## 3,814,854 Pieces of Mail Went Out of Here Last Week

Hicksville Post Office has come a long way since it was first established in 1855, thirteen postmasters ago. Today its volume of business, pieces of mail handled, staff etc ranks it with a city system the size of Syracuse.

For the week ending Jan. 21 of this year there were 3,814,854 pieces of outgoing mail and 1,156,901 incoming pieces. The outgoing included 558,912 machine cancellations, 2,346,404 under meter cancellation, 687,000 flats, magazines etc. 35,817 parcels and 886,816 smaller parcels. This volume was 91.9 percent more than a year ago the

same week.

The Hicksville postal operation is spread over several buildings and much of its activity is never seen by the average patron. A new post office building is scheduled for erection on two acres on West John Street. As the scope of the local office has expanded, the plans for this building have been revised again and again. Now contemplated is a three-story building with basement. Originally it was designed as a one-story structure.

Ralph G. Cascardo, now acting Hicksville Postmaster in charge of this vast operation, explained

## Post Vacant Since July:

# Postmaster Cascardo Began as Temp. Clerk

Ralph G. Cascardo, who began his career with the US Postal Service as a temporary clerk in Jamaica 27 years ago, was sworn in Friday afternoon as acting Postmaster of the Hicksville Post Office, one of the largest in the state. (see story below.)

Cascardo fills a position which has been vacant since last July 16 when the resignation of Mrs. Irene Murphy became effective. During the interval, Postal Service Officer Henry F. Platt has been in charge. Cascardo becomes the 14th postmaster in the office which dates back 110 years.

Born in Brooklyn, 56 years ago, Cascardo and his wife, Joan, were married 22 years ago and have been residents of Hicksville at 55 Alpine Lane for the past 15 years.

It was 1939 when he became a temporary clerk at the Jamaica office. In the period from 1940 to 41 he went with the Dept. of Commerce in Washington, D.C. From 1941 to 1945 he was with the US Army Infantry, served in Europe and held the rank of first sergeant. He is today a member of the Wm. F. Gouse Jr., Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and a warrant officer in the US Army reserve.

Returning to the Jamaica Post Office in 1946, he was able to secure a position by competitive examination as a clerk in Hicksville office in 1954. He worked on "all the windows", was an administrative assistant to the then Superintendent of Mails, William Stahley; was successful in passing various supervisory tests and became assistant Superintendent of Mails in 1962.

The Hicksville Post Office, with an annual gross business of over \$7,000,000 in postal receipts serves an area of 80,000 population embracing Hicksville, Plainview and Old Bethpage and is also the sectional center for 78 satellite offices in Nassau and Suffolk. The present work force of 742 includes 141 mail carriers. Of the balance of 600, about two-thirds are employed in the sectional center operations now located on Commercial St.

Postal and other public officials were on hand to witness the swearing-in of the new Postmaster Friday including Edward Giannelli, Democratic leader of North Hicksville who had been promised appointment as a possible appointee last July. Also there were John Lenhard,

mail boxes in Hicksville proper, another 46 in Plainview and Old Bethpage.

Besides the main office on North Broadway, branch offices in Plainview and Old Bethpage and sub stations at Mid Island Plaza (Gertz) and contract stations in various stores and shopping centers, there is also the Sectional Center on Commercial St. off New South Rd., which is soon to move to a 44,000 square foot building on Lauman Lane with a gain of 19,000 square feet.

The sectional center has been in operation thru Hicksville on a limited basis for some years. Ten other nearby post offices were served prior to June 19 of last year. Today there are 78 offices in Nassau and Suffolk who route their mail thru Hicksville, almost exclusively by motor transport.

Postmaster Cascardo after long service in the post office is convinced that the use of Zip Code numbers is the most important postal achievement in years and urges all to make use of them. As he notes, even if the written ad-

dress is not very clear to the mail handler, the use of numbers will speed a letter or parcel on its way in a matter of minutes.

The working staff of the Hicksville Post Office and its overall operations during the Christmas holiday season was approximately 900 men and women. The volume of mail and parcels handled was fantastic and thus the figures for the week of Jan 21 were deliberately selected to give a more typical picture of the operation.

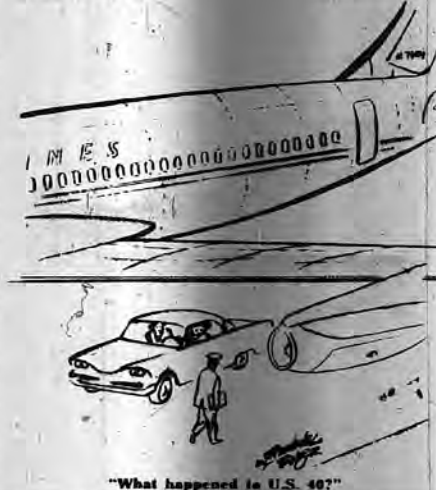

The veteran and his family continues to ask many questions concerning the benefits offered them by the Veterans Administration. Below are some of their recent queries. Additional information can be obtained at any V.A. office.

**Q.** - Where can I obtain a list of qualified insurance companies so I may convert my new Servicemen's Group Life Insurance to an individual policy?

**A.** - Eventually from the Prudential Life Insurance Company or the Veterans Administration, but the list of qualified companies is not presently available and will not be for several weeks.

**Q.** - My husband is receiving a non-service-connected pension from the VA. I would like to know if I start working would it have any effect on the amount of the pension that my husband now receives?

**A.** - In determining the veteran's income for a non-service-connected pension, none of the earned income (wages, salaries, etc.) of a veteran's spouse will be counted as the veteran's income.

**Q.** - The VA considers me permanently, totally disabled as a result of an accident during peacetime military service. I was originally informed that my child is not entitled to VA educational assistance since my injury was not the result of the performance of an act of duty. Is this still true?

**A.** - The law has now been changed and your child will be eligible for educational assistance. It is no longer necessary that the totally disabling condition (or death) result from the performance of an act of duty. It

is only necessary that the permanently totally disabling condition be service-connected.

**Q.** - My husband is a veteran of World War II. He is 60 years old and is receiving compensation from the VA for a disability which is service-connected. I would like to know if he is still eligible for a thirty year mortgage on a home loan.

**A.** - He may well be. An eligible World War II veteran's entitlement for a GI loan expires 10 years from the date of discharge from his last period of active duty, any part of which occurred in World War II, plus one year for three months of active duty in World War II. In no case will entitlement extend beyond July 25, 1967. The nearest VA regional office can establish his deadline date.
