See Newbridge Rd Work Start In May

The long-awaited widening of Newbridge Rd. from Old Country Rd. south to Hempstead Tpke. a distance of 2.72 miles as a four-lane divided highway moved another step toward construction with the receipt of six bids; the lowest \$4,485,042.

Seeks Re-election



GEORGE A. JACKSON, currently President of the Hicksville Board of Education, has made it known that he will be a candidate for re-election for a third three-year term in the annual trustee election in May. He resides at 61 Berkshire Rd., Hicksville. His nominating petition has been filed with the District Clerk. The term of Caleb Hornbostel also expires this year. He has not disclosed his plans.

Little Town Halls Open

Little Town Halls across the Town will be inaugurated beginning March 20 announced Town Board Majority Leader Edward J. Poulos.

Poulos explained that the policy is being put into effect to enable residents to discuss community problems at convenient locations thus saving time and inconvenience traveling to Town Hall. Under this system Councilman will be able to discuss matters of local interest and concern with residents for the purpose of arriving at acceptable community resolutions. The schedule for the Little Town Halls follows:

Councilman Angelo D. Roncallo at Marjorie R. Post Community Park Office every Thursday evening from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.

Councilman Frank Hynes - 574 Fulton Street, Farmingdale, every Friday evening, 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.

Councilman A. Carl Grunewald at Hicksville Annex, 65 Broadway, Hicksville every Thursday

The project is scheduled for completion by Aug. 1, 1969 and includes a new highway grade structure over Wantagh State Pkwy near the southern end of the improvement.

The State Dept. of Public Works in Albany revealed that Hendrickson Bros. of Valley Stream was the low bidder. The contract will be awarded following a routine check by State engineers of all bids received. Signing could be by Apr. 9 with work to start shortly after the contract is executed.

The new road will consist of twin cement concrete pavements, each 25 feet wide, divided by a 20-foot raised mall. Each pavement will be flanked on the right by a 10-foot-wide asphalt concrete parking lane which would make the total width 90 feet. The road is currently only two single lanes. Some dwellings and structures on the west side are scheduled for relocation or demolition along the nearly three-mile stretch.

Meanwhile, on the Broadway west-side widening it was learned that property owners and tenants that the State has "vested title" in various properties from Herzog Pl. south past W. Marie St. Included is the owner of the former Huettner Dept. Store bldg., its tenants and L.I. National Bank. The filing of the map took place on Feb. 20.

Town Earns Money

The Town of Oyster Bay is continuing to benefit from high interest rates from investments in Certificates of Deposit "by judicious use of informal bidding among commercial banks within the town," it is disclosed by Comptroller Joseph Macdonald.

Recently Town officials notified banks that it had \$3,800,000 in funds not required for immediate expenditure and invited informal bids. As a result the Town expects to earn \$148,000 in interest.

Reilly Pulls Out Bill Permitting Alcoholic Center at Jones Institute

Assemblyman Joseph Reilly on his own motion has had a bill killed in the State Ways and Means Committee which would have affected the Jones Institute in Hicksville. While a co-sponsor of the bill at the request of the County Board of Supervisors, he withdrew it because of the strong opposition registered by Hicksville residents.

The measure which would have changed the historic will of Samuel Jones who left an estate to provide for the poor of Oyster Bay and North Hempstead Townships about a century ago was co-sponsored by State Senator John D. Caemmerer of Williston Park and was reported to have passed the Senate.

While the basic opposition to the proposed law was due to fears that Jones Institute on W. John St. would be converted into an alcoholic cure centre, the actual law provided for a change in the Jones will to permit the use of the Institute by the Nassau Dept. of Public Welfare for purposes other than the care of destitute, elderly people.

Reports that Jones Institute was in fact being used as an alcoholic cure centre some months ago were vigorously denied at the time by a Trustee of the Fund and other officials.

In the face of rising costs over the decades, the fund left by Jones has long since failed to provide enough annual revenue to maintain Jones Institute and it has gradually come under the wing of the County Public Welfare Dept., financially and management-wise; however, the inmates have continued to be persons in need.

Residents of the Jericho Fire District are requested to be aware of the location of the fire hydrant nearest to their home and in the event of a snowfall, to remove the snow around it.

Nab Office Worker Making Obscene Telephone Calls

A 32-year-old Bethpage office worker has been arrested on a charge of making obscene telephone calls to a 20-year-old neighborhood girl.

Detectives of the Eighth Precinct Squad made the arrest on Mar. 7 while Ernest Cirrizzo of 65 Chestnut Road was speaking to the girl.

Cirrizzo was booked at the precinct house in Bethpage on a charge of violating Section 555 of the New York State Penal Code—a misdemeanor with a maximum penalty of one year imprisonment and a \$500 fine.

The office worker appeared the next day in First District Court, Mineola, before Judge Alfred L. Sumner who sent him to Meadowbrook Hospital, East Meadow, for psychiatric examination.

Cirrizzo's arrest capped an intensive investigation by Eighth Squad detectives and members of New York Telephone's security group.

The case was one of the first referred to the telephone company's Downtown Assessment Call Bureau when it was established in March 1966. A list of possible callers was provided by the girl's family and specialists of the bureau, working with Plant and Security Department employees, eliminated each one in turn by electronic means.

Devices used in the hunt included the marker trap circuit which automatically punches a card indicating the telephone numbers of the caller and called party as well as the time; and the pen register, which automatically records on paper tape the number called and the time that the call is made.

In November 1966 the girl's family furnished Ernest Cirrizzo's name. The calling pattern indicated that the calls were being made from a work location, so marker trap cir-

cuits were placed on the lines of his employer, a Rockville Centre company.

The punched cards soon showed that calls were being made to the Bethpage family from a telephone at Cirrizzo's desk. N.Y. Telephone investigator Walter Olson and Eighth Squad detective Edward Zukerwitz obtained the company's cooperation.

A special receiver at the Rockville Centre company picked up the signal at 7:45 P.M. on Mar. 7. Olson alerted investigator David Stratten who notified detective sergeant Donald Calne and detectives Kenneth Holtz and Louis Curtis in a nearby office. The three detectives arrested Cirrizzo before he had a chance to hang up on the call.

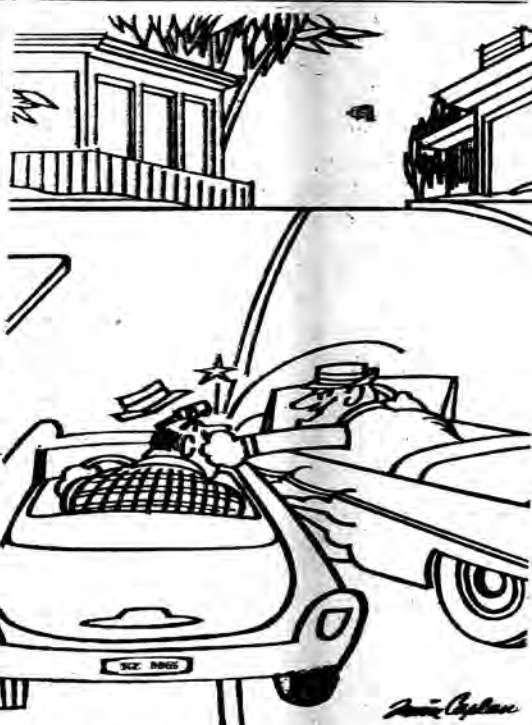

THE CREATION of a Standing Committee on Veterans Affairs in the Senate is running into a snag. A power struggle is shaping up on the floor with both sides having powerful arguments.

Bitterly opposed to the idea is Senator Russell Long, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee. Says Long, "Members of the Senate Veterans Committee would be faced with a conflict of interest. What is good for the nation as a whole and what is good for a segment of the nation, veterans."

Long prefers the present system, which requires his committee to cater to other interests while considering veterans legislation. While most of the opposition comes from those who will lose control of veterans legislation if a new committee is approved, more than 50 Sen-

ators in the 96th Congress have at one time or another indicated their support of the new committee.

THE VETERANS ADMINISTRATION'S new information center in Vietnam is reporting a booming business among returning soldiers. Although, only in operation since January response to the new program by GI's in Vietnam has been most enthusiastic.

In its first five days of operation the two men team conducted 157 personal interviews and helped servicemen complete 45 applications. They were primarily for educational assistance and compensation for disabilities suffered while on active duty.

WORLD WAR II VETERANS: The Veterans Administration is urging World War II veterans who still have their term life insurance to consider switching over to permanent policies. Since

2.4 million WW II veterans who still have the term policies may find out in a few years they can't afford it just when they need it the most.

At present the average premium for a WW II vet on \$10,000 worth of insurance is \$9.50 a month. In ten years it will soar to \$29.78. After the conversion from a term policy to a permanent one, the premium remains the same throughout the years.
