Voting against a federal rat extermination program might rank in the minds of some with a vote against motherhood and the American flag. This Congressman stuck his neck out last month and voted, with the majority of House members, against a \$40,000,000 rat extermination program which was backed by the administration. In doing so, he got an editorial rap across the knuckles.

A rat bite is a dreadful thing to contemplate. But ignored by those who parlayed the vote into a civil rights issue was the fact that our federal agencies already have anti-rat programs going. Characteristically, the President was seeking a new bureaucratic agency to handle already existing programs. While I can appreciate the emotional head of steam generated by those who favor the program, I am also concerned over the excessive cost of the proposal (\$20,000,000 per year).

As a Congressman representing Suffolk and Nassau Counties, I took a look at the statistics before voting on this bill. There were 1,000 rat bites reported last year in the entire country, none in Nassau and 14 in Suffolk. Note that there were 5,779 dog bites reported in Nassau during the same period and more than 1,000 in Suffolk. There were hundreds of bites by cats, squirrels and assorted varmints in both Nassau and Suffolk, with children the main victims.

For some time, federal programs aimed at wiping out rats have been conducted by the Department of Interior, Department of Education and Welfare, Department of Agriculture and

the Office of Economic Opportunity. A new, separate and expensive federal effort seemed to me unwarranted. The proper approach would be to beef up and consolidate these existing programs to encourage and, when necessary, assist local health authorities to enforce local ordinances.

If the administration would bring in such a bill for an admittedly desirable goal, of course I will support it.

Third Concert At Salisbury Park

The program will open with the "Academic Festival Overture" by Brahms, to be followed by Mendelssohn's "Violin Concerto in E-Minor" with Dorothy Kessler performing as violin soloist. After a brief intermission the second part of the program will offer devotees of classical music "Beethoven's Symphony No. 7 in A Major."

The Salisbury Symphony Series displays the great talent of the Long Island Philharmonic Orchestra under the baton of Paul Elshish. As Nickerson notes, "Nassau residents have been enjoying these fine concerts since their inception in the summer of 1962. We are indebted to the Long Island Lighting Company and to the Music Recording Industry Trust Fund which have made possible this year's performances."

The concert will take place at the Salisbury Park Lakeside Theatre.

Rubin Mitchell, one of the most electrifying pianists on the American jazz scene today, will be the featured entertainer at the Third Annual Waldemar Coney Island Bar-B-Q, to be held on Sunday, Aug. 6, at Woodbury, for the benefit of the Institute's programs in cancer research, cancer detection and science education. Charter Revision As Bi-Partisan Agreement

Charter Revision for Nassau County will go on the November ballot with Bi-Partisan backing. It was revealed at a joint press conference in Mineola, on July 25th called by County Executive Eugene H. Nickerson and Hempstead Presiding Supervisor Ralph G. Caso.

The agreement worked out to make the county's new basic law "non political" has caused the cancellation of Town and City public hearings scheduled for Nassau County from July 31st to Aug. 4th. A public hearing on the compromise solution has been scheduled for Aug. 14th at 11:00 a.m.

Paced with Constitutional Convention amendments on the ballot this November, as well as other state and local propositions, there was unanimity in keeping changes in the Nassau County Charter down to an omnibus proposition for all charter changes proposed by the Charter Revision Commission.

The "concordat", provides as follows:

1. A Board of Supervisors composed of the present six supervisors from the three towns and two cities and 12 County

supervisors from the three towns and two cities and 12 County supervisors elected from Assembly Districts, all casting one vote each.

2. Receivers of Taxes in the three towns who are running for four year terms this Fall, will serve out their terms, their offices then being absorbed by the County Finance Department.

3. The County Executive will retain present status as Presiding Officer of the Board without power to introduce legislative matters. In the event of a vacancy in that office, it is proposed that a special election be held within 60 days, the Vice-Chairman discharging the duties of the County Executive in the meantime with the same department heads and the heads of County offices, who will remain until a newly elected County Executive takes office.

"Attempts to revise Nassau's originally Bi-Partisan Charter by Bi-Partisan agreement have succeeded", declared Supervisor Caso.

"We have proceeded to up-date our County Government unpolitically and intelligently, and can present to the voting public charter revisions

clearly, comprehensively and devoid of controversy and confusion".

A special proposition on the creation of a "Public Protector" for Nassau County will be submitted to the electorate. He will be appointed by the County Executive with confirmation by the Board of Supervisors and with jurisdiction extending to the County Government, the Towns and Special Districts, but not including offices exempted by Constitutional and State limitations on Cities and Villages. The Police Dept., will not be immune from the jurisdiction of the Public Protector.

Charter revisions, after they go into effect, will provide four year terms for the 12 "County Supervisors" starting in 1970. The present two year terms for Town and City Supervisors (with the exception of Long Beach which has a four year term) will continue until changed by the legislature.

The County Executive's first four year term would commence in 1973 by which time all members of the Board of Supervisors would be contemporaries with that of the County Executive.

Town Adds New Fishing Area

The Town of Oyster Bay will open another area exclusively for fishing at Stahl Beach, Councilman Edmund A. Ocker, Chairman of the Town's Standing Committee on Recreation, Beaches and Parks, announced. Ocker added that 150 feet at the west end of Stahl Beach in Bayville was set aside as of July 26 for fishing for Town residents only. Ocker said the move developed after a discussion with Edward P. Brickell, Superintendent of Beaches, revealed that there has been an overwhelming demand for additional fishing from the surf facing Long Island Sound.

In May, Ocker recommended and the Town set aside some 500 feet of the easterly part of Center Island Beach for fishermen and the anglers have flocked to that area. That area was set aside in response to many north shore residents' requests.

Main Street Is Changing SAND BY

Hicksville's Way of Life Is Altered as Road Is Widened

HICKSVILLE, L. I. — "You used to get one of the best cups of coffee there," Fred Noeth said as he slowly drove down Broadway, the main street of Hicksville. He was referring to a luncheonette that now exists only in his memory. It was bulldozed away a month ago because of a highway expansion program which will race a mile and a half of one side of Hicksville's main street to enable the community's growing commuter and suburban population to drive through town faster.

Mr. Noeth, who moved to Hicksville in 1922 and established the town's main newspaper, The Herald, the highway expansion means the end of Hicksville as a major center of thriving independent stores and businesses. "Instead it is being systematically converted into a formless glob of many residences with no core, future or ambitions," Mr. Noeth wrote in an editorial in June at the end of his 10-year fight to have the highway stopped.

About 40 merchants, many of whom have been in business for more than 50 years on the same spot, have already been evicted, their shops boarded up and in some cases bulldozed down.

Mr. Noeth estimated that about two-thirds of the merchants would not relocate and would close down permanently.

Most of the merchants have rented their property and received no compensation from the State Department of Public Works, which is carrying out the \$15-million project.

What disturbs the old-time residents and some of the suburban newcomers is that the last landmark that "tells a visitor that he is in Hicksville"—the main street—is in danger of being destroyed.

"Where is the center?" many of the residents ask.

Mr. Noeth recalled that 20 years ago, when Hicksville served as a shopping area for its surrounding farmers, "on Saturday night you could not walk down Main Street because of the activity."

In less than 15 years, however, Hicksville changed from a farming region's shopping center and small residential community to a densely populated area made up of suburban homes, shopping centers and industrial parks.

Between 1950 to 1960, the biggest building boom on Long Island, about 10,000 homes were put up in the surrounding potato fields. Eighty-five per cent of these were from garden, Mr. Engert recalled.

The \$10,000 to \$20,000 range, that Christmas was "a very attractive, uniformly pleasing to some eyes but disturbing to any visitor who tries to find a house he has been invited to."

During the decade the population rose from 20,000 to 50,000. But new shopping centers sprang up. The biggest, the 200-acre market near Old 104-million, Midland Plaza, is parking space for 8,000 cars.

town. The state Public Works Department decided in 1960 that the street must be expanded from two lanes to four to ease the congestion.

Charles Del Signore, an assistant district engineer for the state Public Works Department, admits that "we never build a road without hurting somebody" and in the case of Hicksville there was no other way to improve the traffic flow.

"This is not the last time that we will have to go through this," Mr. Del Signore warned. He explained that most towns cluster in two ribbons along the main highway and, when it is expanded, there is no choice but to go through the center of the town.

In the case of Hicksville, a 60-foot-deep section of one side of Broadway will be razed, leaving a small section of property between the highway and the next street, which is not wide enough to rebuild on.

ONLY a few of the merchants were able to find space on the other side of the street.

"This hurt," said John Economou, manager of the Sweet Shop and one of the merchants who was able to find space to relocate on the other side.

He estimated that it cost him \$37,000 to set up his new store.

Mr. Economou, who greets most of his customers by their first names and serves fresh whipped cream on his sundaes, said that he was concerned more about the loss of community feeling than his economic loss that the highway program will cause.

"I have tried to maintain a friendly atmosphere here," Mr. Economou said looking at his new counter. But he said he thought the new highway would eliminate the remaining residents who still stroll down main street and stop in a store not only to buy but to con-

I recently submitted the attached letter to the Hicksville Board of Education. At its July 26th meeting, the Board invited me, Mrs. Janca, and Mrs. Kushner to further explain the recommendations contained therein at a Policy Committee meeting of the Board at some future time.

Without having any knowledge of the suggestions made in this letter, Mr. W. Bruno arose to accuse the School Board of "fervorism" in so doing. In order to illustrate the absurdity of this charge, unfortunately typical of many such irresponsible and factless accusations, I am asking you to print my letter in your paper if space permits.

To the Trustees:

Having just completed three years on the Public Relations Advisory Committee, I would like to share with you my ideas for improving it. Although this committee has had several of its recommendations accepted and put into practice, it seems obvious that it has had little effect on the overall relationship between the schools and the people, as evidenced by the fact that large numbers of residents are now complaining about the lack of useful information given them on budgets and other school affairs. My suggestions are:

1. First and foremost, the Board of Education and school administration must begin to take seriously the task of communicating with all the people living in or employed by this district. Only through sincere, frequent, and tangible efforts will the people and staff be persuaded to accept the programs set forth by the Board and administration. It is an effort worth making.

2. If budgetary difficulties preclude the hiring of a Public Information Coordinator, then this task should be assigned to someone presently employed in the district hopefully and individually capable of translating educationese and tax information into clear, readable English. In the past months, I have often cringed at the tone and language of the material sent to residents regarding the budgets. It seems unlikely that this material was evaluated from the point-of-view of the public which was being asked to read and understand it. It seems incredible that this should have been overlooked or ignored.

3. Change the name of the committee to Community Relations Committee for obvious reasons.

4. Enlarge the scope of the committee by adding to its present goal of exploring and

recommending to the Board ways of improving communication between district and residents) the following:

the relaying of information between school district and community by way of the committee members.

5. Reorganize the committee in the following manner: In addition to having each trustee appoint one member, ask each community organization to appoint an official representative to this committee, especially those groups which normally have little direct contact with the schools, such as Senior Citizens, Chamber of Commerce, churches, synagogues, service groups, alumni clubs, etc. If the size of this committee becomes a problem, it could be broken down into sub-committees which could study and report on ways of disseminating information in areas such as the budget, staff communication, School Board actions, educational programs and departments, and publicly about school-related cultural events. This could achieve the following results:

a. Bring citizens who are remote from the schools into the circle of mutual concern for education.

b. By having the group representatives present not their own ideas, but those of their organizations, these groups will be asked to think about and discuss education, the schools, and how these relate to the community at large—a healthy thing.

c. By having a larger, more diverse committee, more ideas would be generated, especially from people in a position to know how little information they and their fellow group members personally receive.

d. Those committee members appointed as individuals by the Trustees would maintain contact with their appointing Trustees on a continuing basis, thereby affording each School Board member insight into the thinking of a representative body of residents.

6. Establish a permanent place on the School Board agenda once each month, so the Committee's ideas can be expressed without undue delay. The Board and administration should regard this committee as a working partner in the task of creating a healthy flow of understanding between Hicksville's schools and its people.

Public Relations Committee Chairman Mrs. Kathleen Janca and Committee member Mrs. Arlene Kushner, who have also served for the past three years, have heard this letter and join me in urging you to consider these suggestions.

ORDINANCE

TOWN OF OYSTER BAY
TAKE NOTICE that by resolution of the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, duly adopted by said Board and entered in full upon its minutes on the 25th day of July 1967, following a public hearing thereon after advertisement according to law, the following Ordinance was duly enacted:

UNNECESSARY NOISE
ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN
OF OYSTER BAY

ARTICLE I

Section 1. Declaration of Policy. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the Town Board to prevent any unreasonable loud disturbing and unnecessary noise. Noise of such character, intensity and duration as to be detrimental to the life or health of any individual, or contrary to the public welfare, is prohibited.

Section 2. Prohibited Noises. The following acts, among others, are declared to be loud, disturbing and unnecessary noises in violation of this ordinance, but any enumeration herein shall not be deemed to be exclusive:

a. The operation of any radio, phonograph or use of any musical instrument in such a manner or with such volume, particularly between eleven o'clock P.M. and seven o'clock A.M., as to annoy or disturb the quiet, comfort or repose of persons in any dwelling, hotel or other type of residence.

b. The keeping of any animal or bird which by causing frequent or long continued noise shall disturb the comfort and repose of any person in the vicinity.

c. The use of any automobile, motorcycle, street car or vehicle so out of repair, so loaded or in such manner as to create loud and unnecessary grating, grinding, rattling or other noise.

d. The blowing of any steam whistle attached to any stationary boiler except to give notice of the time to begin or stop work or as a warning of danger.

e. The discharge into the open air of the exhaust of any steam engine, stationary internal combustion engine or motor vehicle engine except through a muffler or other device which will effectively prevent loud or explosive noises therefrom.

f. The erection, including excavating, demolition, alteration or repair of any building or other than between seven o'clock A.M. and six o'clock P.M., on weekdays; except in case of urgent necessity in the interest of public safety and then only with a permit from the Building Department, which permit may be renewed for a period of three days or less while the emergency continues.

g. The creation of any excessive noise on any street adjacent to any school, institution of learning or court

while the same is in session, or adjacent to any hospital, which unreasonably interferes with the workings of such institution, provided conspicuous signs are displayed in such streets indicating that the same is a school, hospital or court street.

h. The creation of a loud and excessive noise in connection with loading or unloading any vehicle or the opening and destruction of bales, boxes, crates and containers.

i. The shouting and crying of peddlers, hawkers and vendors which disturbs the peace and quiet of the neighborhood.

j. The use of any drum, loud speakers or other instrument or device for the purpose of attracting attention to any sale or display of merchandise by the creation of noise.

k. The sounding of any horn or signal device on any automobile, motorcycle, bus, street car or other vehicle except as a warning signal pursuant to the provisions of Section 15 of the Vehicle and Traffic Law of the State of New York.

l. The use of any radio apparatus, talking machine, loud speaker, or amplifier attached thereto in such a manner that the loud speaker shall cause the sound from such radio apparatus or talking machine to be projected directly therefrom outside of any building or out of doors; or the use of any radio apparatus, talking machine, loud speaker, or amplifier which is in any way fastened to or connected with any outside wall or window in any building or structure so that the sound therefrom is projected outside of such outside wall or window between the hours of 11 P.M. and 9 A.M. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the operation of a radio apparatus or talking machine used in a reasonable manner by any person within any building or structure, provided that the said radio apparatus or talking machine or loud speaker is not so arranged so that such loud speaker shall project to the sound therefrom directly outside of any building or out of doors.

m. The operation of any machinery, equipment, pump, fan, exhaust fan, attic fan, air conditioning apparatus or similar mechanical device, in such a manner as to create any noise exceeding 35 decibels at the adjoining property line.

n. Use and operation of sound devices and apparatus for commercial or business advertising purposes prohibited. It shall be unlawful for any person to use or operate or cause to be used or operated any sound device or apparatus in, on, near or adjacent to any public street, park or place for commercial or business advertising purposes.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. Legislative Declaration. It is hereby declared that the use or operation of any radio device or apparatus or any device or apparatus for the amplification of sounds from any radio, phonograph or other sound making or sound producing device or any device or apparatus for the reproduction or amplification of the human voice or other sounds in front of or outside of any building, place or premises or in or through any window, doorway or opening of such building, place or premises, abutting on or adjacent to any public street, park or place, or in or upon any public street, park or place, where the sounds therefrom may be heard upon any public street, park or place or from any stand, platform or other structure, or from any airplane or other device used for flying, flying over the town or in any boat or on the waters within the jurisdiction of the Town, or anywhere on or in the public streets, parks or places for commercial

or business advertising purposes, is detrimental to the health, welfare and safety of the inhabitants of the Town, in that such use or operation diverts the attention of pedestrians and vehicle operators in the public streets, parks and places, thus increasing traffic hazards and causing injury to life and limb. It is hereby further declared that such use or operation disturbs the public peace and comfort and the peaceful enjoyment by the people of their right to use the public streets, parks and places for street, park and other public purposes and disturbs the peace, quiet and comfort of the neighboring inhabitants. Therefore, it is hereby declared that the prohibition of such use or operation for commercial or business advertising purposes is essential to protect and to secure the health, welfare, safety, comfort, convenience and peaceful enjoyment by the inhabitants of this Town of their right to use the public streets, parks and places for street, park and other public purposes and to secure the peace, quiet enjoyment and comfort of the Town inhabitants.

Section 2. Definitions. As used in this Ordinance:

a. The term "sound device or apparatus" shall mean any radio device or apparatus or any device or apparatus for the amplification of sounds from any radio, phonograph or other sound making or sound producing device or any device or apparatus for the reproduction or amplification of the human voice or other sounds.

b. The phrase "to use or operate any sound device or apparatus in, on, near or adjacent to any public street, park or place" shall mean to use or operate or cause to be used, or operated any sound device or apparatus in front of or outside of any building, place or premises or in or through any window, doorway or opening of such building, place or premises, abutting on or adjacent to any public street, park or place, or in or upon any vehicle operated, standing or being in or upon any public street, park or place, where the sounds therefrom may be heard upon any public street, park or place or from any stand, platform or other structure, or from any airplane or other device used for flying, flying over the town, or in any boat or on the waters within the jurisdiction of the Town or anywhere on or in the public streets, parks or places.

c. "Unnecessary" - that which is not required by the usual circumstances.

d. "Usual" - the normal noise range for a particular type of vehicle or mechanism.

e. "Decibel" - the decibel is 1/10 of a bel and is a unit of a level when the base of a logarithm is the tenth root of ten (10), and the quantities concerned are proportional to power.

f. "Person" - includes any individual, firm, association or corporation, whether such person be the owner, lessee or charterer, its servants, agents or employees.

Section 3. Violations as to Use and Operation of Sound Devices and Apparatus for Commercial or Business Advertising Purposes.

a. It shall be unlawful for any person to use or operate or cause to be used or operated any sound device or apparatus in, on, near or adjacent to any public street, park or place for commercial or business advertising purposes.

b. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate, or drive or to employ, procure or induce another to operate, drive, lend, lease or donate any automobile, truck or other type of vehicle or to operate or aviate or procure or induce another to operate, aviate, lend, lease or donate any airplane or other type of flying device, for commercial or business advertising by means of any sound

device or apparatus in violation of this ordinance.

c. The use of the name of any person or of any proprietor, vendor or exhibitor or the use of any trade business or corporate name in connection with such commercial or business advertising shall be presumptive evidence that such advertising was conducted by reason of employment, procurement or induction on the part of said person, proprietor, vendor or exhibitor or the person or persons represented by said trade, business or corporate name.

Section 4. Penalties. Any person or persons, association, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of the ordinance shall be guilty of an offense and shall be punished by a fine of not more than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) or imprisonment for not more than fifteen (15) days or both.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. Prior Ordinance superseded.
This ordinance supersedes Town of Oyster Bay Anti-Noise Ordinance adopted November 12, 1957, which prior ordinance is hereby repealed.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. Saving Clause.

Nothing contained in any provision of Article III applies to any offense committed or other acts done at any time before the day when such Article takes effect. Such an offense must be punished according to and such act must be governed by the provisions of law existing when it is done or committed in the same manner as if this ordinance had not been passed. An offense specified in such Article, committed after the beginning of the day when such Article takes effect, must be punished according to the provisions of such Article and not otherwise.

ARTICLE V

Section 1. Separability Clause.

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section or part of this article shall be adjudged by any Court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this article, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, section or part thereof directly involved in the litigation in which such judgment shall have been rendered.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ACQUISITION OF CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY FOR AND ON BEHALF OF THE HICKSVILLE PARK DISTRICT IN THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, NASSAU COUNTY, NEW YORK, AT A MAXIMUM ESTIMATED COST OF \$330,000, AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$330,000 SERIAL BONDS OF SAID TOWN TO PAY THE COST THEREOF.

WHEREAS, by proceedings heretofore duly had and taken pursuant to Section 222.5 of the Nassau County Civil Division Act, the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, has determined it to be necessary and in the public interest to acquire the real property hereinafter described; and

WHEREAS, it is now desired to authorize the acquisition of said property and to provide for the financing thereof; NOW

THEREFORE, IT IS

RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The acquisition of the real property hereinafter described for and on behalf of the Hicksville Park District in the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, is hereby authorized at a maximum estimated cost of \$330,000. Said real property is located between Plainview Road and Old Country Road, east of New South Road, Hicksville, Town of Oyster Bay, New York, said premises being known as Section 12, Block 275, Lots 39 to 46 inclusive, as shown on the Land and Tax Map as and for the County of Nassau.

Section 2. The plan for the financing of the aforesaid specific object or purpose consists of the issuance of \$330,000 serial bonds of said Town hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is thirty years, pursuant to subdivision 21 (a) of paragraph 11.0 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same become due and payable. There shall annually be assessed upon all the taxable real property in said Hicksville Park District at the same time and in the same manner as other Town Charges an amount sufficient to pay said principal and interest as the same become due and payable, but if not paid from such source, all the taxable real property within said Town shall be subject to the levy of all valorem taxes without limitation as to rate, sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. I have Social Security medical insurance. I go to my doctor once a year for a general physical checkup. The examination and various tests he gives me cost \$50. How do I claim reimbursement under medical insurance for the costs of this physical?

A. Routine physicals, dental care, and prescription drugs are among the items that are excluded from coverage under medical insurance. Therefore, there would be no reimbursement from medical insurance for this type of medical treatment.

Q. My father, a social security beneficiary, has a part-time job. To keep the job, he must work a minimum number of hours which causes him to earn slightly over \$1,500 a year. Will he lose all his social security benefits?

A. No, he will only lose part of his benefits. His benefits will be reduced by only \$1 for each \$2 he earns between \$1,500 and \$2,700. If he earns over \$2,700 he will lose \$1 in benefits for each \$1 earned over \$2,700. If your father earned \$2,500 a year, for example, his social security benefits would be reduced by only \$500.

Everything Card Makes Its Debut

The new charge service has also attracted a wide variety of independent retail stores, primarily in the apparel, general

merchandise and home furnishing fields, and many service firms, including several hundred independent auto repair shops, which are now able for the first time to offer customers credit privileges.

The bank's new "The Everything Card" costs nothing and no service charge is made to those who pay for goods and services within 25 days of their billing date.

Users of the charge service will be able to extend their payments over any period up to 24 months, consistent with payment requirements of at least 1/24 of the total balance. The minimum repayment will be \$10 a

month unless a smaller amount is required to pay up an account.

To cardholders who wish to take advantage of the extended payment feature of the plan, a service charge of 1-1/2 per cent per month will be made on the first \$500 worth of goods and services, and a charge of 1 per cent per month on balances in excess of \$500.

On cash advances, a service charge of 1 per cent will be made each month on the balance. A 25-cent charge will be made for each cash advance and cardholders will be required to pay at least 1/24 of the original balance monthly.
