'New Look' Along Bway



Instruction to Cost \$9,597,000: Record Budget Up \$1.7 Million

Three months of board and committee sessions devoted to preparation of the 1967-68 Hicksville School District budget concluded Thursday night at 11 PM with the adoption of a tentative budget \$1,755,073 more than the current year's \$13,449,500. It will be the subject of a public hearing at the Senior High School auditorium on Monday night, April 17, at 8 PM.

3 Candidates for 2 School Board Seats

The Hicksville School Trustee election of May 3 began to take shape this week with one incumbent's nominating petition already filed and two others announcing their intentions. George A. Jackson, completing six years on the Board, has filed a nominating petition to succeed himself.

Thomas F. Nagle of 114 Blueberry Lane, Hicksville, announced he will be a candidate for the vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of Caleb Hornbostel. A Hicksville resident 11 years, he is a retail store sales manager. He has been on the adult education advisory committee for three years and the public relations advisory committee for the same period. He has a child in kindergarten.

A housewife, Joan Martindale, of 263 Acre Lane, has been endorsed by the Taxpayers Educational Assn. for the Children of Hicksville (TEACH) of which she is a vice president, as its candidate for the School Board. There was no indication as to whether she would seek the Jackson or Hornbostel position.

A six year resident with a bachelor degree, she has three children, two in public school. She has served in the Dutch Lane PTA and Hicksville PTA Council. She is a member of the League of Women Voters, Campfire Girls leader and secretary of the Adult Education Advisory Committee to the Board of Education.

Mrs. Martindale has worked as a secretary to the Fine Arts Dept. of the State University at Plattsburgh, an art teacher for the Hicksville Recreation program, a playground supervisor in her home town, Glen Falls, and a machine operator in a drug products plant in Iowa City.

The five-year term of Abraham Fishman, serving by appointment, as a trustee of the Hicksville Free Public Library will also expire. No candidates have filed as of Wednesday.

Wednesday, Apr. 19, is the last

date for the filing of nominating petitions.

Voter registration dates for those who are not on the books will take place at the Administration Building on Division Ave. from 2 to 10 PM on Wednesday and Thursday, Apr. 19 and 20.

The budget was developed by the School Administration during the summer and fall and presented to the Board the end of December 1966. The total now stands at \$15,204,573 unless it is changed as a result of the public hearing which by past experience, is unlikely.

The cost of instruction in the regular program remains the largest single category in the 10 code budget. Code 200 - Instruction - based on Board action in increasing the starting scale for teachers from \$6000 to \$6300 as of Sept. 1 and other decisions regarding index paid assistant and principals and supervisors now stands at \$9,597,000 compared with \$8,274,620 this current year or an increase of about \$1,320,000. Two categories have declined slightly: The Board of Education (Code 000) and Central Administration (Code 100).

Other categories are Instruction, special schools, up from \$92,000 to \$135,000; recreation up from \$74,775 to \$76,789; transportation up from \$536,590 to \$573,488; operation of plant and maintenance, up from \$1,030,350 to \$1,245,000; unallocated expenditures (largely employee benefits) up from \$1,849,300 to \$2,168,400; debt service up from \$1,200,000 to \$1,253,00 and interest transfers up from \$30,000 to \$90,000.

13 Percent Increase

It was unofficially calculated that the new tentative budget represents a 13 percent increase for the coming year. The library board has announced its budget, which together with the school budget will be voted upon on Wednesday, May 3, will rise about two cents on the tax rate. No official tax rate can be set by the Board until August when the new total assessed valuation is established by the County. However, it has been calculated the school budget based unofficially upon current assessment would result in a tax increase of \$1.70 per \$100 plus two cents for the library. It had been feared as recently as last week that the tax rate increase might be as much as \$3 per \$100. The effect of the proposed lottery with a portion of the proceeds going to local school financial aid thru the state has not been determined. The full effect of the lottery as a revenue producer is not expected to be reflected until the following year.

Two separate propositions will appear on the voting machines on May 3. One provides that the Board of Education may enter into a three-year contract for general transportation and the other provides that the Board may enter into a five-year contract for transportation of physically handicapped.
