## Change All School Bd Officers; TEACH Launches Attack on Abt

All officers of the Hicksville Board of Education have been replaced and Thomas C. Nagle has taken his seat on the Board in the place of Caleb Hornbostel. Election of officers and swearing in of Board members took place last night at the reorganization meeting.

Marvin Goldberg of 8 Belmont Pl. is the new president, replacing George A. Jackson, Harold Sternberger was elected vice president, succeeding Cornelius McCormack and Harry Kershen was elected, in absentia, as secretary succeeding Goldberg. All elections were unanimous.

Fred J. Noth as district clerk called the meeting to order and presided until the election of Goldberg. It was announced that Kershen was absent on vacation travel.

The Board unanimously re-named Herbert Backman as district treasurer and Joseph Catalano as attorney. The Board tabled the appointments of a district clerk and auditor.

The opening blast of what

promises to be a year of controversy was fired in the June newsletter of TEACH with a withering blast at Donald F. Abt, superintendent of schools.

Promising to document a list of alleged "deficiencies" of Abt by publication starting in September, the newsletter charges "events at recent School Board meetings have illuminated the friction that has long existed between the Board of Education and the Superintendent of Schools."

"One is inevitably led to question the Board's wisdom in permitting Mr. Abt to continue in his present position as superintendent of Hicksville Schools."

TEACH is an organization known as the Taxpayers' Educational Assn. for the Children of Hicksville.

Four of the current Board members have either been sponsored or strongly endorsed by TEACH. Nagle in the May election defeated a TEACH candidate, Joan Martindale, now its president.

# 3rd Budget Vote In August Likely

Newly elected Hicksville School Board President Marvin Goldberg plans to solicit the opinions of "community groups" at its next regular meeting, Wednesday night, July 12, in the High School auditorium preparatory to submission -- for the third time -- of a more than austere budget to vote, possibly in August.

With the opening of the fall term of classes drawing near, the district is confronted with a cut back in student transportation, absence of adult education and recreation programs, lack of essential student supplies and all the other factors involved in an austerity program unless some budget is adopted.

After defeat of the budget on May 3, at the annual meeting, a second budget was submitted on June 21 and it also was rejected.

The proposal at the annual reorganization meeting of the school board last night (Wed) by Cornelius McCormack to re-submit a budget on Aug. 13 was applauded by the small audience at the session. The specific date was subsequently withdrawn pending the discussion scheduled for next Wednesday night.

At a special meeting of the Board held on short notice last Thursday night in the Board room packed to capacity with adults and students, a proposal to conduct a summer school program for elementary and secondary students, starting July 5, lost by a vote of 3 to 2. George A. Jackson and Evelyn Silver voted in favor while McCormack, Harold Sternberger and Harry Kershen voted negative. Caleb Hornbostel, whose term expired June 30, and Goldberg were not present.

A motion to amend and limit the summer school this year to secondary students who have failed subjects or need help to pass the Regents was also lost, 3 to 2. In favor were McCormack and Kershen. Opposed were Mrs. Silver, Sternberger and Jackson.

The special meeting had been called in response to a petition of 4500 signatures gathered in a few days by teenagers at the suggestion of now former President Jackson. A number of spokesmen for the teenagers were invited to address the Board. The elimination of summer school, including remedial reading courses, driver education, summer band as well as other subjects has had the community in a turmoil for the past two weeks since the Board decided to follow an austerity program. Hundreds of checks have been mailed back to parents who had paid advance registration fees. There was some disagreement between Board members and the audience as to what activities are legally permitted under an austerity program.

While neighboring districts, notably Plainview, have experienced rejected and austerity budgets in the past, the Hicksville budget had not previously been rejected in the 65 year history of the district.

There are currently over 8,000 persons now registered and eligible to vote if a third vote is held. An additional registration period will be provided, as required by law, before another balloting. The cost of conducting a referendum in the district has been estimated at approximately \$4000 each time.

Two "citizens' budget meetings were scheduled by individuals during the weekend prior to the July 12 decisions.

### Offers Critique

To The Editor:

A twice defeated budget, an "Austerity" budget, and it appears obvious that the Hicksville School Bd would be fully aware of its mistake and unrepresentative leadership. Yet, since May 3, 67 (1st overwhelmingly budget defeat), no voluntary and meaningful attempt has been made to substantially reduce the originally proposed 25% prohibitive school tax rate increase, in a district with a declining enrollment.

Could someone on this Bd please tell me of what use is a fashionable education for children whose parents would be taxing themselves out of the community? Human error, I can understand and forgive, however, what I can't understand, and find difficult to forgive is inhuman error.

This same School Bd, composed predominantly of members endorsed by an organization (TEACH) alleging its total dedication toward the SUPREME EDUCATION OF OUR CHILDREN, has now compounded its errors by now denying these same children the necessary and basic education during the summer period. Oh yes, the School Bd, Pres., Mr. Jackson, the man who was instrumental in convincing the many students in knocking themselves out to obtain 4500 signatures calling for a "Special meeting on 'Summer' school" - would you believe it, he actually voted against the basic summer classes at that very same "Special" meeting!

According to the State Education Law, under "Austerity", the School Bd IS NOT REQUIRED TO ELIMINATE SUMMER CLASSES. However, the question remains, why have they (Bd) selected this area of little dollar consequence, but of immeasurable educational and psychological importance to those students willing to repeat subjects to maintain their class standings? As reported by a local newspaper, 9 out of 10 school districts on L.I. now on austerity have adopted some form of summer program. The ONLY School Bd refusing to do so was our very own - HICKSVILLE!

What can we do to relieve those board members of the arbitrary use of this power? We can start with Mr. Goldberg and Mrs. Silver, two TEACH endorsed trustees, who come up for re-election May, 1968, and retire them gently, but firmly. In the meantime, it is hoped, finances allowing, that the following two petitions legally submitted by the undersigned and arbitrarily denied by this School Bd, will ultimately be placed before the courts for favorable action, and to allow the voters to decide at the polls whether:

(1) Transportation for ALL students shall be preserved during "Austerity".  
(2) The present 7 member board shall be expanded to 9 members? (This would allow for a "Special" election for two additional school bd trustees to partially remedy the present misrepresentation by this School Bd.)

I thank those people who assisted in defeating the budget, thereby insuring the continued residency and/or orderly process of family life of those financially limited neighbors.

Also, being a member of the PTA, I am very saddened by those misguided Hicksville PTA units who not only completely disregarded parents with limited incomes, but actually launched a campaign against them under the mistaken belief that money alone improves the quality of education in the schools.

### Issues Overlooked

In the spontaneous justifiable outpouring of concern (which I share) for the students who are affected by the cancellation of Hicksville's summer school pro-

gram, several relevant issues have unfortunately been overlooked.

The most important of these is the fact that a summer school program has not been positively established by judicial ruling to be an ordinary contingent expense permissible under austerity. If the expenditure should be challenged in court and ruled to be not an ordinary contingent expense, the individual school board trustees could each be held liable for their share of the amount approved.

While other districts under austerity budgets may indeed have agreed to retain similar programs, the fact remains that Hicksville is perhaps unique in having at least one person who would eagerly welcome the opportunity to challenge this (or any other) expenditure of public funds in court. This would by no means be a remote possibility nor without precedent in Hicksville, since at least one local school board trustee (who has since retired from the board) was hit with a court suit in the recent past by this same challenger.

In urging the school board

trustees to reconsider their votes on the summer school program, the students and the public are asking the trustees to jeopardize their entire future, while at the same time those voters who twice defeated the budget have refused to invest any of their tax dollars for the education of the children. To exhortate a truly education-oriented Board of Education and ignore the source of the trouble - an economy-minded voting bloc - seems a tragic misplacing of blame.

### Negative Decision

To the Editor:

Now, regarding the negative decision by the Board of Education to maintain Summer School for 1967 - at the meeting, which was held on Thursday evening, June 30, 1967, during the discussion which preceded the vote, Mr. McCormack made reference to an opinion of Dr. Brind, counsel of the State Education Dept., regarding the possibility of the individual board members being sued by taxpayers - If the Board of Education voted for summer school in view of the fact that the school budget had twice been voted down by taxpayers. His concern is naturally understandable. However, Mr. Catalano, who as you all know, is the lawyer for the School Board, advised Mr. McCormack that he (Mr. Catalano) had been in contact with Albany, on this particular matter on Thursday (the day of this meeting) at 3:30 P.M., and was advised of the fact that the opinion rendered by Dr. Brind had been recently amended so that the Board members could have voted for Summer School even under an austerity budget - and that they (the Board Members) would not have been liable for a suit which might have been instituted by a dissatisfied taxpayer. had this information in writing - obviously Mr. Catalano could not possibly have had this in writing since only approximately five hours had elapsed from the time Mr. Catalano had spoken with Albany and the meeting of the School Board. - BUT - I do have this information - in writing - and I have had it since July 1, following my conversation with Dr. John P. Jehu, Director of the Division of Law at the State Education Department in Albany, this conversation took place on Friday, June 30, 1967. A copy of this amendment has already been forwarded to Mr. Abt, by Mr. Jehu.

Of course, I realize that it is much too late at this time to rectify or make any adjustments in this situation for this year - I also realize that the members of the Board who reached their decision, did so with the best of good intentions and in good faith - they felt that they were doing their best for majority of citizens - but - it takes character to admit a mistake - an error in judgment - and reverse your thinking. The fact that the students had worked so hard for their cause - should have been sufficient evidence for the board to have reconsidered and rendered a decision which would have been favorable and educationally sound for the students.

I'm sure that the two negative decisions rendered by the Board were meant to be for the best interest of the majority; however, there are times and situations when the interests of minorities should also be considered.
