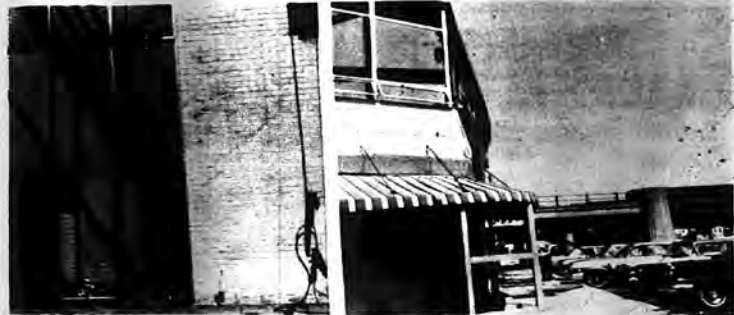

The JFK Memorial

To the Editor:
Enclosed is a copy of a letter sent Sept. 4 to Jack Freedman of 1 Terry St., Hicksville, which may interest your readers.

Dear Mr. Freedman:
I read your statement to the press that you are resigning as Vice-President of the local Teen Dems. This of course is your privilege and you are to be congratulated for having a mind of your own at so early an age. But I do believe you should before making any statements in the future, look more carefully into matters concerning things you know little or nothing about, and I refer to the John F. Kennedy

Hicksville Permanent Memorial. You state, "There are many types of Democratic bungling that cost the taxpayers money and tend to add to the deterioration of the area around in Hicksville, such as the disgrace at the Kennedy Memorial Park in Hicksville or the sloppiness at Town Hall."

As Founder and Co-Chairman of the John F. Kennedy Hicksville Permanent Memorial I feel I am qualified and more familiar than most people with the situation so let me set you straight at this time. The Memorial itself was erected 1-1/2 years ago at no extra cost then or now to the local taxpayer. Because of your age I do not expect you to remember what that piece of land looked like before the John F. Kennedy Memorial was erected on it, but I can assure you it certainly has improved. Another thing, the John

F. Kennedy Memorial is strictly a non-political project and will continue to be as such as long as the "Committee" for this Memorial can help it. The other "Committee" members are as follows, Mrs. Edward Farrell, Mr. Edward Quinn and Mr. Fred Noth, respected citizens of Hicksville.

DATA: the John F. Kennedy Hicksville Permanent Memorial is a community project honoring the memory of our late President and the 28 men of Hicksville who gave their lives in World War I, World War II, the Korean War and the Viet Nam Conflict. Another thing you imply is that the land on which the Memorial stands belongs to the local government. Well it does not, it belongs to the State of New York. I know this for a fact as it was I who submitted the plans for the Memorial and it was my personal check that paid for the permit to erect the Memorial on that piece of land. As further proof I am inserting at this point a part of a letter sent to me by the State of New York Department of Public Works dated May 21st, 1965. This was in answer to an invitation from the Committee to attend the Dedication Ceremonies.

"We cannot conceive a finer use of public land than for a tribute of this nature that not only honors a great President but also 28 other fine men who have also given their lives for their country. You are to be congratulated for having the stamina and perseverance in bringing your plan to completion as we have had many requests previous to yours that have never materialized." It is signed by A.M. Saxe, Metropolitan District Engineer by E.J. Moloney, Assistant to the District Engineer. It was with the kind cooperation of the members of the Town Board of Oyster Bay that the Memorial came to be.

The Memorial stone, bronze plaque, flag pole and cement walk was paid for with contributions sent in by private citizens, clubs and groups of Hicksville, a few past residents and other interested people. At no time ever has the local taxes been raised or applied to support the J.F. Kennedy Memorial. As for the piece of property that surrounds it, up until recently it was up to people like you and I to see that it was kept in good condition. In the past the local Boy Scout Troop, Mr. Quinn and his teenage sons, Mr. Arnstein and myself have tried to do what we could. It took 18 months for the Committee to raise the money for the Memorial. When the time comes that more contributions are sent to me, the Mid Island Herald or the Long Island National Bank of Hicksville, who so kindly opened an account for us, then and only then will more walks and the benches be added as per the original plans.

As the result of the urging and efforts of the Supervisor an agreement has recently been concluded between the State of New York Department of Public Works and the Town of Oyster Bay under the terms of which the Town

LOCAL LAW NO. 4 - 1966
