## LI National Tops Hundred Million

President William E. Koutsensky of the Long Island National Bank reported to the shareholders at the Annual Meeting on Tuesday, Jan. 11, with great pleasure the condition and progress of the Bank, as the total resources at year end exceeded the "One Hundred Million Dollar" mark. This is the first time in the long history of the Bank that it has achieved this size.

Total resources increased by \$9,318,000, during this past year to a new all-time high of \$100,972,500. This growth was achieved in the atmosphere of another year of high competitiveness for the local banking business among the numerous financial institutions in the greater Long Island area.

Loan demand was strong during the year, increasing the year end loan portfolio to over \$64 million. Securities held at year end totaled over \$26 million.

Two stock dividends of 2-1/2%

each, totaling 5%, were paid during 1965. Earnings for the year, after taxes, amounted to \$1.52 per share.

A word of thanks was expressed to the Board of Directors, officers and the many stockholders for the fine cooperation given to the continued success of the Bank.

## Strong Support On Sex Study

In answer to the question, "Should sex education be given in our public schools?", there was a resounding "Yes!" from the more than 8,000 respondents to the Meadow Brook National Bank Community Opinion Poll for the month of December, it was announced today by Charles J. Barvels, manager of the Bank's Jericho office. Locally, the results showed 78.0% in favor of this concept; 19.3% opposed and 2.3% were undecided.

There was mixed feeling as to the value of letter-writing in influencing local, state or federal officials with a positive attitude having a slight edge generally. In Jericho, 43.9% believe that the letters carried some weight, while 54.4% felt they had no influence and 1.7% were undecided.

As might be expected, Nassau and Suffolk respondents were strongly opposed to opening up Long Island town and county parks for the use of non-residents while New York City people, for the most part, were desirous of such action. Locally, 21.9% favored making the parks available to non-residents; 78.0% opposed it and 9.1% were undecided.

Finally, it was felt that the making of New Year's resolutions was strictly for fun and had very little lasting value. However, there were some who believed that a New Year's resolution was a pretty good guide line for the ensuing 12 months. The vote here was 24.3% in support of resolutions; 73.3% negating them and 2.6% undecided.

## Under New Suburban Law:

# Town Management Now Petito's Responsibility As Supervisor

The all-Republican Oyster Bay Town Board this week put Democratic Supervisor Michael Petito of Plainview on formal notice that he must now "carry the ball and demonstrate leadership" in the management of the affairs of the township under the Suburban Town Law which became effective Jan. 1.

During his first two year term in office as Supervisor, Petito represented the township on the County Board of Supervisors. In town affairs, his vote was equal to that of the six councilmen, all Republicans, who comprise the town board. During those two years, Petito consistently complained in print that he was "outnumbered".

A White Paper issued Tuesday by the still all-Republican six-man council said "We eagerly await receipt of the Supervisor's suggestions and recommendations for solutions to the many problems with which the Town is faced."

"We fully expect to do our part and trust the Supervisor will accept the grave responsibilities he now shoulders with the dedication the office deserves. We wish him success and good fortune in serving the best interests of the people of the Town of Oyster Bay."

The new Suburban Law, the provisions of which were adopted by the Town Board last March 23, transfer many responsibilities from the Town Board to Petito. Some observers noted that the Town Supervisor now has the "ball" and a good number of the administrative headaches which previously plagued the town council and left Petito free to criticize.

The Town Council, in its White Paper, left no doubt as to what the new score is: "As the Suburban Town Law becomes effective at this time, the Board deems it advisable to reaffirm its belief in the efficacy of the new Law with all its changes. The Board recognizes and accepts the fact that the Supervisor now becomes the chief administrative officer of the Town and the Board primarily a policy-making and legislative body. The Town Board recognizes and accepts both the spirit and intent of the Legislature in drafting the new Law as being designed to concentrate greater responsibility in the Supervisor and intends to interpret those portions of the Law subject to interpretation in that manner."

The daily press earlier this week dwelt upon the "new harmony" on the Board, apparently missing the new stress upon the burden upon the Town Supervisor. In an announcement on Monday, Edward J. Poulos, majority leader of the Town Board had revealed that Jericho attorney Ralph Diamond had been named as special counsel to the Board on the new Suburban Town Law. The HERALD revealed exclusively last week in a story about the opening of the State Legislature in Albany that Diamond had been so designated. Diamond's appointment was seen as a safeguard for the Town Board in forth coming "wars" with the Supervisor over areas of jurisdiction and responsibility.

### Present Merritt Portrait in Oil

An oil portrait of the late Jesse Merritt, County Historian of Nassau County, has been presented to the County Museum by the Nassau County Historical Society. The portrait, which was painted by Mrs. Pat Sowicka of Glen Cove, will be hung in the reference room at the Museum where the Jesse Merritt Memorial Library of the Historical Society is housed. The collection of books and documents in this library are on long loan to the Museum.

Jesse Merritt, who lived at Farmingdale, was County Historian of Nassau from 1937 until his death in 1957. He was the first and only County Historian Nassau has had as no successor has been named to his post.

Merritt served on the Nassau County Board with the famous New York Seventh Regiment in 1916 under General Pershing. He was subsequently Clerk of the Board of Supervisors and during the late 'twenties and 'thirties was publisher of the Garden City News and Farmingdale Post, both of which were printed at his own printing plant which he erected in Farmingdale.

Merritt was a leader in the reactivation of the Nassau County Historical Society in 1936 during the Long Island Tercentenary celebration, and remained its chief counselor and guiding light until his death. The Nassau County Historical Society was founded in 1915 and observed its 50th anniversary at its annual dinner at the Salisbury Club in December. The portrait of Merritt was on display at the dinner.

### Phone Co Splicers Assist Motorist

The role of two Hicksville Telephone Co plant men in extending a helping hand to a injured motorist who was trapped in his overturned truck on Old Country Rd is reported in the Dec 24 issue of "Long Island News" published by the NY Telephone Co.

The article reports: "As the men, Splicers Charlie McMorro and Al Van Wicklen, were driving west on Old Country Road in Hicksville, the nearby truck went into a skid on the rain-slick blacktop pavement and spun over on its side. The splicers swiftly pulled to the edge of the road, whipped out their phone company traffic cones, flashing lights and red flags, and lined them up behind the disabled vehicle to warn oncoming traffic.

"Then, rapidly sizing up the situation, they saw that the driver lay outstretched inside the truck. In seconds, Charlie entered the

vehicle from the rear and, making his way forward, soon crunched beside the dazed man; clearly he had suffered internal injuries, and the splicer made him as comfortable as possible.

"Al, meanwhile, sought help. Before long, an ambulance arrived on the scene and rushed the injured man to a nearby hospital, where he recovered."

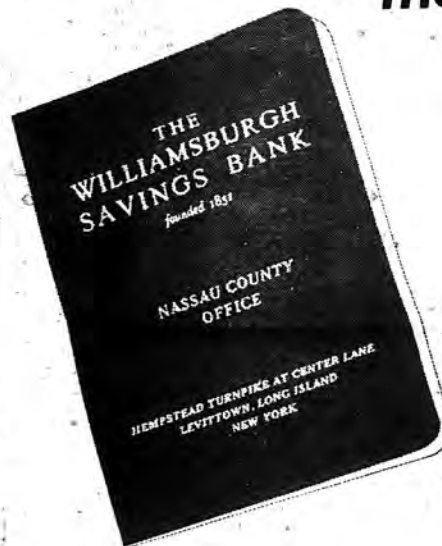

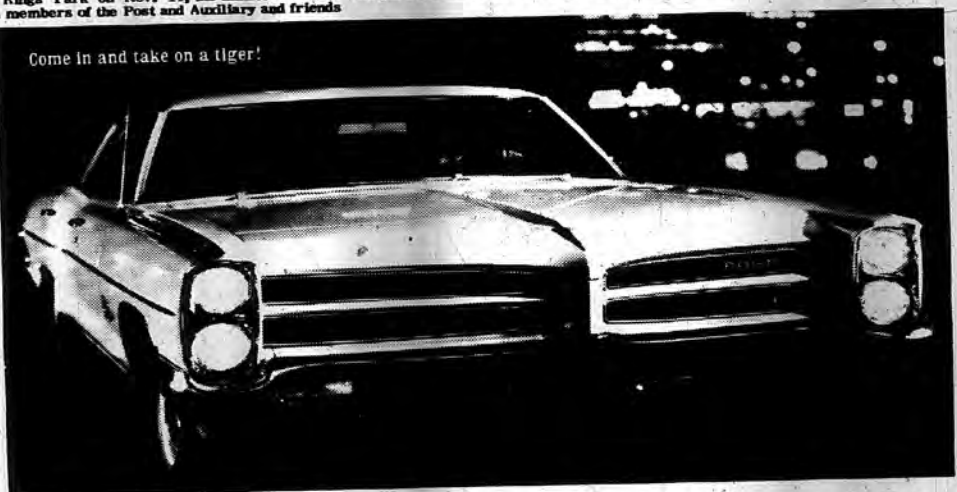

## EDITORIAL OPINION

### Going, Going—

Hicksville has always enjoyed a certain charm because of its tree-lined streets. Take a good look at what is left, because they may all soon be gone.

Among the first trees to go, before the memory of most of us, were those on Broadway between Broadway and the LIRR. In more recent times we have seen the trees on North Broadway, Woodbury Rd. and John St. all feel the bite of the mechanical saw.

Presently the stately trees along Old Country Rd. are contributing to heaps of rubbish. Soon to go will be those along South Broadway and Newbridge Rd.

What remains after the trees are cut down is ghastly to behold. Bleak, sun-bleached open areas with only those ugly branchless utility company poles draped with heavy snake-like cables and wires. After the road widening is done, there is an attempt made to plant new trees — but it will take another half century until they grow back to the size of older brothers they replace. And then it will probably be time to cut them down again for further widening of highways.

It is not generally known, but Tom Pynchon deserves a note of special thanks for saving many side street trees. When curbing was installed in many of the older streets while he was highway superintendent and later Town Supervisor, he objected to widening of side streets where it would mean chopping down those lovely, shading trees.

History tells us that John Heitz in 1849, in partnership with Frederick Heyne, purchased over a 1000 acres in the Hicksville area, laid out wide, regular streets "lined with trees". Those "wide" streets of 1849, designed for carriage movement, are apparently not wide enough for today's auto traffic movement and down go the trees. With them goes another something special that gave Hicksville a special charm.

Heitz, incidentally, gave the land for the Methodist Church on Broadway and the site of the first public school in the community on Nicholas St. Born in Germany in 1818, he came to America in 1847 and prospered as a watchmaker in New York City. He died in 1881.

The trees on Heitz Place, which circle the courthouse, still stand, but it may be only a matter of time.
