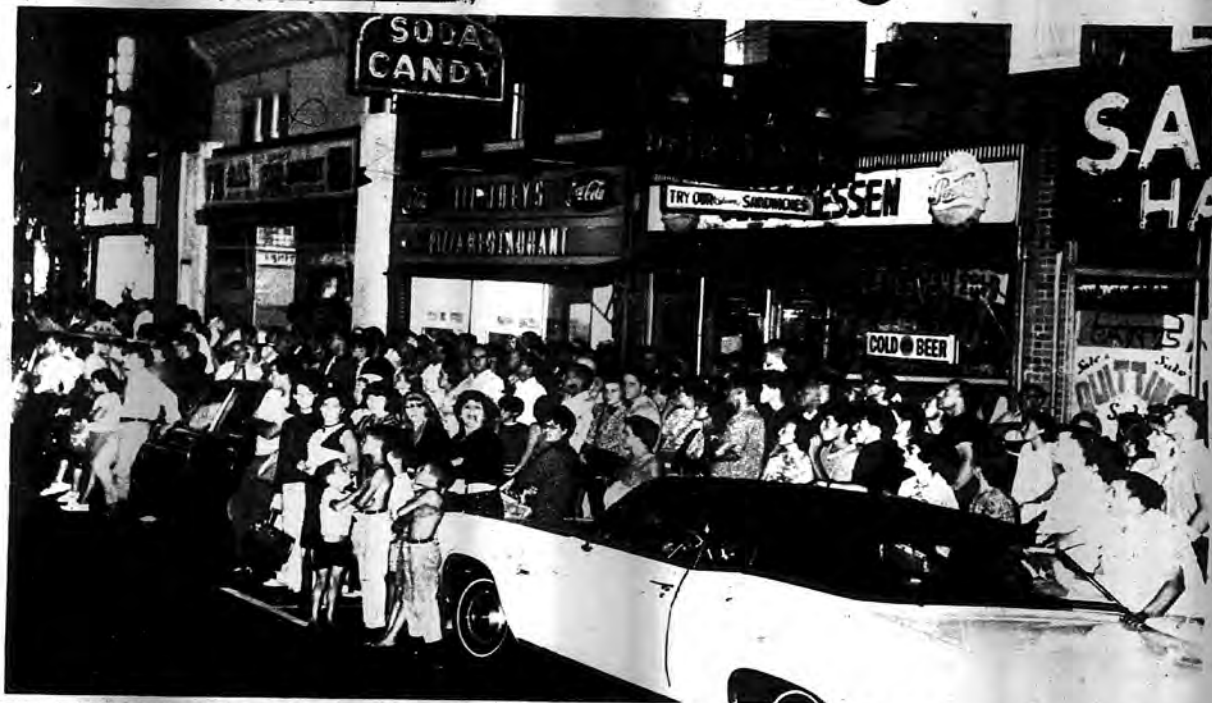


Fire Next Door Ends Bingo Game

District to Sell Books to Students

Hicksville Board of Education, in view of a recent court decision, will "sell" \$40,000 worth of text books to students of private and parochial schools. Hopefully, a superior court decision will not make it necessary for the district to seek payment for the books by Dec. 1.

The action of the School Board, taken Monday night at a regular meeting, followed a recommendation of School Attorney Joseph Catalano.

The district, under a law enacted in the state legislature, had put \$40,000 in the budget for 1966-67 to provide text books for private and parochial school students. A recent court decision held it was improper for a district to turn the books over to a private or parochial school and the matter is now on appeal to a higher court.

Meanwhile the books had been ordered, some have been delivered in time for the start of the fall term.

If a subsequent court decision upholds the initial plan, money paid by individual students of private and parochial schools

will be refunded to them.

In other action, Monday night, the Board appointed Raymond Rusch, a graduate of Hicksville Schools, as acting principal of Hicksville Senior High as of Sept. 1 at a salary of \$14,007 for a 10 month period.

Leon Galloway, formerly High School principal, had been recently named an administrative assistant to School Superintendent Donald F. Abt.

Rusch had served as an assistant principal of the school. The Board also named Albert Glass as Junior High principal with a 10 month salary of \$15,105; John Maber as an elementary assistant principal at \$11,432 and Sidney Fein as an elementary assistant principal at \$11,167, each on a 10-month basis.

Catholic Schools to Open With Record Enrollment

Highlighted by the opening of four new diocesan high schools, the enrollment of students in Catholic schools in the Diocese of Rockville Centre will reach a record total of more than 94,000 when the new school year begins in September.

Including the four new high schools and two new elementary schools opening this year, there are now 123 Catholic schools in Nassau and Suffolk Counties.

The first day of classes for the record number of students will be on Thursday, Sept. 8, with a half-day session.

The opening day Mass for the school year will be offered by the Most Rev. Walter P. Kellenberg, D.D., bishop of the Diocese, on Wednesday, Sept. 7, at 10:30 a.m. in St. Agnes Cathedral, Rockville Centre. The Rev.

John J. Mullen, principal of the new Maria Regina Diocesan High School in Uniondale, will preach the sermon at the Mass.

The four new diocesan high schools, which also include Holy Family in South Huntington, Holy Trinity in Hicksville and St. John the Baptist in West Islip, will eventually more than double high school enrollment in the diocese.

The addition of the freshman classes at the four new schools will bring the total number of high school students in the diocese to about 12,800.

May Film Town Records

Councilman Edward J. Poulos, Town Board Majority Leader, announces that the Board is considering a policy to provide an annual appropriation in the Town budget for the microfilming of specially designated documents which are irreplaceable.

Councilman Poulos said the Board's study followed receipt of a comprehensive report on the possible uses of microfilm for preserving Town documents, submitted by Town Clerk William B. O'Keefe.

In his report Town Clerk O'Keefe said that all departments were surveyed and as a result he recommended that the Town's most important records, the minute book be microfilmed. This is the bound book containing the written record of Town Board meetings which dates from the Town's founding in 1653. The minute book in recent years has contained about 1500 pages annually.

A copy of the report was sent to the Division of Archives and History of the University of the State of New York. Howard W. Crocker, association public records analyst wrote, "I think your recommendation to microfilm at this time only the minute books from 1653 is very sound. With your records center you are in a strong position because a records center and not a microfilm program is the cheapest way to handle the vast bulk of records that needs to be retained 10 years or less."

Town Clerk O'Keefe reported to the Board, "Some of the Town of Oyster Bay records have a short required record time; that is, they may be destroyed, with approval, after six to ten years. Our vital statistical records are one of our most important records. However, births, deaths and marriage records are well and adequately protected because the originals are filed in the State Department, Albany, and all

the registers are on file in our fireproof vault here at Town Hall."

He added, "Earlier this year the destruction of many of the Town's records, with the approval of the department heads, the Town Board and the New York State Education Department, afforded our record center an estimated storage growth factor of an additional five to ten years for inactive records."

"With this space available at the records center, it is my recommendation that only the Town's most important record, namely, the minute book, be entirely microfilmed from 1653 to date and that two copies be made and stored as security copies in different places; one copy at the records center vault in Hicksville and the other at Iron Mountain Storage Center. It is intended that either of these copies could become available in case the original and only record of the Town history was destroyed by fire, flood or otherwise became useless."

Councilman Poulos said that an estimate has been given to the Board that the recommended plan would cost the Town about \$2000 to microfilm minute books of past years and then about \$100 a year.

Local Concern Gets Contract

Award of a \$137,000 contract for the manufacture of 194 Time Domain Filters has been received from the FAA, announces Jules Cardon, Manager of the Communications and Navigation Division of Servo Corp. of America, Hicksville.

Servo, the only manufacturer of Doppler Direction Finder Systems in the United States, developed the Time Domain Filter as part of a continuous effort to advance system performance.

Claim New Seed Resists Nematode

The development and expected distribution to seed growers early in 1967 of a new potato seed highly resistant to the destructive Golden Nematode, result of 20 years of research at the New York State College of Agriculture at Cornell, has been announced by Gov. Rockefeller.

The Golden Nematode is a microscopic organism which infests potato-growing land and has long been a problem particularly in the potato producing areas of Long Island. It made potato grow-improvable in most of Nassau county.

The Governor disclosed the readiness of the new seed, known as Reonic, for early distribution during a visit to the Cornell-Uihlein Foundation Seed Potato Farm at Lake Placid.

Produce Plastic For British Planes

Riverside Plastics Division, Bischoff Chemical Corp. of Hicksville, will manufacture reinforced plastics components for the British Royal Navy McDonnell F-4K, the British version of the Phantom 2 fighter-bomber, it was announced by president Frank J. Nussbaum.

One component, a complicated, precision-engineered, high-temperature structural duct assembly, is being produced for Republic Aviation for transshipment to Great Britain.

The other, the drag-parachute container for the aircraft, will be manufactured directly for British Aircraft Corp. Riverside Plastics is a leading manufacturer of highly controlled reinforced plastics components for industrial, military and aerospace use. The many companies it produces RP parts for include Grumman, Republic, McDonnell, Melpar, G. E., and Brookhaven National Laboratories.

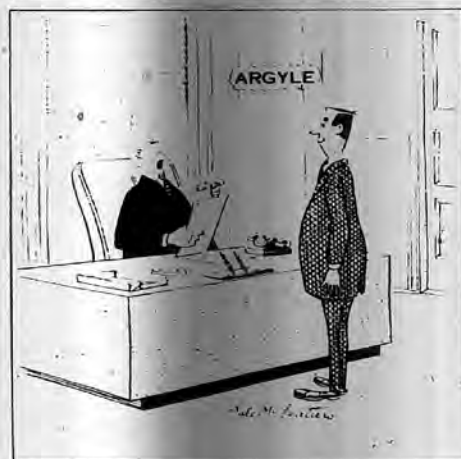

Start Operation Shop Early

There are still 96 shopping days 'til Christmas, but American Red Cross Chapters throughout the United States have launched into "Operation Shop Early," designed to make the holiday season a little brighter for several hundred thousand American servicemen in South Vietnam.

Taking a new twist on the "ditty Cross Ditty Bag," familiar to servicemen since the Spanish American War, the Christmas "presents" will be 12x13" ditty bags of bright red and green nylon mesh to insure long use in a humid, hot climate. Each bag will be filled with small personal items, ranging from ball point pens and writing paper to foot powder, games, paper books, playing cards (new), small puzzles or solitaire games, miniature checkers, chess, acey-deucey, plastic cigarettes cases, etc.

Red Cross Chapters are inviting participation of local organizations to obtain these items for filling the bags, made by chapter volunteers. An appropriate greeting card from cooperating organizations will be enclosed in each bag. Gifts of this sort must be received at the Nassau County Chapter, 264 Old Country Road, Mineola, by Oct. 1st.

The Christmas Ditty Bags are functionally designed and after servicemen have used the contents, will serve as a long-lasting "carryall." The Red Cross will also furnish ill and wounded servicemen in hospitals, the new ditty bag filled with appropriate presents to go along with traditional ward parties and decorating contents.

After the bags are completed and filled they will be mailed through regular postal channels to Red Cross staff assigned in South Viet-Nam for final distribution. Deadline mailing dates announced by the Post Office Department indicate that parcels should be mailed prior to October 15 to insure receipt in South Viet-Nam by Christmas.

Nurse Careers Now Available

Qualified men and women interested in a nursing career on Long Island are among the workers being sought for jobs with the Dept. of Mental Hygiene.
