Award Newbridge Widening Contract

Newbridge Rd. from Hempstead Tpke, north 2.72 miles to Old Country Rd., will be the scene of construction for the next two years under a contract just awarded by the state of New York to Hendrickson Bros. Inc. The job cost is listed at \$4,485,042.

The firm submitted the lowest of six bids to the State Dept. of Public Works.

The new highway will consist of twin cement concrete pavements, each 25 feet wide, divided by a 20-foot wide raised mall. Each pavement will be flanked on the right by a 10-

foot wide asphalt concrete parking lane.

Scheduled for completion by Aug. 1, 1969, all work will be under the supervision of Austin M. Sarr, engineer in charge of the Dept. of Public Works District Office at Babylon.

Board, Public Consider Possible Budget Slashes

While no final determination will be made until the Hicksville School Board holds a special meeting next Monday Night, May 15, consideration is being given to the conduct of a second vote on the defeated school budget toward the end of June. For more than three hours, last Monday night, the Board invited audience comments on the document turned down, 1922 yes to 3075 no, May 3.

Comments focused upon possible reduction of the total record budget by revisions in the areas of a planned 8-period high school day, reduction of bus mileage distances, putting adult education on a self-supporting basis, revisions in the hot lunch program, reducing or eliminating recreation.

School Superintendent Donald F. Abt emphasized to the audience that the budget offered the voters was the bare minimum money required to provide quality education for the children of Hicksville. He noted that more than one million dollars had been cut out of the budget as originally proposed by the administration. This budget, he asserted, "is minimal."

Several times Board President George A. Jackson called on the audience to display by show of hands their thinking on various proposals. Opinion appeared to be fairly evenly divided. The audience at one point exceeded 450 persons and overflowed out into the corridor and adjacent room. There were many standees.

The attendance was in sharp contrast to the small group present for the formal discussion of the budget prior to the May 3 balloting.

William A. Bruno, Jr., a former Board member, charged that a half million dollars can be cut from the budget. "I hope you have the courage to cut this budget or we will continue to defeat it," he threatened.

Not everyone present wanted to cut the budget. Some noted that various programs had been eliminated already, including the purchase of new books for the school library. At one point it was charged that students were being used for "propaganda purposes."

It was mentioned by Jackson that the Board may offer a base budget with those areas under attack presented as separate, individual questions for yes or no voting.

It was proposed that summer remedial school be limited this year to one location, instead of the three previously planned to make the program available to more children who need it. Eliminating of the data processing procedure was suggested.

Individual Board members were given an opportunity to express their views on how the budget could be adjusted before resubmission to the voters.

Change Meeting Date

The regular monthly meeting of the Hicksville Public Library Board of Trustees will be changed from May 17th to May 24th. The meeting will be held at the public library at 8:15 p.m.

Appoint Ray Rusch As HHS Principal

Following a strenuous weekend during which petitions and letters were gathered and the telephone lines were kept humming the Hicksville Board of Education as the first item of business at a jammed meeting, Monday night, made Raymond Rusch principal of Hicksville Senior High School.

The vote was unanimous with all seven trustees present and balloting. It has been reported that the Board was split, 4 to 3 on giving the position to Rusch who was named acting principal last fall when Principal Leon J. Galloway was advanced to administrative assistant to School Superintendent Donald F. Abt.

It was known that the Board as a committee had interviewed several candidates for the position, including Rusch. His appointment was recommended by the School Superintendent. Received were dozens of letters, telegrams and petitions from residents supporting Rusch who is himself a graduate of the school and was assistant principal under Galloway.

The Board also voted 7-0 on appointment of James Jones for assistant principal of the High School. He had also been on an acting status.

The Board was split, 4 to 3, on the appointment of James Curran as head of the Social Studies Dept. Jones and Curran had also been recommended by Abt.

The vote on Curran was Marvin Goldberg, Evelyn Silver, Harry Kershen and Harold Sternberger "no" and Cornelius McCormack, Caleb Hornbostel and George A. Jackson voting "aye."

Action on the appointments took place shortly after the meeting came to order in the administration building conference room. It was recessed to move to the larger space of the high school student cafeteria where it resumed at 8. It was estimated 450 people were present for the start of the session which was devoted largely to the recently defeated school budget.

Arrange Seminar

BUDGET DEFEAT

To the Editor:

It was with a sense of deep regret that I read of the rejection of the school budget this week, and learned that Hicksville had joined the ranks (in my opinion) of other mis-guided and short-sighted communities on Long Island.

At a time when we are told of the large number of job vacancies now requiring high school education as a minimum and increasingly even college training, this would seem to be the worst possible time to hamper a high quality school program. Hicksville has an enviable reputation in the state for its scholastic achievement. Much of the credit must go to the superintendent and the Board of Education for creating a climate where quality education could flourish. It would be tragic, indeed, if this climate were not sustained.

Education is not the place to cut expenses. It is a matter of values, not only for the individual, but also for the community. If individuals cannot succeed in their life work because of inferior education, the community becomes a town with a disproportionate number of semi-failures, and cannot be a successful community.

It is relevant to ask: How many of us now voting are where we are because we received a good education - paid for without complaint by other taxpayers? If we really value education, we should be ready to sacrifice if necessary to obtain it for our community, who would wish to live in a town where it was not valued?

I believe we must expect the cost of education to go up every year as long as costs go up and incomes go up - and as long as we want increased services. We should not be frightened by any particular figure in budget cost or tax increase. It is more in the point to consider what the proportion is of the tax to our income. Has it really increased so alarmingly?

Even in the case of retirees like myself, most of us have pet extravagances that more than cover the school tax increase. If we really think education is important, it is worth the sacrifice - so long as the money is efficiently spent.

Those who are dissatisfied, obviously have expressed themselves. Those who are not, frequently take matters for granted and fail to vote. If you care for your child's future and the future of the town, come out next time and vote "yes" for the school budget.

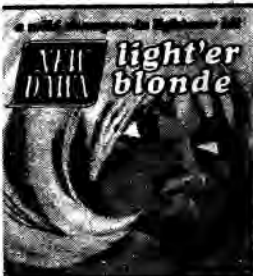
