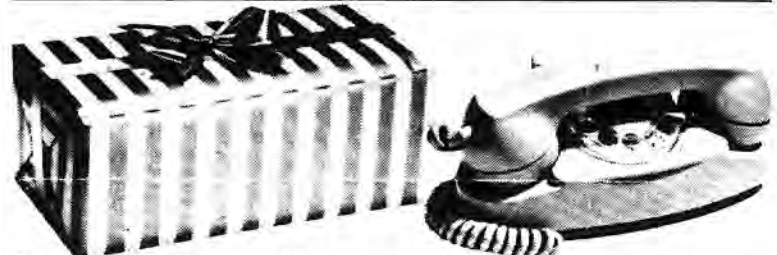
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Steps to Strengthen Downtown

Editor's Note - This is the second of two articles on downtown problems based upon a report by the NY State Joint Legislative Committee on Metropolitan Areas Study. Solutions suggested may be of more than passing interest in the Mid Island area.)

Although the central business districts in most communities are facing a crisis today, there are a great many things going for them.

Downtown is still the center of area life, offering diversification in shops, commercial activities, cultural programs and amusements. In addition, it is the headquarters for government.

Steps are being taken to protect these important contributions to the economics of the community. Arterials and new parking facilities are common in almost every downtown area. Plans are under way in most places for clearing out blighted sections, and constructing museums, exhibition halls, and government buildings.

The possibilities for downtown are limited only by the imagination of community leaders. Some are considering the rehabilitated blighted localities adjacent to downtown as the logical location for community colleges.

Others see the potential of skating rinks, combined park-amusement areas in downtown locations, special markets, fairs and exhibits on a continuing basis, all geared to one objective -- to attract people once again to the hub of the region.

But, to be successful, merchants and business concerns must be confident that their interests are protected. If assessments jump drastically every time a new store front is completed, the storekeeper will either allow his store to physically de-

teriorate or move outside of the core area.

New investors must first be sold on the possibilities of a site for constructing a new building, and secondly that it is economically feasible.

The Joint Legislative Committee has proposed a package of bills and recommendations aimed at overcoming many of these

problems.

First is a bill which would freeze tax assessments on property undergoing rehabilitation for up to five years, so that higher taxes would not have to be paid on buildings under construction until the structure was completed and making a profit.

Another bill offered by the Committee for study purposes would provide a mortgage guarantee by the state for capital expenditures to improve blighted downtown areas. Working as a mortgage insurance program, it would give additional impetus to major construction projects, and bring in sorely needed private investments.

Two recommendations made by the Committee would also further the downtown potential.

The first would provide for distribution of a manual of renewal sites in downtown localities across the state so that potential investors would be informed as to where such sites exist. No such information is now available so that often good sites go begging simply because investors are not aware of them.

The Committee sees the salvation of downtown as an important factor in the future economy of

New York State communities and the state itself. The major share of solving the problem rests with the local community, but the state must provide the tools where it is feasible.
