Another Call for PO Bids

Bids for construction of the long awaited new Hicksville Post Office building at the corner of W. John St. and Barclay St. will be accepted beginning Sept. 15. It was announced by the Post Office Dept. The modern air conditioned office will have 132,226 square feet interior, and a 127,417 square feet parking area. Under department plan,

County Plans Alcoholic Cure House at Jones Institute

Hicksville had the dubious distinction this week of being "chosen" as the location for a permanent facility to rehabilitate many of Nassau County's estimated 70,000 alcoholics. The county, within the month, will seek to acquire five acres of Jones Institute Property at John St. and Charlotte Ave. for a halfway house.

A section of Mitchell Field barracks, more recently used as a Youth Hostel, may be used as a temporary facility while application is made for Federal funds for a permanent structure on the Jones Institute property. Hempstead Town President Supervisor Ralph G. Case, vice chairman of the Nassau Board of Supervisors, was quoted this week as saying that his proposal to use "at least" five acres of the Jones Institute property met with the "enthusiastic endorsement" of the Jones Institute Trustees and his Committee of Nine (unnamed).

The HERALD learned that among the Jones Institute Trustees the reaction was something less than "enthusiastic" and trustees were given to understand that failure on their part to go along with the give-away to the county would be answered with condemnation action.

The Jones Institute was established with the trustee set up more than 100 years ago by a distinguished Mr. Jones who willed that the fund should be used for the indigent of Oyster Bay and North Hempstead townships. First located on the north shore, the Institute has been a fixture on the Hicksville landscape for generations.

William Buchmann of 6 Millburn Ave., Hicksville, who is one of the five Jones Fund Trustees and the only one from the

School Bd. Goes Along With Textbook Ruling

Hicksville Board of Education on the advice of School Attorney Joseph Catalano and by direction of State Commissioner James E. Allen has rescinded action taken last month on the matter of textbooks for students of private and parochial schools. In view of a court decision, the Board had voted to "sell" books to students of non-public schools.

Some \$40,000 worth of books were ordered under the provisions of the Speno Text Book Law when the court held the law invalid. The court decision is being appealed by the State. After the Board acted, it received a telegram from Allen noting the court decision had been stayed by the appeal and "the law is thus in full effect as of Sept. 1" and that the district will receive its full reimbursement of up to \$15 per pupil in state aid for books bought.

The decision to rescind the earlier action was taken at a Board meeting Monday night.

The Board also voted to grant, as a new law permits, a 50 per cent reduction in school taxes to persons over 65 who have been residents five years, have no school age children living with them and have total family incomes not exceeding \$3000. The town tax receiver and county will be advised of the board's action.

In a precedent setting 6 to 1 decision, it was voted to grant in-service credit to teachers attending a 15-week course from Oct. 17 to Feb. 7 entitled "The Negro in American History" as proposed by the Dutch Lane PTA and Classroom Teachers Assn.

Given on Monday evenings from 8 to 10 p.m., the proposed teachers include Mae Walker, 5th grade teacher in Plainview; Mrs. Elaine Lynn, chairman of English dept. of Rockville Centre High School; Leroy Ramsey, member of Publicity Committee, Committee of 80, Malverne; Mollie C. Hill, NYU Professor; John Dewitt Gregory, LI NAACP director; Dr. John Van Buren, Hofstra assistant professor; Farrell Jones, Nassau Human

Rights Commission director; David F. Parker, Great Neck teacher; Jonathan Harris, Port Washington Social studies dept. chairman; with Robert Sklarz, Hicksville social studies teacher as coordinator and Elaine Weinreb of 2 Root Lane as coordinator. Mrs. Weinreb is parent education chairman of Dutch Lane PTA.

It marked the first time that an in-service training program is being given, with credit, without prior recommendation of the school administrator and with teachers from outside the district. The teachers of the course will get \$25 per two hour session, substantially more than teachers of prior district-sponsored in-service programs. However, course approval was given with the understanding there be no direct expense to the district.

The course sponsor's claim receipt of \$150 from the State Education Dept. and \$100 each from the National Education Assn. and Classroom Teachers Assn.

The motion to grant in-service credit for the 15-week course was made by Evelyn Silver. All Board members voted in favor with the exception of President George A. Jackson.

governor when there were eight contenders for the right to run with Frank O'Connor - and later for Attorney General.

Some weeks ago, after County Executive Eugene Nickerson had withdrawn from the gubernatorial nomination race and freed his pledged delegates, Nassau voted 68 to 14 for O'Connor. At a caucus of Nassau delegates and alternates at the Park Lane Restaurant, Buffalo, on Wednesday afternoon presided over by Pettito, the vote was changed to 75 for O'Connor and 5 remained with Howard J. Samuels who eventually accepted the bid to run for Lieutenant governor. The change in vote for O'Connor had been expected to improve Pettito's chances to run for the no. 2 spot.

Mayor Frank A. Sedita of Buffalo on Thursday took a commanding lead and he was unanimously chosen after a motion to that effect by Pettito.

At Saranac Lake, Mason L. Hampton of Merrick was nominated by the Conservatives for Attorney General. Dr. Paul L. Adams, dean of Robert Wesleyan College near Rochester, was named as candidate of the party for Governor. He received 238 votes to beat Donald H. Serrell of Garden City who received 68 and John O'Leary of Plainview who got 12 ballots.

The Conservatives also named NY Attorney Kieran O'Doherty to run for lieutenant governor, Benjamin R. Crosby, controller of the Sheraton Corp. for 22 years, for state comptroller.

A special four-car train of LIRR coaches rolled up the New York Central rails to Rochester, Tuesday (see picture) carrying the Nassau and other Long Island delegations many of whom stayed at the Towne House Motel.

Seconding speeches were made by four Republicans from Nassau for state candidates: Senator Edward J. Speno of East Meadow for Charles Lanigan for State Comptroller; Richard Meroday of Roosevelt for Gov. Rockefeller; Senator John Dunne of Garden City for Lieut. Gov. Malcolm Wilson and Hempstead Presiding Town Supervisor Ralph G. Caso for Attorney General Louis Lefkowitz. Lanigan will oppose incumbent Arthur Levitt. He is former Mayor Rome and Oneida County Executive.

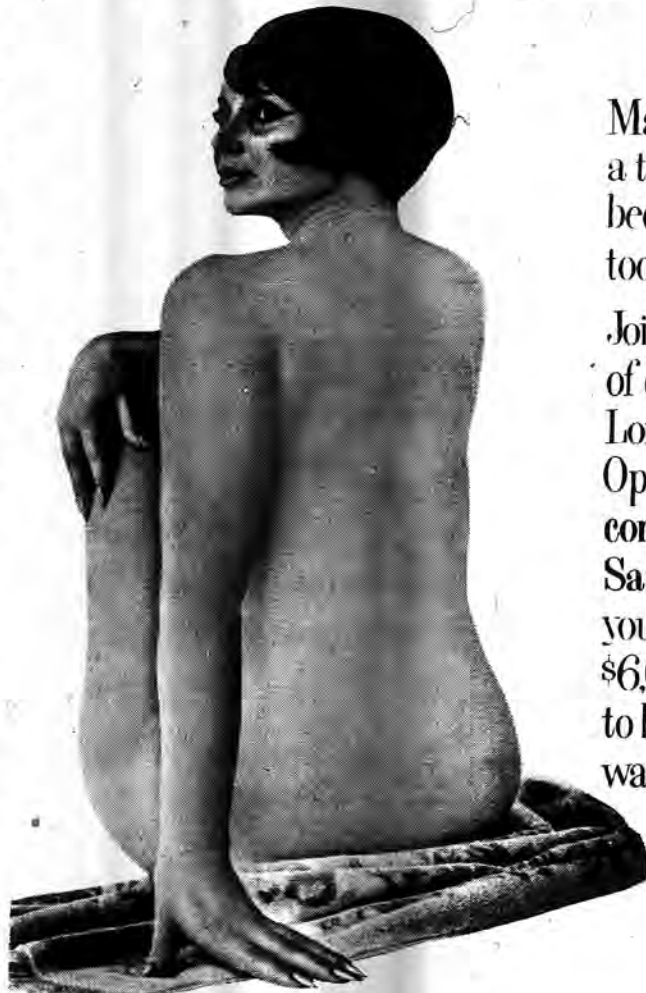

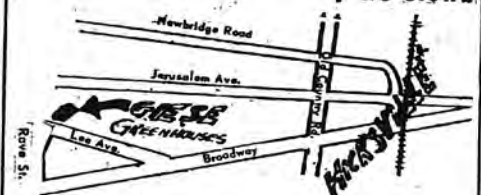

Vietnam. Opposed in the survey were US recognition of Red China and a whopping 81 percent no to 7.5 percent yes on compulsory busing to achieve racial balance.

He also denied reports that the displaced elderly have been replaced by wandering alcoholics who have been troubling residents in the area of the Institute.

Trustees of the Jones Institute are elected by general vote, two from Oyster Bay Township, two from North Hempstead and one from the City of Glen Cove. They receive a nominal salary.

It has long been recognized that the income from the Jones Fund is grossly inadequate today to finance the operations of the Institute and the place has come within the realm of the County Dept. of Public Welfare in certain areas.

The proposed site for the halfway house would be on the east side of Charlotte Ave., adjacent to the LIRR freight yards, and would affect the present red brick structure on the west side of Charlotte.

The Board of Supervisors announcement stated that Edward P. Bracken Jr., has been designated as special counsel by the Jones Fund Trustees to meet with Harold Collins, counsel the Board of Supervisors, to work out "necessary legal details relative to county acquisition of the land". The Jones Trustees also have a regular attorney, Milton Pines of Glen Cove.
