Bernard Braun Will Be Missed

The passing of any decent, congenial and productive citizen is always a loss to his friends and community. But the death, last week, of Bernard Braun – after match suffering, leaves his family, friends and Hicksville much the poorer.

Mr. Braun, "Bernie" to his numerous friends of this community in which he was born, will be missed because he combined in large degree the offal-

community in which he was born, will be missed because he combined in large degree the qualities of a fine teacher, an energetic, resourceful administrator and as warm and loyal friend. Speaking as one who knew him as a teaching colleague and as a principal and as a friend, it is an honor to attest to all of his virtues.

A gifted English teacher in our elementary and Junior High School for 18 years, Bernard Braun became principal of the newly renovated and much enlarged Junior High in 1956. His enthusiasm for his new assignment was understandable, but his courage, leadership and unflagging devotion to the enormous task that materialized as the years passed is a real testament to Mr. Braun's outstanding place in the history of ou schools.

ing place in the history of our schools.

As principal of "the largest New York State Junior High School under one roof"—a phrase he used at P.T.A. meetings and at which his faculty could smile wryly — Mr. Braun faced Herculean problems with the confidents of experience and trust in his faculty. He met his enlarging responsibilities with an amazing organizational grasp and a veteran teacher and native son's intuition for the possible and the largely effective in school matters and public relations. To parents, teachers and nearby residents who reflected on the unique nature of our Junior High — 3300 boys and girls moving serenely to classes every 45 minutes and unloading and loading on bises without youthful mayhem or vandalism — it has always been

Bernard Braun was proud of his school's order and function-al efficiency, but his student's academic and character developal efficiency, but his student's academic and character development were concerns closer to his heart. His training and experience for almost twenty years were with intimate, smaller student bodies in this old farm community. Long before he ever grappled with the thoroughness of his forebearers with the problems of our great modern Junior High School, he came to cherish pupil skill in the use of our language and in the appreciation of our literature. Always an advocate of balance in education, he knew the worth of mathematical and scientific training, and his interest as promotor and attendant at our Junior High Fine Art Weeks was well known. However, it was his love of history -his belief in Patriotism - that this commentator will long rememin Patriotism - that this commentator will long remember. Bernard Brain's instincts for what was wholesome and morally sound led him to place strong emphasis on encouragement of patriotism. He was ment of patriotism. He was always interested in the teach-ing of New York State and United States History. As for local Hicksville lore, he had a great knowledge, having been born and raised here. He knew all the old families - his own had

settled here not long after the CIVII War. This writer always used the occasion of Mr. Braun's presence occasion of Mr. Braun spresence in his room for an observation of his teaching to "con" him into participation in a lesson on Hicksville history or civics. He could be counted on to answer a question directed to him and, in a flash, he would be spiritedly telling the class about Hicksville hife when he was a boy. He loved to teach and, one feels missed the classroom in his decade of school work as principle. In the last years of his fruitful career, Bernard Braun was constant in his encouragement of a Junior High School program commemorating actively every holiday and national day of significance. He supported wholeheartedly the suggestion of his Social Studies Dept. to prepare programs of explanation and of music to be transmitted over the school public address system, on the eve of holidays, reminding students, faculty and staff of the significance of the day being celebrated.

A gentleman of fine education and culture and well traveled, he brought great energy and dedication to his year of principalship. A measure of the satisfaction and challenge he received from his leadership at the Junior High is evident in a remark he made to this writer, only a few weeks ago. Reminicing from his sick bed, he said, "Yes, a lot happened in the school these last ten years, and I am glad I gave it all I could. I had a good time."

It is a tribute to Bernard Braun, too, that in spite of its great size, the Junior High faculty and staff are known for their splendid congeniality and rapport. His faculty always knew where they stood with him. Generous and sincere in praise, pointed and definite in disapproval, sympathetic to genuine problems, encouraging to those proposals of value to our children and school and community welfare, prudent but considerate in



Veterans and their families are continuously writing to the Veterans Administration asking thousands of questions relating to "reterans benefits". List-ed below are some recent inquiries dealing with compensation and ponsious.

"Q. - What is the difference in the terms "compensation" and "pension" payemets made monthly by the VA?

A. - Compensation payments are made to eligible veterans or their survivors for disabilities incurred in military service. Pension payments are made to veterans with total and permanent non - service connected disability, and to eligible survivors of deceased war - time veterans whose death was not a result of military service.

Q. - My father received a small pension from the VA until his death four years ago. My sister through an accident that occurred when she was a child is unable to earn a living. I would like to know if she is entitled to a pension as she has never worked and will never be able to do so?

A. - The VA considers a "help-

worked and will never be able to do so?

A. - The VA considers a 'help-less child" as one who became permantly incapable of self-support, prior to age 18. If this is your sister's cace, you should submit medical evidence to the VA ro support hits claim. If the claim is upheld, she will be able to receive pension payemnts.

Q. - I am a veteran who is receiving a nonservice - connected pension from the VA. I would like to known it I acam receive my VA pension and Social Security benefits when I reach age 62 or age 65?

A. - A veteran may receive a non-service - connected pension if of therwise eligible as long as his income without dependents does not exceed \$1,800 or with dependents \$3,000 per year. Social Security venefits are counted as income.
