Board Engages Pair As Public Info Coordinators

Hicksville Board of Education by a vote of 5 to 2 hired two daily newspaper reporters for the newly-created position of "public information coordinator" at a special meeting last night (Wed) and immediately owed J. Gregory Wynne and Anthony Panzarella \$700.

While the contract was dated Dec. 6, it was made effective Sept. 1 of this year for a total fee of \$2000, with \$700 due on Dec. 1, \$600 on Mar. 1 and \$700 on June 30, 1968.

The Board had voted on Sept. 13 to retain Wynne and Panzarella as Creative Associates of North Merrick as public information coordinators for the district, with the "proviso that the contractual agreement will be satisfactory to the School Board at a later date."

A motion was made at the Nov. 29 meeting to "execute the contract for the balance of the school year at a fee of \$2000" but no vote was taken. President Marvin Goldberg called the special meeting for last night regarding the contract and other business.

There was some difference of opinion last night regarding the meaning of the expression "school year". Some trustees felt it meant the school district fiscal year which runs from July 1 to June 30, while others felt it starts with school sessions in September and concludes the following June, a difference of two months or more.

President Goldberg admitted "this is a problem we created. We should have clarified this."

The two reporters were asked to tell the Board what they understood by the expression "school year." Wynne said "we met with you in May or June... we thought it was to be a \$2000 contract for the school year."

Panzarella recalled that he had been phoned by the "district clerk" in October and was told Creative Associates had been hired. Later Board Secretary Harry Kershen stated it was he, and not the district clerk, who had called Panzarella and told him that Creative Associates was hired.

The motion to execute the contract was made by Vice President Harold Sternberger, following a short executive session, seconded by Thomas Nagle. Voting in favor were Sternberger, Goldberg, Kershen, Evelyn Silver and Nagle. Opposed were Cornelius McCormack and George Jackson.

Meet Legislators On School Costs

State Sen. John D. Caemmerer of Williston Park and Assemblyman Joseph Reilly of Glen Cove will speak Dec. 13 at the Hicksville School Board meeting, according to the newly designated public information coordinator.

"The school board asked the lawmakers to appear at the meeting to give their views on taxes and the rising cost of education."

"The event is part of the board's continuing program of keeping itself and district residents up to date on prospects for additional state aid at the upcoming session of the legislature. Last month, the board heard Assemblyman Martin Ginsberg of Plainview announce he would prefile a bill to raise state aid by 10 per cent."

"The Dec. 13th meeting starts at 8 p.m. in the Administration Building on Division Ave."

He received 342 votes, Tuesday night, to defeat James Taster with 308 ballots and Robert Hammond who received 113 votes. There were a total of 774 votes cast. Frank Wallach, unopposed for re-election as district treasurer, received 480 votes. MacDonald said this week he wished to thank all those who voted for him and pledge himself to be worthy of their support.

Petito Margin Official 2302

Incumbent Town Supervisor Michael Petito nosed back into office by a tight margin of 2,302 votes last month, the official Board of Election tally discloses. Petito received 51,274 votes and Republican Ralph Marino 48,972.

Curiously, the official tally shows that the margin between candidates for county executive was almost the same. Incumbent Democrat Eugene Nickerson received 241,096 and Republican Sol Wachtler 238,233 for a county-wide difference of 2,863. The unofficial election night margin had been reported as 833 for Nickerson.

Board Engages Negotiator

Hicksville School District now has a professional negotiator in the person of Attorney Harold F. Hay of 50 Broadway, New York City, who will be paid at a fee not to exceed \$35 an hour and not more than \$5000 for the current school year.

The action to engage Hay was taken at a special Board meeting last night (Wed.)

Under the new Taylor Law, the Board of Education has apparently concluded the preliminaries of recognizing bargaining units of district employees, teaching and non-teaching.

BENEFITS Whatever it is, unawareness or neglect, millions of people are missing out on government benefits. According to the Veterans Administration it is estimated that only about half of the children of veterans who died or became totally disabled as the result of service, apply for education money of \$130 a month for up to 36 months, or four years of school. . . That any veteran age 65 or over is now automatically presumed to be disabled. No medical certificate is needed for a disability pension -- which is based on need. . .

That a veterans widow receiving a pension is also entitled to an additional \$50 a month if she is so disabled she needs home care or is in a nursing home. . .
