Honor 10 Vietnam Vets Memorial Day

Ten wounded veterans from the conflict in Vietnam will be honored guests in the Hicksville Memorial Day Parade on Monday, May 30, according to the Sgt. Ben Levitt Post, Jewish War Veterans, sponsoring post in charge this year. Spanish war veteran Skipper Dow will also participate, although this year he will ride rather than walk the parade route.

Assembly time for all organizations taking part will be at Mid Island Plaza at 9 AM with the parade starting at 9:30 AM. Jim Surless, past commander of the Amvets Posts will be grand marshal. The parade will move south on Broadway to Old Country Rd., pausing at the John F. Kennedy Memorial Mall for the raising of a flag and placement of a wreath under the direction of a Marine Corps color guard.

Alex Kriegel, chairman of the program for the JWV Post, disclosed the parade will go south on Broadway to Old Country Rd., west to Jerusalem Ave., south to the Junior High School where the concluding ceremonies will take place. Nat Helfand, junior vice commander of the Nassau Suffolk Council of the JWV, will be master of ceremonies. The principal speaker of the day will be Assemblyman Martin Ginsberg.

Spec 4 Paul D. Walkowski, 22, of 176 Lee Ave., Hicksville, this week became the second resident to die in combat in Vietnam. A computer operator at Grumman before his induction, he had been in the army 15 months and in Vietnam 4 months. He was a Hicksville resident since 1961, moving here from Klamath Falls, Oregon, where he graduated from High School. The Defense Dept reported that he was killed Saturday.

Library Seeks Budget June 15

The Hicksville Public Library has rescheduled a budget referendum for June 15th after the third consecutive budget defeat suffered in May 1966. Registration will take place on June 4th from 12 Noon to 6 p.m. The budget, which has been reduced by \$10,850.00, provides for full restoration of services including the resumption of a full schedule of opening hours.

In 1964-65, the last normal year of operation, the library added 13,316 volumes. This year the library will purchase 30% fewer titles, a cut only partially restored in the budget to be re-submitted.

A large portion of the library work is to be done with young people of high school and college age. Reference questions of a highly academic nature necessitating an extended search for materials are submitted to the reference librarian - dozens every day.

When Flag Goes By

The courtesy due the flag of the United States when viewed on parade is the timely reminder from the East Meadow Memorial Day Committee which might be noted with profit in all communities on May 30.

The committee points out that when the American flag passes, spectators are supposed to stand at attention and salute the flag by placing your right hand over your heart. If in uniform, military salute.

It is felt that many have unintentionally disrespected the flag on parade "due to either the excitement of the parade or ignorance of correct procedure."

It might also be noted that all residents and businesses should display the American Flag on Memorial Day and all patriotic holidays. On May 30 the flag should fly at half mast until noon, then being raised to the top of the pole until sundown.

Don't Be An Easy Mark

Taxes and cost of living are going to be a major worry of the present generation and their children. The taxes they have to pay either directly or through a withholding levy on their incomes must be paid ahead of their bread and butter.

Taxes are a necessary burden in our expanding and progressive society, just as modern conveniences become necessary in our changing standards of living. But there is a point in both government and family spending, where desires have to be balanced against income ad ability to pay.

It is part of our political picture for candidates for office and our representatives in government, in order to obtain public favor, to promise the people all manner of public largess in return for their support. But it is seldom mentioned that the people will have to pay in taxes for the beneficence of the politicians.

The situation is like installment buying, where inducements are so appealing that the burden of payments can sink the family ship below income has grown to meet obligations.

It is just as important for the people to vote "No" to extravagant and unnecessary, but appealing political schemes for which they will have to pay, as it is for them to say "No" to personal spending beyond their means. The money in both cases comes out of the same pocket, but in public spending it is taken ahead of grocery money, household supplies or sickness obligations. Being an easy mark can cost your independence.

Ask Zone Change For Nuclear Plant

Long Island Lighting Company has filed an application with the Brookhaven Town Board in Suffolk for the rezoning of a site for the Company's first nuclear electric generating plant.

Plans for the proposed \$65-\$75 million atomic plant were made known by the utility last month when it revealed that it had contracted to purchase 455 acres of land in the Shoreham/Wading River area of the Town. In its current request, L.I.L.C. is asking that 175 acres of the northern half of this property be rezoned for electric generating plant use. The southern portion of the property and a 125 foot wide buffer strip around the plant site would remain in a residential status.

Operation of the Company's proposed nuclear power unit is figured for 1973, with major construction scheduled to begin by about late 1969.

Night Tennis, Golf At Salisbury

In anticipation of fairer weather than has prevailed recently, Public Works Commissioner Herbert J. Slims announces that night tennis and night golf has begun at Salisbury.
