## Honor Frank Chlumsky As County Good Neighbor



FRANK CHLUMSKY of Hicksville was presented with an engraved pewter bowl in recognition of his designation as "Good Neighbor of the Year for all of Nassau County" by the County Press Assn at its annual installation dinner-dance at Carl Hoppl's Baldwin on June 23. The presentation was made by Fred J. Noth, HERALD publisher who was awards chairman of the Press Assn. The final selection from among the various community nominees was made by a committee consisting of A. Holly Patterson, former Nassau County Executive; Bill Nelson, promotional director of Radio Station WHLI and Frances Reder of East Meadow, club-woman and civic leader.

His nomination made jointly by the Mid Island Herald and Mid Island Times noted that he has a "long record of unselfish and devoted service to the people of his community, town and county."

"During both World War I and World War II he was chairman of a unique organization which undertook to mail each month parcels to men and women from the community serving in the armed forces. This approached 200 in World War I and over 700 in World War II. He undertook to keep track of all addresses, periods of service, etc. He also served following both wars on the community committees which raised the funds and erect-

ed fitting memorials to those who served which are now set in a park-like area on the junior high school campus.

"Prior to the formation of the American Legion, he was a leader of a patriotic order which arranged for annual Memorial Day services in Hicksville. Extremely active and concerned with community affairs he found the time to serve 25 years on the Board of Education, many of as its president.

"He was for many years secretary of the Hicksville Fire District and at the same time the unpaid secretary of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce.

"He has held every office in the Hicksville Kiwanis and in recent years has been annually re-elected as its recording secretary. He was 14 years on the Town Board as a Councilman. He has been the chairman many times over the years for the Boy Scouts of America and Cerebral Palsy in their annual fund appeals.

"For the past 15 years he has been chairman of the Hicksville Unit of Salvation Army and as such has frequently been able to come to the assistance of persons lacking shelter, food or heat....

"It would be difficult to find another person in our county who has served so generously, without thought of personal gain, for so long a period in the interest of his neighbors."

### AUSTERITY BUDGET

To the Editor,

It seems that the Hicksville Board of Education and some of its cohorts have the idea that the purpose to an "Austerity Budget" is to impress the voters, people with school children, and also the over-burdened taxpayers - of the awful impact of such a budget upon the children.

Only this "IDEA" would explain why children were notified to appear this morning (6/27/67) for registration in summer school, after which notification the Hicksville Board of Education last night cancelled the summer school sessions, thereby giving the FULL IMPACT of "AUSTERITY" to the students and their relatives, and so, possibly, increase the number of "YES" votes when the Board again has the nerve to submit a budget similar to their last two.

If they had summer sessions on last years budget, there can be no justification for not having them this year on the same budget. It should not be necessary to tell them - what and where to trim. They know - among other things - what retroactive salary increases do to a budget - and if they don't, the taxpayers do. ### SAFETY BULLETIN ON THE USE OF CALCIUM HYPOCHLORITE (CHLORINE) FOR SWIMMING POOLS.

The general public is urged to follow the following instructions for the safe storage, use and handling of calcium hypochlorite around the home:

1. Read the container label of the product being used and carefully follow directions.
2. Store original container in cool, clean, dry place, away from stone pipes or other sources of heat. Separate container from all organic or oxidizable materials and any other possible contaminants. DO NOT USE WITH HOTLIPS. Keep covered with original closure and out of reach of children. Avoid out-of-season carry-over storage of unused stock supplies.
3. Use only clean, dry and noncombustible scoops, such as porcelain or enamel cups, glass containers, or clean metal spoons, for transferring the chemical from the drum to the mixing container or to the pool. Use of the plastic scoop supplied with the chemical is permissible. DO NOT use dirty containers such as beer cans, coffee cans, etc.
4. Never dissolve the chemical in other than plain water. NEVER POUR WATER OVER THE CHEMICAL. Always pour the chemical into water, with constant stirring.
5. Dispose of spilled material immediately by flushing with large amounts of water. Rinse empty containers thoroughly with water before discarding.
6. Keep hands clean and wash hands after handling. Gloves should not be worn because they may become impregnated with the chemical, resulting in spontaneous combustion.
7. Avoid contact of salt or solution with the eyes or skin. When contact occurs, wash involved area immediately with free flowing water for rapid and thorough dilution. When eye irritation or skin burns occur, obtain medical assistance at once.
8. Avoid inhalation of escaping chlorine gas. Move anyone overcome by chlorine gas to an open area and call the Fire Department for oxygen.
9. In fires involving calcium hypochlorite (chlorine) call the fire Department. Immediately "FLOOD" with water only. Do not use dry chemical or vaporizing liquid (carbon tetrachloride) fire extinguishers.

## Would Revise Lottery Ad Laws

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Ralph J. Marino on June 22 proposed revision of Federal laws that prohibit the advertising of lotteries in newspapers and on radio and television.

Marino wrote Senators Javits and Kennedy and Congressmen Grover and Wyder, urging, in light of disappointing lottery sales, that they act to have legislation introduced to allow for advertising in papers and on the air. "Unless a vigorous advertising campaign can be mounted," wrote Marino, "the original estimate of daily sales of one million tickets apparently will not be reached. Our hard pressed school districts need every potential dollar, and means must be found to make the lottery a success."

In his letter, Marino contended that present Federal regulations are unduly restrictive and should be reconsidered now that the nation's second most populous state has seen fit to institute a lottery to help support education.

"Newspapers, radio and television," he said, "have proven to be the most effective media for selling most of America's goods and services."

As the HERALD went to press, a special

The Board voted Monday night, 5 to 2, not to conduct the summer high school program. Suddenly students and parents found they would have to seek out neighboring districts with vacancies for non-residents at \$30 to \$40 a credit. Teachers who had been assured summer work for the high school had to chase out to find jobs in other districts.

On Tuesday evening, students staged a quiet demonstration in

front of the high school. They were addressed by Board President George A. Jackson. It was suggested they may seek signatures on petitions to the Board calling for a third budget vote. Teenagers were busy in Hicksville on Wednesday with petitions, assuring would-be signers "there will be no increase in the tax rate".

Meanwhile, over the weekend the high school commencement exercises which have been held out of doors in recent years due to the class size were hit by a thunder storm on Sunday afternoon. With 8,000 spectators gathered on the high school campus, the rains fell just as Principal Raymond Rusch was getting into his text.

# LEGAL NOTICE

## PUBLIC NOTICE

NOTICE is hereby given that a public hearing will be held by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay on Tuesday, July 11, 1967, at 10 o'clock A.M., prevailing time, in the Hearing Room, Town Hall, Oyster Bay, New York, at which time citizens and parties interested will have an opportunity to be heard upon the proposal of repealing the "Anti-Noise Ordinance" which was adopted November 12, 1957, and adopting a new ordinance to be known as the "Necessary Noise Ordinance of the Town of Oyster Bay." The following is the proposed new ordinance:

## UNNECESSARY NOISE ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY

### ARTICLE I

Section 1. Declaration of Policy. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the Town Board to prevent any unreasonable loud disturbing and unnecessary noise, noise of such character, intensity and duration as to be detrimental to the life or health of any individual, or contrary to the public welfare, is prohibited.

Section 2. Prohibited Noises. The following acts, among others, are declared to be loud, disturbing and unnecessary noises in violation of this ordinance, but any enumeration herein shall not be deemed to be exclusive:

a. The operation of any radio, phonograph or use of any musical instrument in such a manner or with such volume, particularly between eleven o'clock P.M. and seven o'clock A.M., as to annoy or disturb the quiet, comfort or repose of persons in any dwelling, hotel or other type of residence.

b. The keeping of any animal or bird which by causing frequent or long continued noise shall disturb the comfort and repose of any person in the vicinity.

c. The use of any automobile, motorcycle, street car or vehicle so out of repair, so loaded or in such manner as to create loud and unnecessary grating, grinding, rattling or other noise.

d. The blowing of any steam whistle attached to any stationary boiler except to give notice of the time to begin or stop work or as a warning of danger.

e. The discharge into the atmosphere of the exhaust of any steam engine, stationary internal combustion engine or motor vehicle engine except through a muffler or other device which will effectively prevent loud or excessive noises therefrom.

f. The erection, including excavation, demolition, alteration or repair of any building other than between seven o'clock P.M. and six o'clock A.M., on weekdays, except in case of urgent necessity in the interest of public safety and then only with a permit from the Building Department which permit may be renewed for a period of three days or less while the emergency continues.

g. The creation of any excessive noise or any other disturbance of the peace, or the substitution of loudness or noise while the same is being used, or adjacent to any building, which unreasonably interferes with the workings of such institution, provided conspicuous signs are displayed in such streets indicating that the same is a school, hospital or court street.

h. The creation of a loud and excessive noise in connection with loading or unloading any vehicle or the opening and destruction of boxes, crates and containers.

i. The shouting and crying of peddlers, hawkers and vendors which disturbs the peace and quiet of the neighborhood.

j. The use of any drum, loud speakers or other instrument or device for the

purpose of attracting attention to any sale or display of merchandise by the creation of noise.

k. The sounding of any horn or signal device on any automobile, motorcycle, bus, street car or other vehicle except as a warning signal pursuant to the provisions of Section 17 of the Vehicle and Traffic Law of the State of New York.

l. The use of any radio apparatus, talking machine, loud speaker, or amplifier attached thereto in such a manner that the loud speaker shall cause the sound from such radio apparatus or talking machine to be projected directly therefrom outside of any building or out of doors; or the use of any radio apparatus, talking machine, loud speaker, or amplifier which is in any way fastened to or connected with any outside wall or window in any building or structure so that the sound therefrom is projected outside of such outside wall or window between the hours of 11 P.M. and 9 A.M. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the operation of a radio apparatus or talking machine used in a reasonable manner by any person within any building or structure, provided that the said radio apparatus or talking machine or loud speaker is not so arranged so that such loud speaker shall project to the sound therefrom directly outside of any building or out of doors.

m. The operation of any machinery, equipment, pump, fan, exhaust fan, attic fan, air conditioning apparatus or similar mechanical device, in such a manner as to create any noise exceeding 35 decibels at the adjoining property line.

n. Use and operation of sound devices and apparatus for commercial or business advertising purposes prohibited. It shall be unlawful for any person to use or operate or cause to be used or operated any sound device or apparatus in, on, near or adjacent to any public street, park or place for commercial or business advertising purposes.

## ARTICLE II

Section 1. Legislative Declaration. It is hereby declared that the use or operation of any radio device or apparatus or any device or apparatus for the amplification of sounds from any radio, phonograph or other sound making or sound producing device by any device or apparatus for the reproduction or amplification of the human voice or other sounds in front of or outside of any building, place or premises or in or through any window, doorway or opening of such building, place or premises, abutting on or adjacent to any public street, park or place, or in or upon any vehicle operated, standing or being in, on, near or adjacent to any public street, park or place, where the sounds therefrom may be heard upon and about any public street, park or place or from any stand, platform or other structure, or from any airplane flying over the town, or in any boat or on the waters within the jurisdiction of the town, or anywhere on or in the public streets, parks or places.

It shall be unlawful for any person to use or operate or cause to be used or operated any sound device or apparatus in, on, near or adjacent to any public street, park or place for commercial or business advertising purposes.

b. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate, or drive or to employ, procure or induce another to operate, drive, lend, lease or donate any automobile, truck or other type of vehicle or to operate or operate or procure or induce another to operate, drive, lease or donate any airplane or other type of flying device, for commercial or business advertising purposes by means of any sound device or apparatus in violation of this ordinance.

c. The use of the name of any person or of any proprietor, vendor or exhibitor or the use of any trade business or corporate name in connection with such commercial or business advertising shall be presumptive evidence that such advertising was conducted by reason of employment, procurement or induction on the part of said person, proprietor, vendor or exhibitor or the person or persons represented by said trade, business or corporate name.

Section 4. Penalties. Any person or persons, association, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of the ordinance shall be guilty of an offense and shall be

punished by a fine of not more than five dollars (\$5.00) or imprisonment for not more than fifteen (15) days or both.

ARTICLE III  
Section 1. Prior Ordinance superseded.

This ordinance supersedes Town of Oyster Bay Anti-Noise Ordinance adopted November 12, 1957, which prior ordinance is hereby repealed.

## ARTICLE IV

Section 1. Saving Clause. Nothing contained in any provision of Article III applies to any offense committed or other acts done at any time before the day when such Article takes effect. Such an offense must be punished according to and such act must be governed by the provisions of law existing when it is done or committed in the same manner as if this ordinance had not been passed. An offense specified in such Article, committed after the beginning of the day when such Article takes effect, must be punished according to the provisions of such Article and not otherwise.

## ARTICLE V

Section 1. Separability Clause. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section or part of this article shall be adjudged by any Court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this article, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, section or part thereof directly involved in the litigation in which such judgment shall have been rendered.

## ARTICLE VI

### Section 1. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately.
