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Grunewald Seeks State Full Disclosure Law

Town Councilman A. Carl Grunewald in a New Year's message recommended that the Oyster Bay Town Board urge the Governor and the State Legislature to produce and pass an adequate bill "providing a full uniform disclosure for all municipalities throughout the state."

Grunewald said despite efforts of local governmental agencies, the entire disclosure concept, whereby all applicants for zoning changes must reveal the corporation's principals to the town boards, would be best accomplished by a statewide disclosure law.

Islip have indicated that some public officials have usurped their public trusts by being involved with firms requesting zoning changes.

"With a uniform full statewide disclosure law, implemented by the various town disclosure ordinances, all principals, individuals, directors, stockholders and other interested parties and the extent of their interest, would be made available to the public before any zoning changes are contemplated by the town boards,"

said Grunewald. A copy of the resolution urging Governor Rockefeller and other legislators to act during this session of the legislature is being forwarded to the Governor and State Senators John Caemmerer, Henry M. Curran and Edward J. Speno, and Assemblymen Joseph Reilly, Francis B. McCloskey and Martin Ginsberg.

GOP Pledges To Achieve Economy

Town Board Majority Leader Ralph J. Marino said that the majority members of the Board will continue to direct their attention toward achieving economy of operations in local government in 1968.

"Our major problem in 1968 will be to make certain that the tax line is held without sacrificing essential services," Marino said. He pointed out that the Board will continue to review the Supervisor's spending programs, eliminating those it feels are unnecessary to the efficient operation of the Town.

"We have made a fine start toward this goal," Marino said, "in effecting an \$18 1/2 million reduction in the Supervisor's capital expenditure program and in having held the tax line by cutting his proposed operating budget for 1968.

"This slash in the Supervisor's operating budget gives our taxpayers a ten per cent across the board tax reduction for this year and stabilizes the rate of expenditures for capital improvements over the next five years, eliminating peaks and valleys in Town payments for bonded indebtedness," Marino added.

The capital program planned by the Board also provides fiscal flexibility enabling the comptroller to take advantage of favorable interest rates in the bond market. The Board's 1968 capital financial program provides funds to attack a number of complex problems confronting the Town.

One million dollars has been earmarked for conservation purposes including an all-out assault on the eel grass problem on the South Shore. These funds will permit the Town to continue the program of installing new nets nearer the mouths of the canals to prevent eel grass from drifting into the residential areas. Monies will be provided to purchase additional equipment to more efficiently collect and dispose of floating eel grass. Another phase of the program includes the dredging of shoaled canal mouths which face blockage by sediment as a result of wind, waves and tide action. The plan calls for the elimination of these navigational hazards to permit fuller utilization of existing canals and all tides. Recently, the Board acted together with the N.Y. State Conservation Department to preserve in perpetuity its 5,000 acres of wetlands on the South Shore.

Development of the John J. Burns Park in Massapequa next year will include construction of administrative, maintenance and marine service buildings together with recreational facilities as part of Phase I. Approval has already been received indicating that \$250,000 of State funds will be made available for this phase of the planned development of the park.

Improvements to the north shore beaches are also provided in the program. Center Island beaches improvements are estimated by the Engineering Department at \$300,000, exclusive of the Tappan Beach development program previously authorized and scheduled for construction this year. Theodore Roosevelt Beach and Beekman Beach are also on the engineering list for a \$50,000 improvement program.

Land for a major park at Heiser Lane in Farmingdale has already been acquired and a \$600,000 development program is slated to become operable in 1968.

The Department of Public Works is presently processing plans for parking fields restoration and improvement in many of the communities of the Town, including the expansion of parking facilities wherever necessary.

The escalator in Hicksville will also be enclosed at an estimated cost of \$12,000.

Urgently needed storm water drainage and highway improvements will be effected in many areas of the Town as part of the over all Public Works Department program in 1968.

On the legislative side, the Town Board will continue its review of existing ordinances and local laws for the purpose of strengthening them to assist in preserving the Town's suburban characteristics. The Town Attorney is drafting a Full Disclosure Law on zoning matters which is expected to be adopted by the Board in the near future. The law will require all applicants for zoning changes to reveal the corporation's principals to the Town Board.

Consideration for the establishment of a Board of Aesthetics Review will also be taken up in early 1968. The Board Majority has requested the Commissioner of Public Works to present it with a plan for the conversion of the old Fourth District Courthouse in Hicksville to a Town museum, and it is hoped that federal aid will be obtainable for this project. The plan would include the appointment of a non-salaried Historic Properties Commission.

The Narcotics Education Program in the schools will be intensified and consideration will be given to the establishment of a Department of Conservation and Waterways to assist the Town in its efforts to preserve these vast natural resources.

"The problems of the Town of Oyster Bay are complex but not insurmountable," Marino said. "I am confident we can accomplish much of the local government level without imposing additional taxes. All department heads have been instructed to economize wherever possible and to effect further reductions in operating costs without sacrificing essential services."

Planned Parenthood Group Luncheon

Mrs. Hamilton Hadden Jr. of Jericho, Chairman of the annual fund raising drive of Planned Parenthood of Nassau County in Mineola, announced final plans for the kick off luncheon. It is to be held at the home of Mrs. Prescott Jennings Jr., High Farms Road in Glen Head, on Wednesday, January 17th at noon. About sixty workers on the drive are expected.

Dr. Joel Robins, Director of the Family Planning Clinic at Meadowbrook Hospital, will be the guest speaker. Mrs. Hadden stated that the goal of the agency for this year is \$25,000. She further went on to say that the Planned Parenthood program for the coming year is geared to spreading the word to every woman in Nassau County that the family planning services are available for all.

Hibernians Raising Funds To Finance Heart Operation

At the request of the Chaplain, Father Francis Casey, the Commodore John Barry Ancient Order of Hibernians, is sponsoring, in conjunction with the Women's Auxiliary, "The Dennis Barret Heart Fund Benefit" to be held on Jan. 28, at 8:00 P.M. at the K. C. in Hicksville. This benefit is to raise money to help defray the hospital expenses involved in a heart operation to be performed on Dennis Barret who is a parishioner in Father Casey's parish in Limerick County, Ireland. Mr. Barret

is 34 years of age and the father of four children.

Father Casey has arranged for Dr. McGowan, a heart specialist, to perform the operation, without charge, in Pittsburgh during the second week in January.

Since this operation entails a long hospital convalescence, the hospital bill is expected to be about \$4,000 and the Hibernians have been asked to do their best to raise as much of this amount as possible.

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GOP LAWMAKERS PRESS FOR MEDICAID REVIEW

Nassau County's Republican lawmakers served notice today they will introduce legislation to curtail and restructure the State's Medicaid program "to ease the tax burden on local property owners."

The decision was announced following a special meeting of GOP legislators called by State Sen. Edward J. Speno of East Meadow and Assemblyman Joseph M. Margiotta of Uniondale. Margiotta, who is slated to succeed Speno as Nassau Republican Chairman after the first of the year, said the Nassau Republicans had discussed "a long list" of issues which are expected to come before the Legislature at its next session beginning Jan. 3.

High on the list, according to Margiotta, is a legislative review of the State's Medicaid program. He said "soaring costs and re-

cent Congressional action reducing federal support for the program have made this review mandatory."

The new county GOP Chairman pointed out that State Sen. Norman F. Lent, Chairman of the Joint Legislative Committee

on the Problems of Public Health and Medicaid, has already announced a series of statewide public hearings "to determine what action the Legislature should take regarding Medicaid, including the possibility of cutbacks in our state program."

Margiotta Succeeds Senator E. Speno As G.O.P. Chairman

Assemblyman Joseph M. Margiotta of 924 Hempstead Blvd., Uniondale, rated throughout the state as a "master political technician," is succeeding State Sen. Edward J. Speno of East Meadow as Chairman of the Nassau County Republican Committee.

Margiotta, who has been chairman of the Hempstead Town Republican organization and a close associate of Speno, received the unanimous endorsement of the party's 100-man Executive Committee at a meeting on Dec. 27 at Republican headquarters in Garden City.

Margiotta, 40, was unopposed for the county's top GOP post. His name was placed in nomination by State Senator John D. Caemmerer, Chairman of the North Hempstead Town Republican Committee, and won support from all three town units.

The full 2,000-man County GOP Committee is expected to ratify the succession at a meeting this Thursday, Jan. 4, at 8:30 p.m. in the Garden City Hotel.

Margiotta, has been open and candid regarding his intention to make the chairman's job a "career". In accepting the unqualified support of the Executive GOP Committee, he declared:

"I consider it a high honor and a rare opportunity for service to my Party. The Nassau Republican organization is one of the largest and most powerful political units in the nation, and I intend to do everything I can to keep it this way."

Close associates and political opponents have no doubt Margiotta means what he says. He is considered a tireless worker and a master political technician whose steady rise to the top of the Nassau GOP hierarchy began as a committeeman in Uniondale's 62nd Election District.

Since then he has achieved success in both political and governmental spheres. An attorney who rates himself as a "moderate" Republican, Margiotta was elected an Assemblyman in 1965 from the 12th Assembly District, but was a seasoned Albany veteran before that.

He acted as legislative consultant to the Nassau County Board of Supervisors, counsel to the Joint Legislative Committee on Highway Safety and Motor

Vehicles and legislative counsel to Senator Speno before he was tapped by his party as a legislative candidate.

As a legislator, he has compiled an enviable record in Albany through hard work and skillfully applied expertise. He has battled against New York City's income tax on commuters and has waged a vigorous fight against compulsory busing of students away from their neighborhood schools. He has been in the forefront of campaigns to increase state aid to schools.

Margiotta is Vice-Chairman and the only Nassau Assemblyman serving on the prestigious Joint Legislative Committee on Education and in his short time in the legislature has emerged as the second ranking minority member of the Assembly Education Committee. He has also served on the Real Estate and Mortgage and Penal Institutions Committees.

In the political sphere, Margiotta rose through the ranks. From committeeman, he rose to president of the community's Republican Club, and won the confidence of his fellow committeemen when he was chosen Uniondale's Republican Executive Committeeman.

Closely associated with Senator Speno, Margiotta served as Deputy Hempstead Town Republican chairman when Speno held both the office of Nassau County and Hempstead Town leader. Subsequently, Speno relinquished his town post and Margiotta was overwhelmingly e-

lected chairman in June 1967. In November, Margiotta's organizational ability was demonstrated when he masterminded a landslide victory for the entire GOP township ticket headed by Hempstead Presiding Town Supervisor Ralph G. Caso.

Margiotta has lived nearly all of his life in Nassau County and Hempstead Town. He is a graduate of the Uniondale Grade School System, Hempstead High School and Hofstra University. He obtained his law degree from Brooklyn Law School.

A former trustee of Hofstra University and past president and board chairman of the University's Alumni Association, Margiotta was named outstanding alumnus of the year by the Hofstra Alumni Association in 1966.

Active in the community, Margiotta is a founder and past chairman of the Uniondale Library Board. He is a former commander of the Uniondale VFW Post, past director of the Central Island Mental Health Center and former chairman of Boy Scout, Cerebral Palsy and Cancer fund drives.

He holds memberships in the Nassau County Historical Society, Nassau County Bar Association, Hempstead Elks, Uniondale Kiwanis and Uniondale Knights of Columbus.

Margiotta maintains a law office at 955 Front St., Uniondale. He and his wife, Dorothy, have two children, Michael, 10, and Carol Lynn, 6.

New Postage Rates

Nearly 10,000 postage vending machines, including those at Hicksville and its Plainview Branch Post Office, will be converted over the next three months to reflect the new postage rates. Postmaster Ralph G. Cascardo said today.

New postage rates go into effect January 7, 1968, the Postmaster noted. The new rates raise first class postage to 6-cents an ounce, air mail to 10-cents an ounce, and postal cards to 5-cents.

The job of converting the thousands of vending machines found in post office lobbies from coast to coast is so massive that it will take several months to complete, the Postmaster said. Five different types of machines are involved, he noted.

Most of the machines now provide 5-cent and 4-cent stamps for nickels, quarter or dimes. After the conversion, the machines will provide 5-cent and 6-cent stamps. A new model will offer 1-cent, 5-cent and 6-cent stamps.

The Postmaster said that the vending machines located in the lobbies of post offices are not to be confused with commercial stamp vending devices found in many stores. Such commercial machines provide a margin for profit and are not controlled by the Post Office Department, he said.

"Post office vending machines can be a big convenience to postal patrons," Mr. Cascardo said. "The devices permit mailers to ignore waiting lines at stamp sales windows or to buy stamps to mail letters after the windows have closed."

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State Sen. Caemmerer Proposes Surplus Textbooks Depository

A bill to establish a state surplus textbooks depository will be prefilled in the Legislature by State Senator John D. Caemmerer of Nassau's Fifth Senatorial District. It amends the State education law.

Under the provisions of the proposed legislation, the Commissioner of Education would be authorized to establish a surplus textbooks depository, headed by a director and such staff as deemed necessary for the proper operation of such depository. Locations of storage places for the surplus textbooks is left to the discretion of the Commissioner of Education.

The bill requires each school district in the state to forward its surplus textbooks to the depository for storage. The textbooks

will be made available without cost to any educational institution requesting them. Transportation costs, however, must be borne by the educational institution requesting them.

"I believe this legislation will fulfill a pressing need by supplying textbooks to schools and other educational institutions that can put them to good use," Senator Caemmerer said.

"It is indeed a shame to deprive students who can use such textbooks and that is the principal aim of this proposed legislation."

Senator Caemmerer said that otherwise the textbooks would be burned or destroyed in some other way. "Many of these textbooks are practically brand new and certainly further use can be made of them," he said.

The Republican Senator added, "the collection of used and surplus textbooks has been the dedicated campaign of private citizens."

Senator Caemmerer said that he was impressed with the voluntary efforts of one of his constituents, Walter Sysak of Mineola, who has collected and shipped more than 108,000 used textbooks to underprivileged schools in the past three years.

If passed by the legislature and signed by the governor, the bill would become effective on September 1, 1968.

CSEA Continues As Representative

Hempstead Town Presiding Supervisor Ralph G. Caso announces the Civil Service Employees Association will continue to be recognized as the bargaining representative of the town's 2,100 employees.

Until publication Nov. 2, of regulations by the state's Public Employees Relations Board, status of representatives recognized before passage of the Taylor law was an open question, he said.

The new rules require that any organization recognized before April 21, 1967, be continued as the representative of the employees. The Hempstead Town Board approved a resolution on March 21, 1967, recognizing the CSEA.

On the basis of this newly announced policy, Caso met today with Ralph Natale, president of the Hempstead Town CSEA unit, and Irving Flaumenbaum, president of the Nassau CSEA, to discuss ground rules prior to entering into negotiations on wages, hours and working conditions.

It was decided that a four-man team headed by Raymond Harrington, director of employee relations for the town, would meet Jan. 11, with Natale and Flaumenbaum to begin preliminary negotiations.
