Bernard Braun Funeral Friday

Bernard Braun, 53, principal of the Hicksville Junior High School on leave of absence due to illness, died on Monday, July 25. A Requiem Mass will be sung at St. Ignatius Loyola RC Church at 10 a.m. on Friday, July 29, at 10 a.m.

Mr. Braun joined the faculty of Hicksville Schools in 1935 after serving briefly in Jericho and Central Park (Bethpage) districts. He was a 5th and 6th grade teacher at East St. School until 1942 when he advanced to the Hicksville Junior High School. On Jan. 1, 1957 he became principal of the Junior High School.

He completed his high school courses in Hicksville in 1928

in three and a half years and then went to St. Francis University to win his Bachelor of Arts in 3 and a half years in 1934. He also took courses at Fordham University and New York University.

Mr. Braun is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Braun; his brothers, Vincent, Fred J., and Raymond; a sister, Doris.

He served for several years as president of the Hicksville Council of Parent Teachers Assn.

Interment will be at Holy Road Cemetery, Westbury, under the direction of Henry J. Stock Funeral Home.

Elect 186 Delegates

Paul J. Curran of New York City, retiring this year after serving three terms in the State

Assembly, will co-ordinate the Republican campaign to elect delegates to the 1967 State constitutional convention.

Curran said the constitutional convention, New York's first since 1938, could "set the tone of state and local government for at least a generation to come."

The constitutional convention will be convened in Albany next April 4 to revise or re-draft the State's constitution. It is now five times longer than the Federal constitution and, although amended many times, has not undergone a major re-drafting since 1890.

One hundred and eighty-six delegates will be elected in the general election Nov. 8th.

One hundred and seventy-one district delegates (three from each of the 57 state senate districts) were nominated in the primary election on June 28. Fifteen delegates-at-large to be elected on a statewide basis, will be nominated at the GOP state convention at Rochester, Sept. 7 to 8.

EDITORIAL OPINION

Let's Put Cards on Table

The piece-meal submission of a revised Nassau County Charter to public vote is not fair to the community. Once again the proposal to increase the size of the Board of Supervisors, having them elected from districts (Assembly district areas) may appear on the ballot this fall. It was soundly defeated last year.

But there is a great deal more to the total picture if we are to believe that the Charter Revision Commission has been working on the subject for several years.

At a time when New York City is seriously considering subdividing its school system into borough Boards of Education and setting up "little city halls" to get closer to the people and area problems, the cry is raised in certain quarters for greater centralization of government and authority in Nassau County under the guise of economy and "representative government".

We recall the adoption of the current County Charter some years ago and it followed a period of public discussion and consideration. Revisions in this document which has managed to weather a period of great county growth also deserves the same total, long-range consideration and deliberation.

Republicans Move

Nassau County Republican Committee has moved from Franklin Ave., Garden City, into the west wing, main floor, of the Garden City Hotel. The phone number is still the same PL 1-7300.

Await Furniture

A spokesman for the Nassau Board of Supervisors notes that the County Dept. of Public Works insists that the new Nassau Supreme Court Building will be open as of Sept. 1 although no furniture has been ordered and bids were taken as late as June 18. It is claimed it takes six months for ordinary furniture deliveries.

Slobbovia Park

The Board of Supervisors reports it has been receiving letters of complaint that Salisbury County Park "looks like a city dump". Even pictures are sent in of rubbish in the picnic area, beer cans and bottles and one polaroid film of a men's room is said to look as though it was taken in "Lower Slobbovia".

Seek Federal Money

Nassau County police have applied to the Federal govt for funds to purchase "Police Com-

munity Relations Vehicle." An estimated \$18,000 is sought for a proposed bus operated and maintained by police to reach citizens and bring them to police headquarters for guided tours" and acquaint them with their police. This will create a basis for greater understanding and respect" by low-income and minority groups, it was declared.

Detention Plan

Last year a total of 4,120 prisoners were lodged in detention cells at Mineola police headquarters and apparently some of them for minor offenses. As of Aug. 1, the precinct desk officer will have the discretion of holding the individual arrested or issue a summons (if a bailable offense) for the arrested person to appear in court the following morning. "This will help the individual arrested for a minor crime by eliminating the need to spend a night in a cell when bail cannot be produced readily," states Police Commissioner Francis B. Looney. At the same time police man-hours spent in transporting and maintaining custody over prisoners will be reduced, freeing police officers for other enforcement duties.

"I could have studied guitar with a teacher but I felt that learning on my own would be the best way to develop my own style. Besides, you can't really teach someone to play folk music. It has to come from inside. I tried to teach it once, but found that it seemed cold and lost all of its meaning. It can't be mechanical, as so many things are today."
