## No Beach Water Pollution Here

There is no danger of polluted water to bathers at any of Nassau County's 82 beaches, Executive Eugene Nickerson announces.

"Beaches in Nassau County are in magnificent shape," he said, "and we are very fortunate to be spared the difficulties besetting New York City."

The county executive made his announcement following the disclosure that four New York City beaches have been found "less desirable for bathing" this week than they were June 1.

Nickerson said he has received this information from Dr. Joseph H. Kinnaman, Nassau County commissioner of health, whose office regularly inspects all county beaches and grants permits.

"All the 82 Nassau beaches involved," Nickerson said, "not only meet high water quality standards but our county standards are 10 times as strict as those employed by New York City."

## Insects To Be Controlled

The perennial summer problem of midge swarms from the State and County Sumps behind the homes on Hazelwood Drive and Holly Lane have had the attention of our health and sanitation committee since early May of this year. Success has been brought about at the Storm Water Basin #434 (Nassau County Sump) mainly through the efforts of the Mosquito Control Division. On June 9th an inspection revealed midge larvae in the sump whereupon on June 12th the sump was treated with larvicide to kill this breeding. Periodic inspection every week or ten days thus far has shown that this type of treatment - begun on an experiment basis at the committee urging - has been successful.

However the same can not be said of the New York State Discharge basin #68 (Between the Jericho Country Club and Hazelwood Drive) which is still breeding swarms of midges and now, with the recent heavy rains and high humidity, sends forth swarms of mosquitoes. The Department of Public Works (New York State) is attempting to do away with this situation and has determined to eliminate the water from the basin.

A few weeks ago a test operation was run at the site. Heavy equipment to bore a hole to get a leaching action was brought in. Leaching action is necessary in order to be able to install dif-

fusion wells. (Diffusion wells are cesspool sections large concrete pipes with slots.) The hole was dug and the water level dropped nine inches. Therefore the Department of Public Works was impressed favorably. The next step is to obtain a contractor to get rid of the water and place the diffusion wells.

In the meantime, while the state can not spray or put down larvicide because of the fish stocked in the basin, The Mosquito Control Division has agreed to send in a team to spray the bushes and weeds, but only when man power is available. At the present time the Division's men are out fighting the heavy concentration of mosquitoes.

Kudos are in order for Art Rosenthal and his committee for having worked these many weeks so that all of us can do less scratching.

## Reader Opinion Decries 'Death of Town'

Dear Mr. Noeth:

The other day I read a statement regarding the "death of a town," which disturbed me considerably when I applied it to Hicksville. There were two ingredients.

The first was the death of the business district. If the "business district" means Broadway, we are well on the way to fulfilling the first condition. I, for one, however, am not yet willing to throw in the towel.

For the 30-odd years that I have lived here, the shops on Broadway have been ugly and also fire-traps. Now, perforce, many are gone, and more will be gone in the near future. If there is not adequate land to rebuild along Broadway, perhaps Broadway is no longer the best location for the "business district." Possibly it should be relocated at an east-west artery, such as Old Country Road.

The important thing, however, is adequate and intelligent planning that will not allow a series of jerry-built shops to spring up haphazardly and again scar the face of the town. Instead of wringing our hands about losing the past, we should start looking to the future and planning for it. Sometimes the past is well lost. Possibly we now have an opportunity to make Broadway really attractive and to establish a business area such that people will want to stop in Hicksville and not just pass through on the way to greener pastures. Such

a project would require united action from the business community and support from the people of the town. It seems to me that the alternative is stagnation.

The other ingredient in the death of a town was decay of the educational system, and it seems to me we are in danger of qualifying for that, too. We must constantly remind ourselves that taxes are not evil in themselves. They are the cost of services which we need. Of all of these services, education must come near the top. We want it, we need it, and must be prepared to pay for it -- at the expense of something else, if necessary. Inflation has increased salaries (including our own) as well as all other school costs. There is no such thing as cheap education. The words "cheap" and "education" just do not go together. Without well educated young people to make its future, the town will stagnate and die as surely as from a loss of its business district.

If we allow both things to happen, we have surely signed our death warrant. We must not let this happen. Not only for the sake of our children, but for our own sakes and the future of Hicksville, even if it hurts.

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# WHAT'S A FISHING MOTOR

One popular misconception about outboard motors used for fishing is that they are a small, temporary and coated with fish scales.

Once, this might have been a valid observation. Today, however, the outboard is found in such a wide number of fishing situations that size is no criterion, and neither is the tendency to be temperamental.

So, what is a fishing motor? According to the fishing folks at Mercury outboards, this label can be hung on any powerplant showing a rig through any waters for fishing — from placid ponds to the briny deep.

Horsepower requirements are determined by the type of fishing in which an angler engages most often and the style craft used.

On small lakes or streams where johnboats, canoes and 12-foot skiffs are adequate, the 3-hp engine is seen most frequently.

The 6- and 8.5-hp motors outnumber other power classes. They fit the country-wide average of fishing situations where power needs are matched to lightweight craft and reasonably protected waters.
