School, Library Budget Hearings Next Week

Hicksville Board of Education will hold a public hearing in the high school auditorium Monday night, April 17, starting at 8 PM upon the proposed school district budget. President George A. Jackson will preside.

Copies of a breakdown of the budget proposed are scheduled for delivery by mail this week to all residents.

The Board of Trustees of the Hicksville Public Library will

hold a public discussion of their budget of \$299,780 at the library on Wednesday, April 19, at about 8:30 PM. The regular monthly meeting of the trustees will start at 8 PM.

Voting on the budgets will take place on Wednesday, May 3, between 11 AM and 10 PM. Registration of voters takes place Wednesday and Thursday, April 19 and 20, from 2 PM to 10 PM at the Administration building on Division Ave.

State to Pay For Parking Areas

The Town of Oyster Bay has accepted offers of the State of New York to pay \$44,865 for segments of public parking fields owned by the town which were necessary for the Hicksville Grade crossing Elimination Project. It was announced by councilman Ralph J. Marino.

Councilman Marino said that the parcels concerned in the offer were appraised by a town representative and were certified to the Town Board as fair and reasonable.

will be let by July 1. This mechanization will be installed in the Hicksville Office as part of Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien's accelerated mechanization program to modernize and mechanize postal operations. Approximately \$23 million of equipment will be ordered nationwide within the next four months.

The mechanization to be installed in the Hicksville Post Office includes 1 Conveyor Belt System and 1 Sack Sorting Machine.

Sack sorting machines are designed to provide for the initial separation of all non-preferential sacked mail arriving at and entering a post office. The machine is made up of a series of trays attached to an endless chain conveyor, which carries the sacks from the induction point and delivers it to its final processing or dispatching point within the office. This machine is integrated with the conveyor belt system.

The impact of the collision scattered parts of the car along 200 feet of track and four of the victims were tossed out of the vehicle.

NAGEL, resident at 114 Blueberry Lane with his wife, Barbara, and five children over 12 years, is a candidate for the Hicksville Board of Education and has filed a petition for the vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of Caleb Hornbostel. He has been a member of the Public Relations and Adult Education Advisory Councils to the School Board for three years. He has served on the Westbury Public School Distributive Education Program. He received a BS degree in business administration and philosophy from Fordham University, attended CCNY. He is employed as a store manager in a retail sales chain on Long Island. He is president of the Holy Name Society of Holy Family Church and has been president of the church's "released time" program for five years.

Asked to state why he is a candidate, he said: "Since education is the means to a better community (local and world) any activity related to schools is of great interest to me. Postal Workers Plan to Protest

Postal workers shocked by a proposal of President Johnson to increase salaries 4.5 percent effective Oct. 1 are planning a march in Washington to demonstrate their feelings, according to Vincent Sugamele of Hicksville, president of the LI and Greater NY Postal Union. He is

joined by Postal Union and Letter Carrier organizations.

Spokesmen for union leaders representing 50,000 organized postal workers in the Nation declare their salaries are lagging 15 percent behind comparable salaries in industry.

"Better pay means better service," they declare, and "would rather have nothing than this pitiful handout."

Goldman Bros to Expand Again

UPON COMPLETION of the three story building now under construction at the southeast corner of Broadway and East Carl St., Hicksville, the well-known Goldman Bros., will occupy more than 12,000 square feet of space on the street floor and basement level. The new building is across the street from the present Goldman Bros. Store.

Lawrence M. Scalera, A.I.A. who has designed the building and who will also have his offices in it, states that the new edifice will have a marble facing, with bronze windows and bronze solar glass. The building will have an elevator and be fully air-conditioned. A 100 car parking area will be located on the east side of the building, with an entrance on E. Carl Street, and exit on Richard Street.

Goldman Brothers, now one of Long Island's

leading suppliers of work clothes and uniforms for local workers, industrial firms and municipal agencies, was founded as a men's and boy's shop in a small store at 107 Broadway, near Marie St., by Morris Goldman, (father of the present owners, Irwin and Howard) who passed away in 1948. Since the firm has moved to its present location at 192 Broadway in 1951, it enlarged its premises in 1952, 1957 and finally in 1961, where it is now three times the size of the space occupied in 1951.

Irwin and Howard Goldman grew up locally and are both graduates of Hicksville High School (1943 and 1945) respectively, and both hold degrees from Columbia University. Scalera, architect and engineer, has had his office in Hicksville for many years, and has designed many industrial and commercial structures erected locally and throughout Long Island.

Joan Martindale States Platform

The following statement was made by Mrs. Joan Martindale, TEACH candidate for the Hicksville school board, upon release of her campaign platform.

Mrs. Martindale said, "I have always recognized the vital role education plays in our democracy and I believe firmly in the right of citizens to participate in educational matters. I fully appreciate the role and duties of a school board member. And I have come to know the many parts to our educational program; its strengths as well as some of its weaknesses.

"I will bring to the Board the understandings gained through years of direct participation in educational concerns and a willingness to work hard and conscientiously for the best interests of all the children in District 17.

The following is the platform released by Mrs. Martindale:

1. Insure better utilization of the Professional Negotiations agreement in order to encourage increased teacher participation in professional areas.
2. Continue to improve communication between home and school, administration and staff, Board of Education and community.
3. Support the role of the Board of Education in the continued selection of quality administrative personnel.
4. Effect the development of a dynamic in-service program for our teachers' continued educational advancement.
5. Improve the quality of guidance services.
6. Achieve better coordination and cooperative planning in the teaching of science and art in the elementary school.
7. Continue budget planning on the basis of educational priorities.
8. Review the advisability of departmentalization at the elementary level.
9. Support the ACCES (Area Centers of Cooperative Educational Services) program for vocational education.
10. Investigate alternative sources of income to ease the tax burden on the small homeowner.
11. Encourage teacher and administrative attendance at professional conferences.
12. Support the school and library budgets.
