

## Hands Vanish Again From School Clock

Vandals who made off with the hands of the four sided memorial clock in the Tower of Hicksville Senior High School are being sought. It marks the second theft of clock hands in recent years.

The clock and tower were erected some years ago as a Memorial to Hicksville men who gave their lives in World War II. When the hands were taken before, they were returned almost as mysteriously.

In the recent incident, it is reported the clock mechanism was extensively damaged. A report of the damage and action to be taken was expected to be considered at a meeting of the Hicksville Board of Education last night (Wednesday).

## Nicholai School Available For Rest Of Semester

The Most Reverend Walter P. Kellenberg, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese of Rockville Centre, through the diocesan Education Department, says the Diocese is pleased to offer unused facilities at Holy Trinity High School, Hicksville, to the 300 displaced student body of the Nicholai St School for the remainder of the current semester.

"We're delighted to have them," said the Rev. Andrew P. Connolly, Holy Trinity principal. "It was the right thing to do — we have the space," he added.

Pupils from the Nicholai St. School were to have attended the wood-frame school building this year but a routine check by school authorities just before opening day revealed potential structural dangers.

The Rev. David G. Farley, Diocesan Superintendent of Schools, said that "when Father Connolly informed me that an emergency situation involving children prevailed in the district, we acted immediately. The public and parochial schools in Hicksville are partners in education."

The 323 third grade pupils from the Nicholai School are using the entire third floor of Holy Trinity, one of four new diocesan high schools opened a year ago.

The new diocesan high schools, which will eventually double secondary enrollment in the diocese, each have about 1,200 students, half of the future enrollment.

According to Father Connolly, there is no conflict of schedules. The public school children use a separate entrance that leads directly to the third floor.

Both Donald Abt, Hicksville school district superintendent, and James Burke, Nicholai School principal, have praise for Diocesan cooperation.

"Father Connolly and his staff at Holy Trinity have been most cooperative," said Mr. Abt.

He explained that the Nicholai School building was found to be "potentially dangerous" if undue

stress was placed on part of the roof.

Burke indicated the transition was made smoothly and said: "We can't say too much on how grateful we are to Father Connolly and the diocese. The Board of Education and parents have also expressed their appreciation."

Burke said there was legal precedent for public schools using private school facilities, mentioning similar circumstances in Rockland County. Burke also said there was no space in the public school system for his pupils unless another school was put on double session. Only third graders attend the Nicholai School because it is designated as an "overflow" school in the Hicksville system.

# Petito Announces Budget Hearing Promises Tax Cuts

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Michael N. Petito announces that the Town Board will hold a public hearing on his proposed budget -- which he says would lower the tax rate for some homeowners by as much as 44.7 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation at noon on Tuesday, Oct. 3, at Oyster Bay Town Hall, starting at 12 noon.

Petito urged as many citizens as possible to attend the hearing which his total budget of \$6,284,288 will be discussed.

In announcing the proposed budget, Petito said that a 2.1 cent increase in the current tax rate to 18.3 cents, would be offset by an 11.9 cent cut in highway taxes and reduction of sanitation and other special district tax rates.

"I do hope that the Board will listen carefully on Tuesday," Supervisor Petito said, "when homeowners express their approval of the lowering of taxes. Last year Town Board members did not listen to the people and raised taxes when it wasn't necessary."

"I think my 1968 Budget shows that while state-mandated increases make it necessary to increase the tax rate by 2.1 cents, efficiency in the Highway Department and careful budgeting by the Special Districts can lead to the reduction of other assessments so that the overall tax rate can be lowered," Petito added.

## Board Debating Master Plan Draft

As the members of the Town Board of Oyster Bay continue their debate about the draft of a Master Plan, the Chairman of the Development and Planning Action Commission publicly disassociated the Commission from the controversy.

Dr. Edward J. Cook, Chairman of the Commission, said: "The members of the Development and Planning Action Commission have quietly and systematically worked for more than two years to produce a master plan. This work has proceeded in an atmosphere wholly divorced from political matters of the moment. The false sense of urgency injected into the discussion of the Master Plan by the present public controversy is completely inappropriate to the preparation of a master plan intended to guide the development of the community for decades in the future. Consequently, the Commission must respectfully decline to interrupt its deliberations and join in premature public debate."

Dr. Cook added: "An essential element in the preparation of any master plan intended to serve an entire community is an extended series of discussions. It has always been, and it continues to be, the intent of the Commission to hear and consider the views of members of the Town Board."

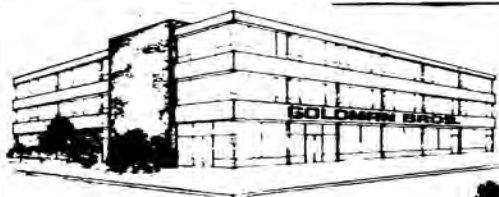

know we are solidly behind them. Backing up the campaign of positive Americanism, the V.F.W. leader said, will be the strongest membership drive in our history. For its success will be the measure of our success in all other programs."

VIET VET BENEFITS: A special report on the various benefits earned by military service since the outbreak of the Vietnam conflict, August 5, 1964, has been compiled by the Army Times Service Center.

## Fire Prevention Week Planning Operation Edith Drill

Are you getting ready for your own family fire drill when the Operation EDITH signal sounds on Wednesday, Oct. 11, at 7:30 P.M.?

Operation EDITH is the life-saving project which urges every householder in this community to prepare an emergency escape plan for his home, and to practice it on this special night of Fire Prevention Week.

To help you plan for your own home, here are pointers from the Nassau County Fire Commission:

1. Carefully figure out at least two routes to the outside from every room in the house, especially bedrooms. Allow for blocking of stairways and halls by fire.

2. Particularly for nighttime fires, remember that closed bedroom doors will hold back flame and smoke, allowing extra time for escape.

3. For upper floor escape, use any available porch and garage roofs,

ladders or trees as ways down to safety. Be sure exit windows work easily, and that they are low and large enough to get through.

4. Pick an outside assembly point where the family will meet, and be sure everyone understands the rule "once out -- stay out."

5. Know how to call the fire dept., by street box or neighbor's phone, and do this as quickly as the house is clear of people, in case of actual fire.

To be effective, says Fire Marshal Peter Lynch, the children in the family should participate fully in your home fire drill if possible to do so safely; otherwise, the drill should be simulated. "Experience proves that children who have been well-trained will react intelligently in a fire emergency, according to the fire marshal. "This added protection for children is one of the biggest dividends from family fire drills," he declared.

## Horses On The Run

On Sept. 18th the operator of the Birchwood Stables located on Jericho Turnpike adjacent to Temple Or-Elohim, pleaded guilty to a violation of the Town of Oyster Bay zoning ordinance and agreed to remove its horses from the premises and cease its operations as a riding academy therein no later than Sept. 30th.

This brings to a conclusion the first phase of an undertaking by Temple Or-Elohim of Jericho and the Birchwood Civic Assn., aided by the Town of Oyster Bay, to bring to a halt the violation of the Residence C zoning of the premises in question by the utilization of same for stable or riding academy purposes.

For the time being, residents in the area immediately about the stable premises will be able to have their outdoor barbecues without fear of runaway horses galloping across their rear yards, and children attending the Temple Or-Elohim Religious School will not be placed in peril of harm.

It is the Villager's understanding that the Town is in the process of redrawing an informa-

tion - which is similar to a complaint - which will bring the owners of the premises, as well as the major tenants before the Court in an effort to secure a court ruling, the effect of which will make it prohibitive for these parties to ever utilize these premises for stable or riding academy purposes under the zoning laws as presently constituted.

In passing, thanks are due to the many residents of the Jericho area who appeared at the Town Hall in Oyster Bay in June to vigorously protest the application by the owners of the stable premises to secure a variance which would permit a stable or riding academy operation. This application has since been withdrawn.

Ed. Note. Our entire community owes a vote of thanks to Larry Gibbs whose untiring volunteer services as a member and former chairman of the board of our civics and present legal counsel to Temple Or-Elohim have brought this three year action to a successful conclusion.)

(2) side yards, one on each side

Sec. S-20. In S-1, the Town of  
Oyster Bay Senior Citizen and  
Housing Authority District,  
a fence, as in this ordinance de-  
fined and not exceeding six (6)  
feet in height may be erected on  
the rear lot line and such portions  
of the side lot lines as shall be  
lot lines enclosing the rear yard,

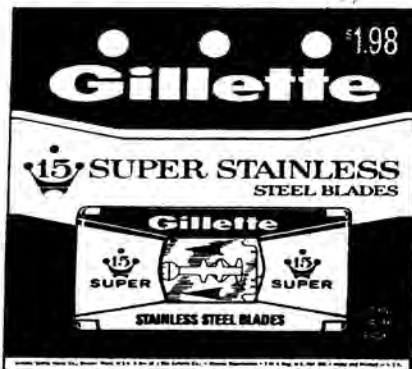
### Pupils Contribute Art For Nassau
