### No Beach Water **Pollution Here**

There is no danger of polluted ater to bathers at any of Nassau-ounty's 82 beaches, Executive ugene Nickerson announces.

"Baches in Nassau County are in magnificent shape," he said, 'and we are very fortunate to be spared the difficulties be-setting New York City.".

The county executive made his announcement following the disclosure that four New York City beaches have been found "less desirable for bathing" this week than they were June 1.

Nickerson said he has received this information from Dr. Joseph H. Kimaman, Nassau County commissioner of health, whose office regularly inspects all county beaches and grants per-mits.

"All the 82 Nassau beaches involved," Nickerson said, 'not only meet high water quality standards but our county stand-ards are 10 times as strict as those employed by New York City."

The perennial summer problem of midge swarms from the

midge larvae in the sump whereupon on June 12th the sump was
treated with tarvacide to kill this
breeding. Periodic inspection
every week or ten days thus far
has shown that this type of treatment – begun on an experiment
sais at the committee urging –
has been successful.

However the same can not be said of the New York State Discharge basin #68 (Between the Jericho Country Club and Hazelwood Drive) which is still breeding swarms of midges and now, with the recent heavy rains and high humidity, sends forth swarms of mosquitos. The Department of Public Works (New York State) is attempting to do away with this situation and has determined to eliminate the water from the basin.

A few weeks ago a test operation was run at the site, Heavy equipment to bore a hole to get a leeching action was brought in Leeching action is necessary in order to be able to install dif-

fusion wells. Offination wells are cesspool sections large concrets pipes with slots.) The hole was dug and the water level dropped nice inchès. Therefore the Department of Public Works was impressed favorably. The next step is to obtain a contractor to get rid of the water and place the diffusion wells.

Dear Mr. Noeth: The other day I read a state-ment regarding the "death of a town," which disturbed me con-siderably when I applied it to Hicksville. There were two in-proclients.

Hickstelle. There were two marredients.

The first was the death of the business district. If the "business district" means Broadway, we are well on the way to ful-filling the first condition. I, for one, however, am not yet willing to throw in the towel.

For the 30-oddyears that I have ired here, the shops on Broadway have been ugly and also firetraps. Now, perforce, many are gone, and more will be gone in the near future. If there is not adequate land to rebuild along Broadway, perhaps Broadway is no tonger the best location for the "business district." For situs it should be relocated an oast west arrer; such as Old

sites it should be relocated at an east-west arrer, such as Old Country Road.

The important thing, however, is adequate and intelligent planning that will not allow a series of perry-built shops to spring up hapharardly and again scar the face of the town. Instead of wringing our hands about losting the past, we should start looking the the future and planning for it. Sometimes the past is well lost. Tossibly we now have an op-

Sometimes the past is well lost. Fossibly we now have an op-portunity to make Broadway really attractive and to establish a business area such that people will want to stop in Hicksville and not just pass through on the way to greener pastures. Such

a project would require united action from the business community and support from the people of the town. It seems to me that the alternative is stag-

The other ingredient in the death of a town was decay of the educational system, and it seems to me we are in danger of qualifying for that, too. We must constantly remind ourselves that taxes are not evil in themselves. They are the cost of services which we need. Of all of these services, education must come near the top. We want it, we need it, and must be prepared to pay for it—at the expense of something else, if necessary. Inflation has increased salaries (including our be prepared to pay for it — at the expense of something else, if necessary. Inflation has increased salaries (including our own) as well as all other school costs. There is no such thing as cheap education. The words "cheap" and "education" just do not go together. Without well educated young people to make its future, the town will stagnate and the as surely as from a loss of its business district.

If we allow both things to happen, we have surely signed our death warrant. We must not let this happen. Not only for the sake of our children, but for our own sakes and the future of Hicksville, even if it burss.
