Topic on Mar 25 and 26:

## How Well Are Schools Doing?

The survey of the Hicksville School District's educational program conducted by the American Institutes for Research in the Behavioral Sciences, copies of which have been more widely distributed than any other previous local study of the school system, will be the topic of detailed consideration at a two-day Board of Education meeting, Mar. 25 and 26.

Tape recordings of remarks by Dr. John C. Flanagan, president of AIR, which occupied one hour at the Feb. 25 Board meeting when he presented his study, have been available for listening by interested members of the staff. More than 14,000 copies of the report have been printed and distributed to every household in the community. Copies have been issued to the faculty and staff members for consideration.

While the Board will meet this Friday night, Mar. 11, for the first time in the new conference room in the Administration Building on Division Ave., the session on Mar. 25 will be held in the student cafeteria of the Senior High School in anticipation of a substantial audience.

Trustees have been requested to submit their questions regarding the study to the School Administration so they may be airmailed to Dr. Flanagan at Pittsburgh prior to his second appearance in Hicksville.

If the meeting on Friday night, March 25, does not conclude consideration of the report and its recommendations, the meeting will be continued on Saturday morning, Mar. 26, according to Board President Herbert Johnson. The Board will also meet in open session on Thursday night, Mar. 24, to conduct the regular monthly business of the district.

The purpose of the study has been "to appraise the adequacy and quality of education in Hicksville Public Schools." It was formally initiated on July 1 of last year with a target completion date of Dec. 31.

The AIR began in 1947 with less than 25 employees. It today has a staff of 225. Dr. Paul Horst, professor of psychology at the University of Washington, is chairman of the Board of Directors; Dr. Flanagan of the University of Pittsburgh is president and head of the executive staff. In addition to executive offices at 410 Amberson Ave., Pittsburgh, it has offices in Los Angeles, Arlington, Va.; Washington DC; and Palo Alto, Calif.

On April 20, 1965, in Hempstead, Miss Mullin ran to a car that was afire after a crash and pulled the stunned and injured driver to safety just before it exploded. She then cared for him, preventing what easily might have been fatal complications following his injury.

## Protest Cuts in Federal Aid

Proposed Federal Budget cuts of funds for the National School Lunch Program were protested this week by Governor Rockefeller as potential expansion of New York's financial burden in this field and "not in keeping with the fundamental purpose of the program."

In a letter to Rep. Emanuel Celler, Chairman of the Steering Committee of the New York Congressional Delegation, the Governor noted cuts in the proposed 1966-67 Federal Budget of \$14.3 million for commodity procurement and \$9.2 million for cash payments by states to school districts.

Under the national program, commodity and cash grants are provided to states to help them in providing adequate school lunches.

The Governor said the reduction of \$14.3 million for procurement of commodities will deprive school districts in New York State of about \$1 million.
