## Lawyer Conference Plans Trip to South America

Michael M. D'Auria, former County Judge of Nassau County and President of the Nassau County Lawyer's Conference, of 380 North Broadway, Jericho, has announced that the Conference will be journeying to South America and for its 1968 annual visit to foreign countries.

Judge D'Auria stated that the conference group will leave on Friday evening, March 15, for seminars to be held in Lima, Peru, Buenos Aires, and Rio de Janeiro with side trips to such places as VinadelMar near Santiago.

In making this announcement Judge D'Auria said: "For over 13 years the Nassau County Lawyer's Conference has traveled to various parts of the world to confer with judges, attorneys and public officials as a means of post-legal education and to foster good will among brother attorneys and members of the judiciary. The 1968 Conference promises to be the most exciting ever as our Conference has been advised that we will be the largest group ever to

make an official visit to the countries on our itinerary. Excellent legal seminars have been arranged in the various countries we will visit through the cooperation of the United States State Department and the various ambassadors of the South American countries. One of the most interesting itineraries ever presented to lawyers, judges and public officials of Nassau County will be presented during our stay in South America."

The Conference is scheduled to return to the United States on April 3, and D'Auria noted that a number of judges as well as distinguished attorneys and public officials will be traveling with the group this year. Space is presently available for two or three additional couples and reservation forms may be obtained by calling the Conference secretary at WE 8-1700.

The Nassau County Lawyer's Conference was organized 13 years ago to foster good will and better understanding between the attorneys, judges and public officials of Nassau County.

## Welcome Petito To Freeze Team

Councilman Ralph J. Marino, Town Board majority leader, today welcomed Supervisor Michael Petito to the "job freeze team" which the board has been operating since the first of the year.

Marino said the Supervisor's recent announcement of the job freeze was a repetition of the position the Board had taken in adopting its 1968 budget.

"We are very gratified that the Supervisor has seen fit to go along with the Board's position for a change," said Marino. "We have been trying to economize all along by conserving in the areas of salaries, purchasing and personnel."

Marino explained that since the budget presented by the supervisor was drastically pared, economy has been the town board's by-word for several weeks prior to the effective Jan. 1 starting date of the 1968 budget.

He added that, wherever possible, cuts have been made, and reminded the supervisor that the board has to approve all salary increases or new personnel.

Councilman Ralph Diamond of Jericho is returning to his alma mater New York University to recapture part of his past as a high scoring guard on the Violets basketball team in the mid-thirties.

Among those who will join Diamond on the hardwood are Don Forman, Milt Schulman, Ben Auerbach, Ralph Kaplowitz and Lenny Maidman.

A graduate of New York University and New York University Law School, Diamond was on the first undefeated Violets team in 1936. He played on the varsity and captained the Washington Square and Law School quintets.

## Grumman Receives Top Award

Grumman Aircraft Engineering Corp. of Bethpage has received the top award made annually by Industrial Photography Magazine for the best industrial and commercial motion picture. Grumman was cited for "outstanding achievement in industrial motion pictures that have been made in-plant."

The winning film, titled "Ready on Arrival" was made by Grumman's Photography & Television Department, headed by Richard

Milligan of 4 Colonial Court, Bay Shore.

"Ready on Arrival," a color-sound production running for 28 minutes, was photographed aboard the USS Independence during preparations for its departure for Vietnam, and also features activities on the carrier during actual operations off Vietnam. The film was designed to acquaint the public with the mission of the attack carrier, the type of equipment and facilities aboard a carrier, and the 4,500 people who make the ship run.

In describing "Ready on Arrival," the magazine said that Grumman had "tackled a mammoth job in portraying the role of today's attack carrier, and the way in which its 4,500-man crew serves to support our strategy around the world. Using the carrier Independence, striking action shots show the part each member of the vast team plays in making the unit a potent striking force, whether the job be one of food preparation or piloting a fighter.

"Nicely paced," the magazine said, "it is at its best when it documents the exacting job of handling flight control on deck. The action shots are dramatic and visually exciting.

"A real accomplishment in editing to tie together so vast a story."

## Town Board Adopts Capital Budget Procedure

The Oyster Bay Town Board today, January 9, 1968, adopted a Capital Budget Procedure which will help expedite the planning and execution of a capital program, Councilman Ralph J. Marino, Board Majority Leader, announced.

Marino said the new procedure establishes the responsibilities and sets the dates and deadlines for submission of capital projects to the Town Board for consideration.

Under the new procedure each department head will be responsible for submitting to the Supervisor and Comptroller, on or before August 1, written suggestions for capital projects to be undertaken within the next six years, the estimated cost and the proposed method of financing. The date coincides with the deadline for the annual operating budget estimates and will permit the department head to prepare both simultaneously so each can be referred to if needed.

Marino explained that the information for capital projects would be studied by the supervisor before he would include these recommendations in his preliminary Capital Budget which

must be submitted to the Town Board and Comptroller on or before September 15.

He stressed that the capital projects must be arranged in order of priority and include the effect, if any, on the operating costs of that department for the three ensuing fiscal years.

Marino also said that the Supervisor's preliminary capital budget must also include any amounts to be financed by direct budgetary appropriations during the fiscal year to which the preliminary budget pertains.

A public hearing on the Supervisor's preliminary capital program would be held within 10 days after September 15 and after the hearing, The Town Board would then review the preliminary capital budget. A public hearing called by the Town Board would be held on or before the Thursday following the general election in November. The capital program must then be adopted within five days of that hearing.

Marino said the capital program would include such projects that would mean any physical betterment or improvements within the Town such as furnishings, machinery, appara-

sosred, the state aid ceiling has dribbled woefully and inadequately along and has not kept pace at all," said a spokesman for the group.

Your Administrators Association implores our legislators to tackle the most basic state problems first. Local home owners are reeling under heavy tax burdens and are "lashing out" at educators and systems who are desperately trying to provide the quality of instruction that our children must have. This problem is of the utmost urgency. The present state aid ceiling does not even approach our costs and needs. Our children are our future. They must come first. We urge our legislators to raise our state aid ceiling to at least \$800 and to review the inequities of the Defendorf formula," he concluded.

Public Works Commissioner Robert J. Simins today assured holders of expiring two year 1966-67 County park permits that the permits will be valid until the new two year 1968-69 cards are mailed out. Mailings to the more than 140,000 permit holders affected are expected to start in a few weeks.

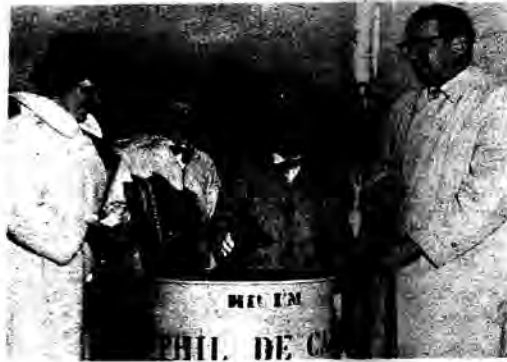
"We have received many calls from residents holding the 1966-67 permits, which are blue in color, asking whether they are still good for admission to the parks", Simins said. "They are and so, of course, are the orange 1967-68 permits held by 125,000 other people which are good for another year."

Simins pointed out that there are three categories of individuals who must fill out applications: those who have moved from one Nassau address to another during 1966 or 1967, those applying for the first time such as new residents and those who held permits issued prior to 1962 but allowed them to lapse and thus did not benefit from the system of automatic renewals instituted in 1964.

Individuals falling into these three categories may obtain permit applications by telephoning IV 9-9600 extension 211. All major County parks also have applications and permits on hand.
