School Tax Rate Increase 76 Cents

The combined Hicksville School and Library Tax Rate for 1967-68 has been officially set at \$7.518 per \$100, and increase of 75.6 cents over 1966-67, based on the third budget submitted and approved by the voters on Aug. 23. Action was taken on the rate at the Board of Education meeting last night (Wed).

In view of the poor state-wide response to the State Lottery planned for the benefit of educational state aid, no allowance was made for substantial local aid from this source in the coming year.

The rate for school purposes will be \$7.254 and for library purposes 26.4 cents, the latter a decline of one tenth of a cent.

Vice President Harold Sternberger presided during the meeting last night, in the delayed arrival of President Marvin Goldberg. The president, when he arrived, outlined his plans for the involvement of many community organization representatives in a group tentatively named the "Citizens Information Committee for the Budget" and asked Board Secretary Harry Keraban to direct a letter to all organizations asking them to respond by Sept. 15.

Goldberg said he hoped to call together all diverse views in the community to work with the Board in the formation of the 1968-69 budget. He made particular reference to the twin defeats of the school budget by the voters this year for the first time in history and said the action represented more than a taxpayers' revolt. He felt there was a great need for more effective communication between the school administration and board and the residents.

Earlier in the meeting the Board, acting on the recommendation of Donald F. Abt, superintendent of schools, made the following appointments effective Sept. 1. Dr. Rozanne R. Knudson, language arts supervisor at \$13,957 succeeding Dr. John Frouse who resigned; Dr. Leo Flester, elementary assistant principal at \$15,119, replacing John Sanborn; Dr. Gerald Murphy, assistant superintendent at \$21,000 filling the position formerly held by William McCarthy on the staff; Dr. Manus J. Clancy, social studies supervisor at \$15,221,

replacing James Curran; and Jack Meller, elementary assistant principal at \$13,610, replacing Fred Bergmann. No action was taken in appointment of an assistant junior high school principal to replace Patrick Naso who has become principal in another district.

It was reported that fees charged for many adult education courses in the fall will be advanced in an effort to make the program self-sustaining. An exception was made in the case of American History, 4th year English, 10th year Math, Biology and Elementary Algebra which are all high school equivalency diploma subjects where the fee will be just for registration.

District Treasurer Herbert Backman reported he will be out of the district on vacation from Sept. 22 to Oct. 5. Evelyn Silver volunteered to serve as treasurer during this period and was named to act.

Abt announced an orientation meeting of the entire faculty will take place on Wednesday, Sept. 6 with the start of classes set for the fall term on Thursday morning, Sept. 7.

It was noted that the distribution of the school calendar for the year may be delayed "two or three weeks" this year due to the absence of a budget until the Aug. 23 decision. It was also reported that student cafeterias may not be in operation until the second week of the term for basically the same reason with staffs to be hired and supplies received.

Expect Record Attendance Two Conn. Fire Depts Coming on Labor Day

With favorable weather forecast for Labor Day, a record all-timeturnout for the 39th annual Hicksville Fire Dept parade and drill next Monday is anticipated. Among the long distance entries anticipated are two from Connecticut: Mill Plains, Danbury, and Clinton, as well as Mattydale from upstate New York.

The racing course with seating for over 6000 has been completed on the Mid Island Plaza parking lot where the events will start at 1 P.M. A reviewing stand for public officials will be set up at the racing course in the morning for the parade which takes place, rain or shine, starting at 9:30 A.M.

A new judging arch will be installed at the course for the events. The ten-year-old arch, on loan to the state firemen's association for the drill at Albany recently, collapsed Thursday apparently due to overloading, resulting in several injuries. Hicksville Fire Dept. was held blameless by authorities upstate.

John McDonald as general chairman of the program will head the six division parade of thousands of volunteers and their ladies auxiliary members, dozens of bands of musicians and hundreds of pieces of fire apparatus. The current year's state champions will not be known, Labor Day, the contests

having been cancelled at Albany with a run-off scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 23, at Lindenhurst.

The sixth division marshals, all ex-chiefs, will be Stanford (Sam) Weiss, John Specht, Walter Telender, Charles Saurer, Harry (Rox) Borley and B. Medard Ofenloch.

While the parade takes place rain or shine, the contests in events of severely inclement weather will be rescheduled. Only one Labor Day competition in recent years (Burns Ave) had to be rescheduled because of weather.

Among those injured and hospitalized in the mishap upstate were Walter Worthington, top Suffolk County volunteer fireman; and Mario Pollini of Malverne, chief Nassau County Tournament judge and a familiar figure at the Hicksville Labor Day competitions.

Tops in State

Hicksville Volunteers, represented by 31 men, won first award for appearance in the State Tournament parade at Albany last week, the first time Hicksville took this honor in its 99 year history. The Roosevelt Fire Dept. Drum and Bugle Corps marching ahead of Hicksville also took first place in their category and the Hicksville Fire Dept. Ladies Auxiliary won first award for appearance in the same parade.

The actual parade was held in the outskirts of Albany at a place called Fuller Road, New York.

Allen Reserves Appeal Decision

State Education Commissioner James Allen reserved decision, Tuesday, afternoon, following an oral hearing in Albany on the appeal made by Charles Fetta from a decision of the Hicksville Board of Education regarding separate voter consideration of student transportation on Aug. 23.

Fetta, who attended, was represented by Mason L. Hampton Jr., a Lyubrook attorney. Joseph Catalano represented Hicksville School District as its attorney.

A group of Hicksville residents attended the hearing in the Regents' Room, which took about a half hour. Still to be subject to a hearing is a second Fetta appeal on submitting the question of increasing the size of the Board to referendum.

Councilman Ralph J. Marino has introduced a resolution proclaiming Labor Day, 1967, as Volunteer Firemen's Day "to pay tribute to the volunteer firemen who, without benefit of compensation, risk and devote their lives to protect the lives and property of the taxpayers of their community."

Petito Seeking To Improve Fields

Town Supervisor Michael N. Petito has issued a call to all officials of leagues within the Township to meet at 8 p.m. on Sept. 7th at Oyster Bay Town Hall to discuss ways of improving playing conditions on athletic fields throughout the Town. In announcing the meeting, Petito said he had received a number of complaints about the ball fields and expressed hope that the Sept. 7th conference would provide "a cross-section of proposals from all over the Town which would improve the fields for the hundreds of little-league baseball and football activities."

"I have not been satisfied with the conditions seen to date," the Supervisor said. "While I will advance certain proposals of my own, I think it is essential that key officials connected with the many youth leagues around the Town give their views."

Petito said that while complaints on field conditions will be brought up from time to time he feels that the Town must increase its maximum effort to keep these athletic facilities in the best condition possible. He added: "When you realize that we are the second largest Township in the State of New York and that our average age per resident is under the national figures, it is absolutely necessary that our outdoor recreation facilities be maintained in best playing conditions."

Petito also pointed out that while many of the fields in use in the Town are under school district jurisdiction, improvements at Town fields will create better conditions for little leagues at all levels.

GI INSURANCE: Periodically the Veterans Administration urges veterans with GI life insurance to make sure that the beneficiaries named in their policies still are the ones they want to receive the money. Failure to keep beneficiaries up to date can result in the proceeds of the policy going to persons other than the ones veterans wanted to have the money. To be sure -- check it out NOW.

GI BILL: A GI Bill package that would increase monthly educational allowances and offer pilot training on the job and farm cooperative benefits for the first time to peace time veterans has won House-Senate conference approval. The measure would extend still other wartime benefits to men who have served on active duty since August 4, 1964, the date of the Gulf of Tonkin incident. Carrying last minute changes the bill is expected to receive quick passage from both houses.

GI MAIL: In answer to a question posed by parents whose son is serving in Vietnam as to the length of time it takes for a letter to reach him, we are advised as follows: All airmail (including parcels prepared at the airmail rate) is transported by aircraft within the United States and from the West Coast to Vietnam. This mail should reach a serviceman within four to six days after it is mailed Stateside. All first class mail prepared at five cents per ounce (including sound-recorded communications such as magnetic tape recordings used for personal correspondence) is airborne from designated places in the United States to the West Coast on a space - available nonpriority basis. The mail is then transported to Vietnam by aircraft and should reach the serviceman in Vietnam within four to eight days after it is mailed Stateside.

PATRIOTISM: Congressman Richard Roudsbusch, a past national commander of the V.F.W., and whose name has appeared in this column from time to time has brought to the attention of Congress a very interesting item that should be rectified immediately. The item, a copy of a Navy order to all naval district commanders opposing participation in parades sponsored by veterans and patriotic groups. The pertinent section of the order states: The recent anti-Vietnam policy demonstrations conducted throughout the country have produced reactions by veterans and patriotic groups in several areas. Rallies and parades are being staged by these organizations for the specific purpose of off-setting these peace rallies. Navy participation, such as speakers, bands and marching units, has been requested in a number of instances and can be expected to be requested in any future counter - demonstrations organized by these anti-Vietnam groups. In view of the political implications of this particular category of demonstrations, Navy

All in all, The Birchwood Civic Association is proud of the fact that this commitment was obtained within 60 days after the committee instituted Proceedings.

We wish both candidates well in their endeavors and trust that their example will encourage many others to concern themselves to even greater extent with community planning, betterment, and protection. Local representatives eventually aspire for higher elected office. The man who serves us at Oyster Bay Town Hall will be a Congressman in years to come. Thus, truly the key for a brighter future for us and our children may be what happens here and now in terms of selection and election of men and women of quality and integrity.
