Speno Backs Rockefeller:

Nassau Delegation Hails New Session

Every Mid-Island community and the leading villages and cities of Nassau were well-represented in Albany yesterday (Wed.) for the opening of the 189th session of the New York State Legislature, climaxed by a reception for hundreds from Nassau attended by Governor Rockefeller and other state officials. The reception, the first of its kind and hosted by the Nassau Republican legislative team, was held in the 12th floor ballroom of the Ten Eyck Hotel last night.

The colorful and impressive opening of the session featured the address by Gov. Rockefeller to the joint session of the Assembly and Senators in the Assembly chamber starting at 1 PM. Many of the audience watched the proceedings from the lobby of the chamber and other parts of the building by TV.

At the Ten Eyck Ballroom, starting at 4 PM, the reception was held. The Governor and Mrs. Rockefeller received an ovation when they arrived shortly before 6 PM. Lt. Governor Malcolm Wilson noted that when he was in the Assembly, Nassau had two Assemblymen -- Norman Penny and John Bennett, now Nassau County Surrogate -- and shared a State Senator with Queens County. Today there are five State Senators and nine Assemblymen from Nassau.

State Senator Edward Speno, chairman of the Nassau County Republican Committee, introduced the legislators from Nassau, the Governor, Lt. Governor Wilson, State Attorney Louis Lefkowitz and other officials.

Speno called for a "go go Nassau" and the entire proceedings had the ear marks of the opening of the 1966 campaign. He indicated his wholehearted support for the re-election of Rockefeller.

Michael D'Auria of Plainview, chairman of the Oyster Bay Town Republican Committee, joined a private dinner party for the press and town Republican leaders at Keeler's later in the evening before chartered busses left Albany for Long Island. Among those present at the dinner were Julius Schwartz, Hicksville Republican leader; Harvey Schluter and Jerry Trotta, Hicksville GOP executive committee men; Joseph Giordano, Hicksville attorney; Ralph Diamond of Jericho, special attorney for the Town of Oyster Bay on the new Home Rule Law; Francis O'Connor, deputy town engineer and GOP leader of Locust Valley; State Senator Henry M. Curran; Town Councilman A. Carl Grunewald of Hicksville.

The hundreds from Nassau came in chartered buses and private cars and by airplane for one of the most unique demonstrations in the history of the County, unduplicated by any other segment of the State.

Schwartz is back in Albany this year as legal counsel for Senator Curran who will be chairman of the standing Senate committee on banking. Also back this year, his 22nd, will be Schluter as legislative aide to the Nassau Assembly contingent. He had served in Albany with the late David Hill, John J. Burns and Edwin Fehrenbach.

672 Businesses In Directory

Hicksville retained its position as No. 3 as among Nassau communities in the number of retailers, wholesalers and manufacturers, according to the January 1966 edition of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book, it was learned this week. There are 672 businesses listed for Hicksville this year. Valley Stream kept first place position with 748 businesses.

Farmingdale jumped from 4th to 2nd place with 717, Hempstead, which was second last year, slipped back to fourth with 669. Freeport stayed at 5th with 616 and the rest of the top ten held the same positions as a year ago: Great Neck, 6th; Westbury, 7th; New Hyde Park, 8th; Mineola, 9th; Lynbrook, 10th. Dun & Bradstreet said that the jump of Farmingdale to second place reflected the increasing industrialization of that area.

Last year the Legislative Committee of the Department of New York met at Rochester to draft a V.F.W. program based on the mandates of the Lake Placid Convention. Some of the key points in the legislative program are:

To amend the State Constitution so as to provide the payment of a KOREAN BONUS similar to the one paid to the veterans of World War II and to include in this measure, if at all possible, or a separate act, to include the current group of veterans serving in Viet Nam and other areas wherein they are the recipient of the American Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal.

To move for the expansion of the DIVISION OF VETERANS AFFAIRS on COUNSEL level to cope with the ever increasing problem of the ageing veteran.

To amend the Real Property Tax Exemption Law by specifically including a provision which will grant an exception of monies received by the veteran as a result of his being a former prisoner of war.

To seek full support of the State Legislature to memorialize Congress as to the need for either the expansion of existing National Cemeteries wherein possible, or the creation of new Cemeteries within the State of New York.

To generate support to make Loyalty Day a Legal Holiday.

"Under the guise of Academic Freedom we seem to be financing our own destruction. We urge the State Legislature to adopt if necessary, or enforce existing statutes, which would absolutely prohibit the utilization of any and all

buildings, schools, colleges, or other facilities that receive subsidy in whole or in part from the State of New York by individual or organization listed as subversive by the Attorney General or the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

To continue the traditional handling of adoptions by our Surrogate's Courts opposed to Family Court.

The foregoing items represent some of those approved at the Lake Placid Convention pertaining to the State of New York. Those of Federal nature requiring Congressional action have been forwarded to the National Legislative Director in Washington.

Gillies Calls for Asian Alliance

Warning that Thailand will be the "next Vietnam", Archibald L. Gillies, Glen Head executive who is seeking the Republican designation in Nassau's Third Congressional District, urged on Monday the creation of an "Asian Alliance for Progress...to enable the countries from India to Japan to develop as a counterforce to the threat of communist China."

While supporting the efforts of the President in Vietnam, Gillies said the administration has failed to develop an overall Asian policy; that it moves from crisis to crisis with "half prepared responses," and seems to have at times "180 different foreign policies in 180 different countries."

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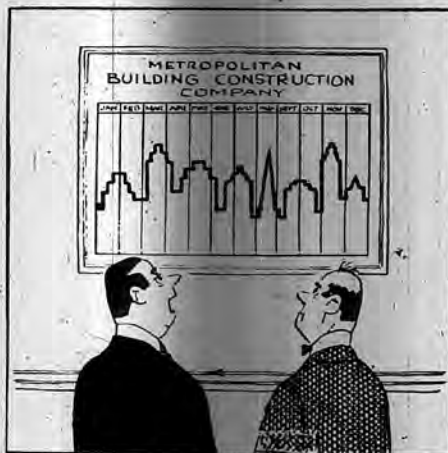
