6-Acre Park Land To Cost \$330,000

The acquisition by Hicksville Park District of 6.015 acres between Plainview Rd. and Old Country Rd., east of New South Rd., at an estimated cost of \$330,000 will be the subject of a public hearing before Oyster Bay Town Board on Tuesday morning, July 25, at Town Hall.

The Town Board had been petitioned by residents of the area to make the former potato farm into a park after several applications for a change to business use had been rejected. The erection of private dwellings on the site, adjacent to a church and Temple, was also contemplated at one time.

Library Board to Remain With Last Year's Budget

The Hicksville Board of Library Trustees has decided not to go to the voters for a third time with their budget for 1967-68, instead of putting up the question

again with the reduced school budget at the special referendum on Aug. 23, the library board will operate in the next fiscal year under the amount allocated for

1966-67 which was about \$30,000 less than the budget rejected in May and again in June.

The school board will hold a public hearing on its revised budget on Aug. 9 at 8:30 PM in the high school. Another registration period for voters, not previously enrolled, will take place at the school district administration building on Division Ave. on Saturday, Aug. 12 from 10 AM to 10 PM. Voting at seven elementary schools takes place on Aug. 23 from 10 AM to 10 PM.

Major Bi-Partisan Accord On Basic Charter Revisions

Approximately 97 per-cent of the Nassau County Charter Revision Commission's recommended changes in the basic structure of the County's government will be submitted to public hearings and the electorate, it was made known in Mineola this week following a special meeting of the Board of Supervisors.

The first of a series of procedural resolutions was unanimously adopted calling for a public hearing on July 31st on the re-organization of the Board of Supervisors for which two plans have been submitted.

Also to be heard on July 31st will be two other proposed local laws aimed to give the public an opportunity to discuss approval or disapproval of the transfer of Town Receivers of Taxes to the County and the conferring on the County Executive of the unique powers of naming his own successor, in the event of a vacancy in that office, and his inclusion in the legislative deliberations of the Board of Supervisors with the right to introduce resolutions and ordinances.

Public hearings have been called for Mineola, Long Beach, Hempstead, North Hempstead, Oyster Bay and Glen Cove so that supervisors may get opinions from taxpayers in those communities.

Among the proposed changes in the final report of the Charter Revision Commission on which there is bi-partisan agreement, are the following:

"Creation of a Finance Department with pre-auditing powers and continuation of the

elected Comptroller's post-auditing powers.

"Replacement of the County Treasurer by a Commissioner of Finance.

"Provisions for a Capital Budget.

"Abolition of the Appointed Board of Assessors and the elected Chairman of the Board of Assessors and Substituting for them a paid professional Director of Assessment and a Board of Assessment Review.

Creation of a Nassau County Department of Recreation and Parks, Replacement of the Planning Commission by a Planning Board with powers to prepare a comprehensive plan and zoning advisory functions, Creation of a Nassau County Health District and the abolition of Registrars of Vital Statistics in the Towns, Changing the County's fiscal year from January - December to July - June.

An ever-stretching network of highways, increased travel, greater outdoor recreational facilities, and more leisure time all combine to provide even more opportunities for the litterbug.

Keep America Beautiful, Inc., the national public service organization for the prevention of litter, offers suggestions how everyone can help in the litter fight. They are:

- Keep your own home and property litter-free.
- Carry a litterbag in your car or boat. Always dispose of trash in a proper receptacle.
- Urge municipal officials to provide adequate collection and disposal facilities and a sufficient number of receptacles for street trash.
- Cooperate with others working to eliminate litter in your community. If there is no litter-prevention program in the area—start one.

Remember that litter is a costly eyesore that blights and corrodes, lowers property values, discourages tourists, and alienates potential new business and industry. Everyone should help eliminate litterbugging.

You can go and listen or ask questions. Between time, you can ask questions at the Town Hall comptroller's office or various departments. Unlike the school budgets which are subject to local hearing and vote, the town (and county) budgets are adopted by the respective boards after public hearing. School taxes represent roughly half of the property owners tax bill; the rest is for town, special district and county services.)

Be it enacted by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay as follows:

LOCAL LAW NO. 4-1967
A Bill for the Proposed Enactment of A Local Law Relating to Vehicle Speed Limits and for the Repeal of Town of Oyster Bay Local Law No. 1 of the Year 1965.
VEHICLE SPEED LIMITS IN THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY
ARTICLE ONE - GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 1.0 - Definitions:
The following words and phrases when used in this local law shall, for the purposes hereof, have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in this section:
Vehicle - Every device in, upon, or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a highway, except devices moved by human power or used exclusively upon stationary rails or tracks.
Motor Vehicle - Every vehicle, except electrically driven invalid chairs being operated or driven upon a public highway by any power other than muscular power which includes electric power obtained from overhead trolley wires, except vehicles which run only upon rails or tracks.
Highway - The entire width between the boundary lines of every way publicly maintained when any part thereof is open to the use of the public for purposes of vehicular travel.
Public Highway - Any highway, road, street, avenue, alley, public place, public driveway or any other public way in the Town of Oyster Bay, including private roads open to public motor vehicle traffic and highways maintained by Nassau County and including, subject to the provisions of section sixteen hundred eighty-four of the vehicle and traffic law, state highways maintained by the State of New York, but notwithstanding the generality of the foregoing, excluding:
(a) highways maintained by any city or incorporated village,
(b) access roads and parking fields on the grounds of any building or institution maintained by the United States, the State of New York or Nassau County or by any school

district or by any agency, authority, commission or institution under the jurisdiction of any of them.
(c) state highways maintained by the State of New York on which the state traffic commission shall have established higher or lower speed limits than the statutory fifty (50) miles per hour speed limit as provided in section sixteen hundred twenty of the vehicle and traffic law.
(d) state highways maintained by the State of New York on which the state traffic commission shall have designated that the Town of Oyster Bay shall not establish any maximum speed limit as provided in section sixteen hundred twenty-five of the vehicle and traffic law.

School Speed Zone - that portion of the highway which is sign posted to designate said zone as such, and/or that portion of the highway passing a school building and extending not more than three hundred feet along such highway in either direction from the building line of a school abutting on such highway.

Section 1.1 - General Limits:
(a) notwithstanding any specific maximum speed limit otherwise provided in this local law, no person shall drive a vehicle on a public highway at a speed greater than is reasonable and prudent under the conditions and having regard to the actual and potential hazards then existing.
(b) The driver of any vehicle shall, consistent with the requirements of subdivision (a) of this section, drive at an appropriate reduced speed when approaching and crossing an intersection or railway grade crossing, when approaching and going around a curve, when approaching a hill crest, when traveling upon any narrow or winding roadway, and when any special hazard exists with respect to pedestrians, or other traffic by reason of weather or highway conditions.
(c) Except as otherwise expressly provided in this local law, no person shall drive a vehicle on a public highway in excess of thirty (30) miles per hour.
(d) No person shall drive a motor vehicle at such a slow speed as to impede the normal and reasonable movement of traffic except when reduced speed is necessary for safe operation or in compliance with law.

Section 2.0 - Application of Article:
(a) The limitations provided by this article shall apply in the circumstances and at the places herein specified notwithstanding the provisions of subdivision (c) of Section 1.1 of Article One of this local law.
(b) Whenever, by this article, two or more specific maximum speed limits shall be applicable in any particular circumstance or place, the lowest of said limits shall apply.

Section 2.1 - School Buildings:
No person shall drive a motor vehicle within a school speed zone during the school noon hour, school recess, or while children are going to or leaving school during opening or closing hours, when such limit and zone are properly sign posted as directed by the Town Board, in excess of twenty-five (25) miles per hour. If, however, a school speed zone is posted so as to restrict the speed limit in said zone to a maximum of fifteen (15) miles per hour, then no person shall drive any motor vehicle within said school speed zone during the school noon hour, school recess, or while children are going to or leaving school during opening or closing hours, when such limit and zone are properly sign posted, as directed by the Town Board, in excess of fifteen (15) miles per hour.

Section 2.2 - Bridges and Elevated Structures:
The Town Board may determine the maximum speed which may be maintained without structural damage to bridges and elevated structures that are a part of any highway and, if such maximum speed is lower than the maximum speed limit otherwise applicable, may by order, rule or regulation establish such lower maximum speed limit at which vehicles may proceed on any such bridge or structure.
Section 2.3 - Fifty (50) miles per hour limit at specific locations:
No person shall drive any motor vehicle in excess of fifty (50) miles per hour on the following highways or parts of the said highways:
Section 2.4 - Forty-five (45) miles per hour limit at specific locations:
No person shall drive any motor vehicle in excess of forty-five (45) miles per hour on the following highways or parts of the said highways.
Section 2.5 - Forty (40) miles per hour limit at specific locations:
No person shall drive any motor vehicle in excess of forty (40) miles per hour on the following highways or parts of highways:
Stewart Avenue - between South Oyster Bay Road, Bethpage, Hicksville Road, Plainville, Old Country Road - between Town of Oyster Bay westerly boundary line and Suffolk County boundary line.
South Oyster Bay Road - between Hicksville Road, Bethpage, and Jericho Turnpike, Syosset.
Underhill Boulevard - between Jackson Avenue, Syosset, and Jericho Turnpike, Syosset.
Woodbury Road - between South Oyster Bay Road, Plainville, and Gloria Drive, Woodbury.
Boundary Avenue - between Hicksville Road, Plainville, and North Broadway, North Massapequa.
Broadway and North Broadway - between Boundary Avenue, North Massapequa, and Hicksville Road, Massapequa.
Carman's Road - between Sunrise Highway, Massapequa, and Main Street, South Farmingdale.
Woodbury Road - between Bay Avenue, Hicksville, and Jericho Turnpike, Woodbury.
Merritt Road - between the southerly boundary of the Incorporated Village of Farmingdale, and North Broadway, North Massapequa.
Jerusalem Avenue - between Broadway, Massapequa, and Hicksville Road, Massapequa.
West John Street - between Strong Street, Hicksville, and Town of Oyster Bay westerly boundary line.

Section 2.6 - Thirty-five (35) mile per hour limit at specific locations:
No person shall drive any motor vehicle in excess of thirty-five (35) miles per hour on the following highways or parts of highways:
Merrick Road - between the boundary lines of the Town of Hempstead/Town of Oyster Bay, easterly to the western boundary of the Incorporated Village of Massapequa Park and from the easterly boundary of the Incorporated Village of Massapequa Park easterly to the boundary line of Town of Oyster Bay/Suffolk County.
Jackson Avenue - between Walters Avenue, Syosset, and Jericho Turnpike, Syosset.
Round Swamp Road - between Old Country Road, Old Bethpage and the northerly boundary line of the Incorporated Village of Farmingdale.
Old Bethpage Road - between Round Swamp Road, Old Bethpage, and Plainview Road, Plainville.
Broadway/Plainview Road - between Haypath Road, Bethpage, and Barbara Street, Bethpage.

ARTICLE THREE - SIGNS
Section 3.0 - Signs:
No maximum speed limit specified by this local law, other than the general thirty (30) miles per hour limit specified in subdivision (c) of Section 1.1 of Article One hereof, shall be effective until signs or markings giving notice thereof are posted on the highways or parts thereof which are subject to such limit. One such sign or marking shall be posted at each end of the highway or part thereof subject to such limit, and, additional signs or markings shall be posted between those at each end if the town board shall, by resolution, find that such additional signs or markings are reasonably required to give adequate notice to the drivers of motor vehicles of such limit.

ARTICLE FOUR - PENALTIES
Section 4.0 - Penalties:
Every person convicted of a violation of any provision of this local law shall be guilty of a traffic infraction and (a) for a first conviction thereof be punished by a fine of not more than fifty (\$50.00) dollars or by imprisonment for not more than fifteen (15) days or by both such fine and imprisonment; (b) for a second such conviction within eighteen (18) months thereafter by a fine of not more than one

hundred (\$100.00) dollars or by imprisonment for not more than thirty (30) days or by both such fine and imprisonment; and (c) for a third or subsequent conviction within eighteen (18) months after the first conviction by a fine of not more than two hundred fifty (\$250.00) dollars or by imprisonment for not more than ninety (90) days or by both such fine and imprisonment.

ARTICLE FIVE - PRIOR LAW SUPERSEDED
Section 5.0 - Prior Local Law Superseded:
This local law supersedes Town of Oyster Bay Local Law No. 1 of the Year 1965, entitled "A Local Law Relating to Vehicle Speed Limits in the Town of Oyster Bay", adopted December 28, 1965, which prior local law is hereby repealed.

ARTICLE SIX - SAVING CLAUSE
Section 6.0 - Saving Clause:
Nothing contained in any provisions of Article Five applies to any offense committed or other acts done at any time before the day when such Article takes effect. Such an offense must be punished according to and such act must be governed by the provisions of law existing when it is done or committed in the same manner as if this local law had not been passed. An offense specified in such Article, committed on such Article takes effect, must be punished according to the provisions of such Article and not otherwise.

ARTICLE SEVEN - SEPARABILITY CLAUSE
Section 7.0 - Invalidity of any section or provision - separability:
It is the intention of the Town Board that this Local Law, and every provision thereof, shall be considered separable, and the invalidity of any section, clause, provision or part or portion of any section, clause or provision of this Local Law shall not affect the validity of any other portion of this Local Law.

ARTICLE EIGHT - EFFECTIVE DATE
Section 8.0 - Effective Date:
This Local Law shall take effect immediately.
