

A bill toprovide veterans of the Victnam war benefits identical to those granted for ex-soldiers of earlier wars passed the Senate. The bill, which goes to the House of Representatives, looks like it will be overhauled there. The House may come up with a bill, similar but one more generous, that would cover more men. The Senate-passed bill would provide the Vietnam era veterans with the following additional benefits:

benefits;

1. Disability compensation at war-time rates which are 20 per cent higher than those in peace-time. It would affect an estimated

3,000 veterans now on the rolls.
2. Pensions for non-service connected disabilities.
3. A 250 dollar burial allow-

3. A 250 dollar burial allowance.
4. Free drugs and medication for veterans requiring constant aid and attendance.
5. Grants of up to \$1600 would be given to seriously disabled veterans toward the purchase of a specially equipped automobile. The legislation would also remove the time limit which veterans can apply for eargrants from the Veterans Administration.

A new part of the medicare law started on Jan, I, according to Daniel H. Newman, Acting Social Security Manager, This is the part that pays for skilled nursing care provided elderly people following their discharge from the hospital.

Medicare will pay for up to 100 days of skilled nursing care in an "extended care facility" following a hospital stay of three days or more, Newman said, An extended care facility and be a separate but distinct part of an institution, such as a ward or wing of a hospital.

"Extended care," Newman explained, "is a cross between hospital care and the traditional nursing home care." Care in an extended care facility will combine the quality of medical treatment ordinarily given in a hospital end of the stay in an extended care facility will be a substitute for time that before would have been spent in the hospital. For example, a medicare patient who before might go into a hospital and spend 15 days may now stay in the hospital for only 10 days and then be transferred to a qualified extended care facility for continued treatment.

Newman emphasized that medicare will not pay for long-term care in a custodial nursing home.

In the past, Newman said, this special kind of care in an extended care facility has not been readily available and, therefore, very few people have really experienced it. The skilled nursing benefit under medicare will encourage the development of skilled nursing homes and support a new and important trend in medical care.


