School Tax Rate Below Forecast

The tax bite for the support of public education in Hicksville will be 10 cents per \$100 (or \$1 per \$1000 of assessment) less than was forecast when the proposed budget was submitted to public vote last May. The Board of Education, in receipt of the new total assessed valuation, set the tax rate at \$6.497 per \$100, Monday night, which is 14 cents more than last year.

In addition, the School Board established the tax for public library purposes (based upon the second-time-around budget approved by the voters in June) at 26.5 cents per \$100 compared with 24.7 cents last year.

Working in favor of Hicksville taxpayers was additional state aid obtained in the last session of the State Legislature thru the efforts of State Senator Henry Curran and Assemblyman Stanley Harwood, among others, for "growth aid" and an overall increase in district-wide assessment of two and a half million to a new record peak of over \$102 million.

Calculations offered to the Board of Education before it set the new tax rate included an allowance of \$184,000 for an additional increase in the teacher salary scale for the coming year.

With a total budget of \$13,449,500 for the coming year, \$8,767,565.67 will be received in the form of State and Federal aid and \$6,681,934.33 will be raised by taxes on local real estate. The library tax levy will be \$272,371.50.

In other action during the special meeting of the Board of Education, Monday night, the price of food in the cafeterias of the district was raised for the coming year. It was noted that cafeteria prices have not been changed in 12 years. Lunch prices will be raised by five cents to 35 cents for elementary, 40 cents for junior and senior high and 75 cents for teachers. Student milk will continue at 3 cents a container and teachers milk will cost 10 cents.

The cafeteria price increase is expected to produce \$37,000 in additional revenue to sustain school lunch operations. During the interval since 1954, food, salary and operating costs have risen and Federal Aid in the form of surplus food has been sharply curtailed, according to Barbara Penetery, cafeteria director.

During the past year the value of surplus food received was cut back \$30,000 and Miss Penetery anticipates another \$15,000 reduction in the coming year. Meanwhile a new salary schedule for the 98-member cafeteria staff has added \$10,000 for the coming year to the cost of operations.

ZIP Week Oct 10 - 15

Postmaster Ralph G. Cascardo announces that Oct. 10 to 15 has been designated as "ZIP Code Week for Hicksville and its branches."

Cascardo said that Hicksville is one of 302 major cities selected by Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien to participate simultaneously in National ZIP Code Week.

The project will dramatize the need for greater public cooperation in and acceptance of ZIP Code, thus giving the Post Office Dept. the help it needs to cope with today's record mail volume.

ZIP Code Week will be tied in with as many local community events as possible, including parades, state and county fairs, concerts, sports activities, school programs and meetings sponsored by civic, social and service organizations.

"We hope to get our ZIP Code message across to every facet of our community life," Postmaster Cascardo said. "This means the home, the schools, the churches and the business."

Poll Favors Govt Service

More than 60% of those persons voting in Meadow Brook National Bank's Community Opinion Poll during July were in favor of a proposal which would require two years of government service (either in a military or non-military capacity) for all young Americans reaching the age of 18. The idea was opposed by 37.4% and 2.6% were undecided, according to results released today by the Bank.

In Jericho, required government service received the approval of 59.2%, 39.6% were against it and 1.0% were undecided, according to Charles J. Barvels, manager of Meadow Brook's Jericho office.

Local views on other questions asked in the July edition of the Poll went this way: 56.6% believed that recent Supreme Court rulings protecting individuals' rights would affect our country's ability to secure convictions, 41.6% felt they would not and 2.0% were undecided; extension of free public education beyond the 12th grade was favored by a 71.5% to 25.5% margin; and 75.6% approved the idea of a public protector to represent the individual in the examination of possible abuses of authority in governmental agencies, 22.5% were against the idea and 2.0% were undecided.

Ford Executive Opens New Showroom

More than \$250 million is being invested in Ford dealerships across the country in a three-year period in order to give the customer better and quicker service, a Ford Motor Company executive said in New York this week.

Donald N. Frey, Ford vice president and Ford Division general manager, told newsmen that by the end of 1966 Ford dealers will be operating 876 new facilities and 451 facilities that have been expanded or modernized during the past three years.

He added that in 1967 another 400 new Ford dealership facilities are expected to be completed across the country. There are approximately 6,500 Ford dealers throughout the United States.

Frey spoke at a news conference at the Overseas Press Club marking the simultaneous opening of four new dealership

facilities in the greater New York area; one in Hicksville. "These new facilities are more than just fancy showrooms — a lot more," Frey said. "The real beauty lies behind the showroom in the service area."

He noted that 65 per cent of the total floor space of the four new dealerships is devoted to service facilities, and that the number of service stalls was increased more than 50 per cent, from 63 to 95, during the modernization and expansion program.

"The customer today is demanding better service and, let's face it, he deserves it," Frey said. The automotive market has climbed rapidly in the past few years to where we are now selling more than nine million new cars a year. This, of course, has caused some difficulty in properly servicing cars in existing facilities so we have placed strongest possible emphasis on

new dealerships with the best, most modern service facilities available."

Frey said the growing strength of the Ford dealer organization is one of the primary reasons why Ford Division has been able to close the gap on its competition in 1966.

"In the face of a declining automotive market this year, Ford Division sales have moved up and for the first seven months of 1966 are approximately 45,000 units ahead of the comparable period in 1965," he concluded.

The four dealerships opened represent a combined building and expansion program investment of \$2,500,000. Three of the dealerships are located on Long Island, and the fourth is on Staten Island. The dealerships are Bob-Ken Ford, Inc., Hicksville, Nassau County; Queen Auto Sales, Bellerose, Bond Motors, Howard Beach, Queens; and Robin Ford, Inc., Staten Island.

Wolff Talks About Prices

At the first meeting, Monday, of a joint inquiry into the high retail price of milk and bread launched by Representative Lester L. Wolff of Nassau County and Eugene H. Nickerson, Nassau County Executive, the Third District Congressman made the following remarks to the representatives of the dairy and baking industry gathered in the county executive's office here:

"For some time there has been little doubt in my mind that an effective monopoly exists in the wholesale distribution of milk. There is ample evidence that on the retail level this has resulted in a captive dealer situation."

"The consumer is the victim

of what seems to be a monopolistic conspiracy on the part of the milk distributors in most large and medium markets, including metropolitan New York."

"There is evidence that wholesale milk distributors not only have price-fixed the cost of milk to the retailer, but have forced the retailer to price-fix on the retail level. Should the milk dealer attempt to absorb a price increase from the distributor, rather than pass it on to the consumer, he will find himself without a supplier. It will be absolutely impossible for him to find a distributor who will sell to him until he agrees to retail at the price fixed by the apparent distributor monopoly."

"I cannot overemphasize the importance of using ZIP Code in our city," Cascardo said. "It will mean better, more efficient mail service for everyone. During our planned week, we hope to make our mailers more aware of this and give them a better understanding of how ZIP Code can help them in speeding their mail."

Postmaster Cascardo said he had been informed by Postmaster General O'Brien that individual use of ZIP Code increased markedly in 12 cities where ZIP Code Week has already been conducted on an experimental basis. "I anticipate similar results from ZIP Code Week here," he added.

The promotional experiment was first held in Alexandria, Virginia, for the week beginning last Nov. 28. The next test on March 21 involved six cities along the Florida Gold Coast—Miami, Hollywood, Hialeah, Fort Lauderdale, Pompano Beach and West Palm Beach. Five cities in the San Francisco Bay area—San Francisco, Berkeley, Richmond, Oakland and San Mateo—participated in the third test beginning May 2.
